# 1. Introduction

The 2014 to 2020 European Structural and Investment Funds bring the European Regional Development Fund, European Social Fund and part of the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development together into a single European Union Structural and Investment Funds Growth Programme for England supporting the key growth priorities of innovation, research and development, support for small and medium sized enterprises, low carbon, skills, employment, and social inclusion.

The Government has confirmed that it will guarantee funding for ERDF projects that are contracted by the end of 2020.

All contracted ERDF projects must be completed by the end of the programme period, 30 June 2023. Each application for ERDF will be required to demonstrate that it delivers good value for money and domestic strategic priorities.

The funds are managed by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government for the European Regional Development Fund, Department for Work and Pensions for the European Social Fund and the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs for the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development. These Departments are the managing authorities for each Fund. In London, the Greater London Authority acts as an intermediate body for the European Regional Development Fund and European Social Fund programmes. In some other areas, intermediate bodies are being designated by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government and the Department for Work and Pensions to perform the following tasks:

- Input into project calls in respect of local development needs (with reference to ESI Funds Strategies); and
- Assessment of applications against certain selection criteria in relation to fit with local priorities in respect of the European Regional Development Fund and European Social Fund.

The managing authorities and intermediate bodies work closely with local partners on ESI Funds sub-committees in each local enterprise partnership area. Partners on these sub-committees provide:

- Practical advice and information to the managing authorities to assist in the preparation of local plans that contribute towards operational programme priorities and targets;
- Local intelligence to the managing authorities (or intermediate bodies where designated) in the development of project calls that reflect operational programme and local development needs as well as match funding opportunities; and

• Advice on local economic growth conditions and opportunities within the context of the operational programme and the local European Structural and Investment Funds strategy to aid the managing authorities' (or intermediate bodies where designated) assessments at outline and full application stage.

This call is issued by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government and invites outline applications in respect of the European Regional Development Fund for England 2014 to 2020.

# 2 Call Context

On behalf of the national Growth Programme Board, the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (the managing authority) invites applications seeking European Regional Development Fund support under:

### Priority Axis 1 Promoting Research and Innovation

### **Investment Priorities:**

- **1a** enhancing research and innovation infrastructure and capacities to develop research and innovation excellence, and promoting centres of competence, in particular those of European interest
- **1b** promoting business investment in research and innovation

- developing links and synergies between enterprises, research and development centres and the Higher Education sector, in particular promoting investment in product and service development, technology transfer, social innovation, ecoinnovation, public service applications, demand stimulation, networking, clusters and open innovation through smart specialisation

- supporting technological and applied research, pilot lines, early product validation actions, advance manufacturing capabilities and first production, in particular in key enabling technologies and diffusion of general purpose technologies.

The European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme for England 2014 to 2020 sets out how the European Regional Development Fund will focus on investment to support economic growth and job creation. Priority Axis 1 of the operational programme aims to improve how small and medium sized enterprises commercialise research and how they collaborate with research institutions.

The 2017 <u>UK Industrial Strategy</u> sets out the government's ambition to make the UK the world's most innovative economy. The government has committed to reaching

2.4% of GDP investment in R&D by 2027 and to reach 3% of GDP in the longer term. Currently, R&D expenditure is unevenly distributed across England and focused on the South East and East of England, which accounts for 37% of total UK R&D expenditure. Large firms continue to innovate more than SMEs across the UK<sup>1</sup>. Whilst disparity has been decreasing in recent years, SMEs in England continue to introduce fewer new products and processes than their European competitors and it is essential that they innovate more. These challenges will need to be tackled in order to achieve Industrial Strategy goals.

Evidence also suggests that most of the social value of innovation relates to diffusion and adoption by other firms, which increases productivity. However, despite having a strong track record of innovation, the UK lags behind competitors on knowledge diffusion. We need to strengthen our ability to commercialise the ideas and discoveries made here, which will otherwise be exploited overseas.

