Thank you for your email of 2 October 2017 requesting the following information:

"Please provide a breakdown of steroid drugs tested positive for over the past 36 months

I am treating your correspondence as a request for information under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOI Act). I apologise for the delay in replying to this request.

I can advise you that following a search of our records, I have established that the Ministry of Defence (MOD) holds information within the scope of your request. The table below provides a list of the steroid drugs which have been found in positive results conducted by the UK armed forces from 1 October 2014 to 10 September 2017.

In accordance with the Data Protection Act and our obligations in relation to the protection of confidentiality when handling personal data, disclosure control has been applied to the figures provided herewith. The figures provided in this response have been rounded to the nearest 10, where "~" denotes a number less than or equal to five. When rounding up to the nearest 10, numbers ending in a "5" have been rounded to the nearest multiple of 20 to prevent the systematic bias caused by always rounding numbers upwards. For example; a value of '25' would be rounded down to '20' and a value of '15' would be rounded up to '20'.

The UK Armed Forces Compulsory Drug Testing (CDT) programme conducts a random 10% selection of samples for steroid testing. The substances liable to analysis in the AFCDT programme are listed in the Misuse of Drugs 1971 schedule 2 Part 3. This is available at the link here: https://www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/1971/38/schedule/2

The MOD conducts CDT because substance misuse is incompatible with Service life. Less than 0.8% of those tested under the MOD's CDT programme return a positive result and personnel caught taking drugs can expect to be discharged. In a very small number of exceptional circumstances, where an uncharacteristic mistake is made by a young Service Person, second chances may be considered. This only happens where a Commanding Officer believes the individual meets the stipulated retention criteria. These retention criteria are laid out in Joint Service Publication 835, which is available on the gov.uk website.
