EXPORT OF ZOOLOGICAL ANIMALS IN THE ORDERS CARNIVORA, CHIROPTERA, DERMOPTERA, EDENTATA, HYRACOIDEA, INSECTIVORA, LARGOMORPHA, MARSUPIALA AND RODENTIA FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM TO SINGAPORE

NOTES FOR THE GUIDANCE OF THE OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN AND EXPORTER

IMPORTANT

These notes provide guidance to Official Veterinarians (OV) and exporters. The NFG should have been issued to you together with export certificate 8128EHC. The NFG should not be read as a standalone document but in conjunction with certificate 8128EHC. We strongly suggest that exporters obtain full details of the importing country's requirements from the veterinary authorities in the country concerned, or their representatives in the UK, in advance of each consignment.

1. SCOPE OF THE CERTIFICATE

Export health certificate 8128EHC may be used for the export of zoological animals and birds in the orders carnivora, chiroptera, dermoptera, edentata, hyracoidea, insectivora, largomorpha, marsupiala and rodentia from the United Kingdom to Singapore.

2. CERTIFICATION BY AN OFFICIAL VETERINARIAN (OV)

This certificate may be signed by an Official Veterinarian appointed by the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra), Scottish Government, Welsh Government, or an Authorised Veterinary Inspector (AVI) appointed by the Department of Agriculture, Environment and Rural Affairs, Northern Ireland (DAERA), who is an Official Veterinarian (OV) on the appropriate panel for export purposes, or who holds the appropriate Official Controls Qualification (Veterinary)(OCQ(V)) authorisation.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{OVs}}\xspace/\ensuremath{\mathsf{AVIs}}\xspace$ should sign and stamp the certificate with the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{OV}}\xspace/\ensuremath{\mathsf{AVIs}}\xspace$ stamp in any colour <code>OTHER THAN BLACK</code>.

A certified copy of the completed certificate must be sent to the issuing office (in GB - APHA, Customer Service Centre, Carlisle and in the case of Northern Ireland to the local DAERA office) within seven days of signature.

The OV/AVI should keep a copy for his/her own records.

3. **IDENTIFICATION**

Section I refers. The table must be completed as specified in the 8128EHC. Each animal must be individually identified with an International Standards Organisation (ISO) compliant microchip (transponder), and the site of implantation and the identification number of each animal must be recorded on the export health certificate. The identity of the animal must be confirmed by reading the microchip each time a treatment, vaccination or test is performed. The microchip number must be recorded on all test results (if applicable) and treatment records.

4. IMPORT PERMIT

An import permit should be obtained from Singapore's government authority.

5. C.I.T.E.S

This certificate does not provide exemption from other legislation laid down for the protection or conservation of certain wild species, e.g. the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species (C.I.T.E.S.). 6. NOTIFIABLE DISEASE CLEARANCE

Official Veterinarians may certify paragraph IV. a) on behalf of the Department provided that written authority to do so has been obtained from the Animal and Plant Health Agency - Customer Service Centre (APHA - CSC) in Carlisle or DAERA in Belfast on form 618NDC.

7. **PREMISES DISEASE CLEARANCE**

Paragraphs IV d) refers. These paragraphs may be certified on the basis of the OV's awareness of the controls in place at the zoo. This should be supported as necessary by physical inspection of the animal(s) for export and examination of relevant documentation and/or records including commercial documentation, veterinary statements and valid declarations. If necessary the OV must obtain a written assurance from the owner/exporter in order to support certification of these paragraphs. The declarations should not be attached to the health certificate, but should be retained by the OV for record purposes.

8. Clinical examination

Paragraph IV f) refers. The examination should consist of visual inspection, supported as necessary by clinical examination, laboratory reports, and pathological examination of any animals in contact with the animals for export.

Paragraph IV g) refers. **ORDER Rodentia ONLY** in addition to the above clinical examination, this examination will extend to clinical signs for Hantaan virus/Korean haemorrhagic fever. The examination should be conducted at the same level of scrutiny as mentioned above.

9. Welfare

Welfare conditions during transport are laid down by Council Regulation EC 1/2005, implemented in England by The Welfare of Animals (Transport) (England) Order 2006, and parallel legislation in Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland.

Exporters must comply with the British welfare laws relating to the export of animals. If transported by air, animals should be transported in accordance with International Air Transport Association (IATA) standards.