Important guiding principles for the selection of ERDF operations within Priority Axis 1 will therefore include:

Any application for funding will be required to clearly demonstrate that it provides good value for money and supports the <u>UK Industrial Strategy goals</u>, the Business <u>Productivity Review and other</u> domestic strategic priorities, including measures to support the national target for increasing investment in R&D to 2.4% of GDP by 2027.

Applications must meet the requirement of, and make a meaningful contribution to, the delivery of the relevant Priority Axis of the <u>European Regional Development Fund</u> <u>Operational Programme</u> and where appropriate should reflect how such support will aim to improve productivity levels within small and medium sized enterprises.

Applications should demonstrate:

- a close fit with the policy priorities set out in "Smart Specialisation in England". Elements that in the document refer to outdated policies should be discounted and relevant elements of the Industrial Strategy, in particular support for the four <u>Grand Challenges</u>, be considered in their place;
- an understanding of evolving national science, innovation and research strategies, including ensuring that national science, research and innovation capabilities impact on local growth;
- sound evidence, developed by a partnership of businesses, the research base and public sector organisations, of the existing strengths and future potential of sectors and technologies prioritised for support within a local area;
- evidence that these partners working collaboratively have shown the leadership required to prioritise investments in a genuinely limited number of sectors and

technologies ensuring that investments are made with sufficient scale and depth to create significant impact on prioritised sectors and technologies; and

• good arrangements are in place to monitor and evaluate the impact of investments and on-going systems are in place to review priorities.

In addition, applications will be expected to meet identified local development needs, as expressed in the scope of this call and as set out in the <u>Tees Valley</u> European Structural and Investment Funds strategy, as well as the Local Industrial Strategy where it has been published.

Applicants are advised to familiarise themselves with the detail of the operational programme, local European Structural and Investment Funds strategy and the relevant documentation listed in sections 5 through to 8 *prior to* submitting an outline application.

# 3. Scope of the Call

### 1. Scope

This call invites outline applications which support the delivery of Priority Axis 1 of the European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme and respond to the local development need set out in the <u>Tees Valley</u> European Structural and Investment Funds strategy.

Indicative fund allocation	Indicatively, through this call the managing authority expects to allocate up to £4.9m.
	The managing authority reserves the right to invite to full application (and subsequently approve) projects that have a cumulative value that is higher or lower than this indicative allocation, subject to the volume and quality of proposals received.
	There is no indicative allocation of European Regional Development Fund funding between capital and revenue activity, both capital and revenue is eligible dependent on the nature of activities / investment priorities set out in the call.

European Regional Development Fund investment is intended to make a significant impact on local growth. Applications are expected to demonstrate appropriate scale and impact.
The managing authority does not intend to allocate less than £500,00 European Regional Development Fund to any single project. Consequently, new projects with a total value of less than £833,334 will not normally be supported under this call. Applications for less than £500,000 ERDF for extensions to existing projects will be considered.
Projects should plan to complete delivery of project activity by the end of June 2023; however, the managing authority reserves the right to vary this date.
The England European Regional Development Fund operational programme operates on a national basis. All eligible European Regional Development Fund expenditure must benefit organisations located in England. Revenue projects should predominantly support businesses based within the local enterprise partnership area of this call.
This call is for projects in the Tees Valley LEP area, covering Transition Category of Region. Proposals should fit with the focus of the Tees Valley Strategic Economic Plan; Tees Valley ESIF Strategy; and UK Industrial Strategy Building a Britain Fit for the Future Please note: Value for Money and alignment with Strategic Domestic Priorities, including the 2017 Industrial Strategy, (or any later publication that amends or supersedes that), will form a key part of the assessment and appraisal of all applications. Therefore proposals should clearly articulate and demonstrate how activities align with domestic strategic priorities and offer good value for money.

### 2. Local development need

Projects must deliver activity which directly contributes to the objectives of Priority Axis 1 of the operational programme, one or more of the relevant Investment Priorities and meet the local development need expressed in the table below.

