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Thank you for your email of 13 October in which you requested the following information:

I would like to obtain information relating to the drug testing of the Royal Regiment of Scotland. Can you tell me how many personnel tested positive for drugs in each of the last five calendar years?

If possible, can you further break down the information by providing (i) the rank of the individual, (ii) the class of drugs the individual tested positive for, and (iii) the battalion they belong to.

I am treating your correspondence as a request for information under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) 2000.

A search for the information has now been completed within the Ministry of Defence, and I can confirm that information in scope of your request is held, please see below.

The table below provides the number of personnel in the Royal Regiment of Scotland who failed a Compulsory Drugs Test (CDT), broken out by Battalion, in each of the last five calendar years.

Notes/Caveats:

- The data has been rounded to the nearest ten to limit disclosure and ensure confidentiality.
- "-" denotes zero, or rounded to zero.

Under Section 16 of the Act which requires public authorities to provide help and assistance, I can confirm that soldiers caught taking drugs will be discharged. Also with regards to the further breakdown requested by (i) rank, and (ii) class of drugs tested positive for. It has not been possible to provide this further breakdown, without exceeding the appropriate limit. The appropriate limit is specified in regulations and for central government this is set at £600. This represents the

estimated cost of one person spending three and a half working days in determining whether the Department holds the information, locating and retrieving and extracting it.

If you remain dissatisfied following an internal review, you may raise your complaint directly to the Information Commissioner under the provisions of Section 50 of the Freedom of Information Act. Please note that the Information Commissioner will not normally investigate your case until the MOD internal review process has been completed.
