## Corporate Plan Key Performance Indicators Headline Performance Update at 31 December 2015 (First Release)

<u>Forestry Commission England's Corporate Plan 2015-16</u> sets out our current key performance indicators to show our contribution towards forestry and woodlands in England. This also reflects our commitment to evidence based working and ensuring people are clear about trends in the key indicators we are working with others to move in the right direction.

Our <u>Indicator Reports</u> provide an annual report on all the indicators which we monitor and our <u>Indicators Report 2015</u>, published in May 2015, provides the latest position.

We reviewed our six headline key performance indicators in 2014-15 to ensure they are still the best we can offer and properly reflect the Government's priorities in English forestry.

We aim with the indicators to continue to reflect our priorities of protection, improvement and expansion of England's woodlands, as set out in our Corporate Plan 2015-16. We also want them to display the contributions Forest Enterprise England makes to people, nature and the economy through the Public Forest Estate.

So our six headline performance indicators are now as shown in Table 1 below. This is the third quarterly report on these headline indicators for the 2015-16 financial year. The first publication of the indicator 'Percentage of England's woodland threatened by significant pests or diseases already present' will be published in our quarterly reports as soon as possible following further development of its methodology, which includes expert opinion. Current assessments about plant pests and diseases can be found in the published <u>UK Plant Health Risk Register</u>.

These Forestry Commission England key performance indicators are based on our administrative data. The systems in place by which these reports have been produced have been verified by Internal Audit at the Forestry Commission (FC).



## **Forest Services**

### Protection


## Report for year to 31 December 2015: **99.90% of known tree felling was carried out with Forestry Commission approval.**

The most recent report detailing year-on-year figures shows continued strong performance. This high level of compliance with the Forestry Act is a strong indicator of legislative awareness and our (Forestry Commission's) ability to support customers in applying for Felling Licences.

#### Position at 31 December 2015: 58% of English woodland is actively managed.


The percentage of woodland in active management has gradually increased since the April 2011 baseline (52%). This gradual increase reflects good performance against one of our key policy drivers to bring more woodland into management. An increase in woodlands covered by Forestry Commission approved <u>UK Forestry Standard</u> compliant management plans is a reflection of a number of initiatives in support of bringing more woodlands into management, as well as new Rural Development Programme eligibility requirements and the ability to provide evidence of sustainable timber for procurement through linking felling to woodland management plans. The Public Forest Estate is classed as 100% managed with 50% of all other woodland ownerships considered to be in active management.

#### A. Area of Woodland in England Headline Indicator: Annually Updated


Position at 31 March 2015: 1,304,000 hectares of woodland in England.

As at 31 March 2015, the area of woodland in England was 1,304,000 hectares (ha), an increase of 2,000ha on the previous year. Since the 2010 baseline, the area of woodland has increased at a mean rate of 2,800ha per year. This compares to a mean rate in the 5 years prior to that of 2,600ha per year. Increase in this Area of Woodland Indicator includes woodland created from all measured sources and is reported on an annual basis.



#### B. Hectares of Woodland Created (Gross) –Quarterly Updated

Area of Woodland Created with Support from English Woodland Grant Scheme (EWGS) and Countryside Stewardship Incentives: each is part of the Rural Development Programme for England.


This measure provides quarterly figures on the contribution to the Area of Woodland Headline Indicator of woodland creation supported by the Rural Development Programme (RDP) delivered by Forest Services. Figures for 2015/16 are based on payment claims made under England Woodland Grant Scheme and Countryside Stewardship. Most new woods are planted between late autumn and early spring so it is normal for there to be little woodland creation recorded April to September.

Reports for this indicator are published as at 31 March and 30 September each year. The most recent report as at 30 September 2015 is as follows:

Forecast for 2015/16 at 30 September 2015: **Net cost of £82.12 per hectare** compared to the indicative aim of £79.20 per hectare.

The forecast cost is slightly greater than we wanted but within tolerance limits. Due to the adverse weather conditions in the north of the country in last quarter of 2014/15, replanting and other forest maintenance operations were delayed until the first quarter of 2015/16. The delay in cost in 2014/15 was one of the factors in having a significantly lower unit cost than plan in 2014/15; an outturn of £36.62 for that year.

The indicative aim for the cost per hectare of managing the Public Forest Estate has increased in 2015/16 to £79.20 per hectare. The upward adjustment compared to previous years, reflects Forestry Commission England corporate overhead charges now allocated to Forest Enterprise England. The inclusion of these costs better reflects the total cost of managing the estate. The costs are full funded by the FC and so do not change the overall cost to Defra.



## **Customer Service**

Position at 31 December 2015: 615 private businesses and individuals.

The indicator has begun to show some positive net growth in the number of businesses and individuals. Additionally some of the major business partnerships on the Public Forest Estate, such as <u>Forest Holidays</u>, have grown appreciably in recent years; offering both recreation opportunities and employment. As an example, since opening in May 2013, about 60 full time or part time jobs have been provided at the new Forest Holidays cabins site at <u>Blackwood Forest</u> in Hampshire.