### Local Development Need

Local growth priorities:

### Local growth priorities:

Tees Valley has a total population of 672,500 and offers 293,000 jobs across 17,230 businesses, of which 99.5% are micro, small and medium sized enterprises (SMEs). The economy generates gross value add (GVA) of over £13.1 billion per annum.

Tees Valley has world class expertise in a number of key sectors which are vital to the health of the northern and wider UK economies. The area has a particular concentration of employment in process, chemicals and the energy sector where employment levels are more than double the national average, as well as in the larger advanced manufacturing and healthcare sectors, where employment levels are around one and a half times the national average. There is also a relatively high employment concentration in the energy & circular economy sector.

While some sectors, such as logistics, business and professional services and creative, culture and leisure are under-represented when compared with the national average, they provide a significant number of employment opportunities and are all sectors that are forecast to experience strong growth nationally over the next 10 years. There is potential for Tees Valley to build upon niche specialisms within these sectors to capture a larger share of growth and boost overall employment levels.

Only by creating new products and processes and exploring new technology solutions, can Tees Valley grow its business base, export expertise and provide new jobs for its residents, making it a driver of the goal to create 25,000 new jobs in Tees Valley by 2026. Investing in innovation will help the area live up to its historic reputation for being at the forefront of invention. The Tees Valley ESIF Strategy outlines a key aim for the region to: *"provide businesses with the*"

necessary support incentives to enable them to start-up, locate, innovate and grow in Tees Valley, export products and services across the globe and be resilient to economic shocks".

Tees Valley faces obstacles in continuing to build an innovative economy such as available and appropriate finance (there is a gap in equity, angel and grant provision for businesses at Technology Stage Readiness levels 4 to 7, who need funds to develop, demonstrate and scale up), incubation space to test new products, accessible support to help SMEs to innovate and barriers to collaborating within and across industries. Our rates of commercialisation (with less than one in five Tees Valley firms introducing new or improved products or services) and start up (at around two-thirds of the national average) are low.

The Tees Valley ESIF Strategy identifies crucial actions to overcome these barriers as: "provide direct support for innovation for enterprises; enhance business capacity for innovation support in enterprises; and support for innovation collaboration, particularly across sectors".

The Tees Valley ESIF Strategy is based upon the principles of Smart Specialisation, focusing on those sectors where Tees Valley has a competitive advantage, namely advanced manufacturing, process, digital and healthcare. The vision is for Tees Valley to play a major part in developing, manufacturing and delivering technologies that benefit the whole United Kingdom, particularly in supporting the move to a low carbon economy. In order to do so, Tees Valley will provide local businesses with bespoke, flexible support and access to an internationally connected, multi-disciplinary innovation network, enhancing collaboration both within and between sectors, and between research entities, SMEs and large enterprises.

The evidence base for the Tees Valley Local Industrial Strategy has been developed in 2018/19, with a focus on the opportunities and challenges to increase productivity in the region. This is centred around the nationally defined 'foundations of productivity': people, place, infrastructure, business environment and ideas.

Tees Valley faces some significant challenges in relation to productivity. Economic output and productivity per capita sit at around 70% of the national average, and productivity of Tees Valley businesses is around 90% of the UK average.

The 'ideas' foundation is a critical driver of productivity, focused on innovation and R&D. This includes:

- Improving processes/introducing new machinery to drive efficiency
- Commercialising innovation to generate spin out businesses and employment opportunities
- Developing new products to create demand
- Refining and improving existing products to establish a competitive advantage.

R&D expenditure across the Tees Valley business base is relatively low compared to other parts of the country, and the region typically scores below LEP averages across a range of innovation indicators. Whilst there are pockets of strength in some key sectors (e.g. Mechanical Engineering and Chemicals) there remains an innovation challenge in Tees Valley.

