from fire.

lifestyle. But could put you at a higher risk of fire. Safety awareness should not stop when you get home.

Here are some basic survival tips:

- Don't leave cooking unattended. And take extra care when frying with oil as this is an extremely common cause of fire. If one does occur NEVER put water on it as it will turn into a fireball.
- Take extra care when smoking inside especially if you are drunk or on drugs. Don't smoke in bed and make sure you've extinguished your cigarette properly before you go to sleep.

unattended. Always remember to extinguish them properly before going to sleep.

- **Don't overload plug sockets and** equipment, such as hair straighteners, blow dryers and mobile phone chargers, when not in use.
- Secure portable heaters up against a wall, so they don't fall over. Keep them away from curtains and furnishings and never dry clothes on them.
- Fit a smoke alarm on each level of the property and test it weekly. Remember, it's your only warning and could save you precious time in your escape.

Make sure Outand your housemates know the quickest way out in the event of fire and consider an alternative route in case your usual one is blocked.

> • If a fire starts get out, stay out and dial 999.

## Know your rights:

In all properties the landlord must:

Ensure gas appliances are installed and maintained annually by a corgi-registered plumber.

Maintain wiring and electrical appliances they provide to ensure they are safe to use.

Make sure any furniture and furnishings they provide meet the fire resistance regulations.