### Scope of activity

There is scope to support and promote innovation across all sectors; however proposals should primarily focus on the priority sectors identified in the Tees Valley Innovation Strategy. Applicants will need to demonstrate that proposed projects do not duplicate existing national provisions, demonstrating in particular how operations will complement and align with smart specialisation.

Outline Applications should express how proposals will contribute towards the delivery of the priorities set out in the government's <u>UK Industrial Strategy Building</u> <u>a Britain Fit for the Future</u>

Applicants should also refer to the Tees Valley Economic Assessment 2018 for further analysis of the Tees Valley economy as it relates to delivery of the Industrial Strategy <u>https://teesvalley-ca.gov.uk/wp-content/uploads/2019/03/Tees-Valley-Economic-Assessment-2018.pdf</u>

ERDF investment through this call will focus on:

Revenue activity, particularly the provision of intensive support leading to an increase in innovative capacity for new and established businesses innovating in smart specialisation areas.

In addition consideration will be given to:

Capital investment should provide improved innovation facilities / business space to enable research, development and innovation, where robust evidence of market failure is provided, and where this investment is fundamentally linked to the provision of intensive support to new and established innovating businesses.

**PLEASE NOTE**: Capital investment must demonstrate clear and explicit linkages to the provision of intensive support to innovating businesses and capital works must be supported by high quality and relevant revenue support.

### Local priorities:

Proposals should demonstrate alignment with local development need and priorities including:

### **Investment Priority 1a**

• Proposals should meet one of the key priorities in the Tees Valley Innovation Strategy to *"create, develop and enhance open access technology centres, to promote specialist technical and business support to*  commercialise research...with "innovation centres that offer practical support, pilot facilities and space to trial and commercialise new products and processes"

- Proposals should provide suitable and appropriate innovation space / facilities / equipment and/or demonstration space (often non lab-based testing facilities) that SMEs/start-ups in Tees Valley can access (this could be either through creating or enhancing existing innovation centres and could include infrastructure which is *directly* related to such innovation space or the creation of demonstration space in Tees Valley, suitable for piloting new products or processes)
- Proposals should meet the clear sector focus of the Tees Valley Innovation Strategy: Advanced Manufacturing (including Advanced Materials, Low Carbon, Engineering Design and Offshore); Process (including Carbon Capture and Storage, Sustainable Chemicals and Bio-refining); Healthcare (including Biologics and Digital Care); Digital (including Animation and Visualisation)
- Proposals should align to and complement the 'Key Innovation Assets' and 'Key Future Investments' set out in the Tees Valley Innovation Strategy
- All proposals should demonstrate evidence of demand, and in the case of new innovation and/or demonstration space, proposals should demonstrate current supply does not meet the proposed needs and demonstrate that new build is required, rather than conversion or refurbishment of existing premises
- Proposals should consider the potential impact upon current innovation space
- Proposals should align with the Smart Specialisation Strategy for England, 2014
- Proposals should fit with the focus of the Tees Valley ESIF Strategy, Strategic Economic Plan and Business Compass (the Tees Valley Growth Hub)

### **Investment priority 1b**

- Priority will be given to applications aligned to the innovation priorities set out in the Tees Valley ESIF Strategy, and focused on priority sectors
- <u>Innovation Exchange</u> interventions are sought to enable Tees Valley businesses (including support for young, fast growing companies) to access knowledge base expertise to develop an idea, concept or product, through a flexible, structured approach. A range of delivery approaches may be appropriate, including (but not limited to): using academic and professional expertise to support graduates to deliver innovation exchange; knowledge transfer programmes, particularly linked to priority growth sectors and the technologies set out in "Smart Specialisation for England" Example interventions could include those that embed best practice in design and innovation management, stimulate and embed the uptake of new research in businesses, enhance new product development capability and encourage commercialisation in new markets
- <u>Innovation Mentoring</u> interventions are sought, which are designed to help SMEs to access intensive innovation support through the use of mentors

who will help them develop their innovation to the point of becoming investor ready. A range of deliver approaches may be appropriate, including (but not limited to): using experienced experts in their field who can provide interim resource for Tees Valley SMEs, to allow them to secure, and help prepare for, significant growth finance for an extended period; leadership and management development, preparing business cases and advising on how to engage the market.

Example interventions may depend on the type, form and stage of the business in question, and could take a number of forms.

- <u>Collaborative research and development</u> interventions are sought that are designed to foster collaboration and innovation in Tees Valley, either across sectors or between knowledge institutions and groups of businesses, to address obstacles to business growth and underpin key sector competitiveness. Interventions may include scale-up projects, however should ensure that there is no duplication with existing scale-up provision in the region, including <u>LEAP50</u>
- Applicants should consider: how they will identify and access appropriate innovation support to meet individual company needs, at the same time as encouraging more inter-firm collaboration related to innovation; how they will augment the innovation support offered within Tees Valley by Business Compass and Innovate Tees Valley; how they will deliver a consistent experience across Tees Valley, including consistent branding with Business Compass and data sharing with public sector partners in Tees Valley; how they will complement the wider innovation ecosystem (including universities, research centres and existing/emerging business networks focused on innovation) operating across Tees Valley, and develop and maintain a current knowledge of national innovation support, including Innovate UK funded support.

Also **particularly encouraged** are projects which can deliver and contribute towards the following output targets:

- C1 enterprises receiving support,
- C2 enterprises receiving grants,
- C3 enterprises receiving financial support other than grants,
- C7 Private Investment (non-grants),
- C25 researchers working in improved facilities,
- C26 enterprises cooperating with research institutions.

The focus of activity under this priority axis is improving commercialisation of new or enhanced products or services by small and medium sized enterprises, whether through increased investment or better collaborations, but this requires the involvement of a much wider group including larger firms in cooperation with their supply
chains and other small and medium sized enterprises,

higher education institutions, public sector institutions and research centres, Catapult Centres and other centres of excellence.
Projects under this investment priority, including pilot or demonstrator activity, may include capital spend where this is integral to their delivery. This may include enhancements to premises or new build, equipment and facilities. Where new premises are to be built, then there must be clear evidence that demand is not met by existing supply.

# 4. Required Outputs under this Call

Applicants will need to demonstrate how the eligible activity, funded by the European Regional Development Fund will achieve the programme-level outputs for Priority Axis 1.

For projects proposing to deliver activity against more than one investment priority, the appropriate outputs should be selected. Project will be required to report on, and evidence, the achievement of the outputs separately under each investment priority.

The managing authority expects the level of outputs proposed within outline applications to be realistic and achievable and to deliver good value for money. The application should clearly state the methodology used to determine the levels of outputs proposed.

Projects will only be supported if they demonstrate good value for money. An important consideration when assessing value for money is the level of European Regional Development Fund outputs that the project would deliver.

The managing authority has not set specific output targets for this call and does not publish average or expected unit costs.

The local European Structural and Investment Fund strategy for each local enterprise partnership area includes details of the local, notional European Regional Development Fund allocation to each priority axis and the type and number of European Regional Development Fund outputs that are expected in return for this investment.

All operations will be required to report regularly on progress toward achievement of targets. This will need to include both quantitative and qualitative data relevant to the appropriate geographical areas. Applicants will need to explain how they will collect and record this information to maintain a fully evidenced audit trail. It should be noted that if an operation fails to deliver contracted outputs, a performance penalty may apply.

# 5. Application Process and Prioritisation Methodology

There are two stages to the European Regional Development Fund application process:

- Outline application and, if successful
- Full application

Acceptance of an outline application to progress to full application stage does not in any way indicate or constitute an offer of European Regional Development Fund grant.

Applicants must fully complete the <u>outline application</u> which will be assessed by the managing authority against all of the national <u>selection criteria</u> except where an intermediate body has been designated to assess against some of the selection criteria. Where an intermediate body has been designated to undertake delegated tasks, the intermediate body will undertake the assessment against the selection criteria in relation to fit with local priorities.

Outline applications will be assessed in two stages, Gateway assessment and Core assessment.

The Gateway assessment is undertaken by the managing authorities and considers:

- (i) Applicant eligibility;
- (ii) Activity and expenditure eligibility; and
- (iii) Fit with the National operational programme and the local development need set out in section 2.

Applications that fail the Gateway assessment undertaken by the managing authority will be rejected. Applications which pass the Gateway assessment will then be assessed by the managing authority in relation to all Core assessment criteria.

In areas where an intermediate body has been designated, the intermediate body will assess the application against the Local strategic fit assessment criteria.

The intermediate body will also provide advice to the managing authority to assist the managing authority to make its assessment against the following Core selection criteria:

- Value for money; and
- Deliverability.

Having assessed projects against these criteria the relevant local enterprise partnership area European Structural and Investment Funds sub-committee will

advise the managing authority or intermediate body as relevant on the contribution to local economic growth conditions and opportunities within the context of the operational programme and local European Structural and Investment Funds strategy to aid the managing authority's assessments (at outline and full application stage).

Having concluded their assessments the managing authority and the intermediate body will prioritise the applications they wish to proceed based on their assessment against their respective selection criteria. Only projects that the managing authority and the intermediate body each agree should proceed, based on their respective core selection criteria, will be invited to submit a full application. Subsequently only those full applications that the managing authority and the intermediate body each agree should proceed, based on their respective selection criteria, will be approved.

Please note that the managing authority's decision is final and there are no appeals. # 6. General Information

### 1. National Eligibility Rules

When developing an application, applicants must refer to the <u>National Eligibility</u> <u>Rules</u> setting out the requirements of the 2014 to2020 European Regional Development Fund Programme. It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that the National Eligibility Rules are adhered to both at application stage and following approval. Failure to do so can lead to financial penalties leading to recovery of up to 100% of the grant value. If in doubt on any of the requirements, applicants are strongly advised to seek specialist advice.

European Regional Development Fund eligibility rules apply to **all** project spend within the eligible costs, including match funding.

The European Regional Development Fund is governed by European regulations and national rules. Applicants are advised to familiarise themselves with the relevant documentation, (Section 8 Key Document refers) prior to submitting an outline application. If successful at the full application stage, applicants will enter into <u>a</u> <u>Funding agreement</u> and must abide by the standard terms and conditions contained therein. Once a funding agreement has been issued it should be signed and returned within 30 days, unless otherwise agreed with the managing authority. Applicants are therefore strongly advised to read these terms and conditions to ensure that they are able to enter into such an agreement prior to responding to the call.

### 2. Eligible applicants

Section 4 of the <u>National Eligibility Rules</u> sets out who is eligible to apply. Financial Due Diligence checks will be undertaken on non-public sector applicants that are successful at the outline application stage. Checks will be carried out following notification of a successful outline application and may exclude applicants from further consideration. These checks will include assessment of the applicant's financial standing including ability to deal with cost overruns, the ability to cash flow a project in arrears and absorb a financial irregularity.

Applicants must be legally constituted at the point of signing a Funding agreement. If the application is approved the applicant organisation will enter into a legally binding Funding agreement and therefore will carry the liability for ensuring that the terms and conditions of the Funding agreement are met.

If there is more than one organisation applying for the funds, a lead organisation must be selected to become the applicant (and grant recipient) with the remaining organisation(s) acting as delivery partner(s). In this situation the applicant would be responsible and liable for the delivery partner(s) and ensuring the project is operating compliantly.

During the application process the managing authority will consider the applicant's track record, both positive and negative. If the applicant has been involved in the delivery of previous European grants and any irregularities have been identified, the managing authority will expect to see what steps have been taken to ensure that the risk of further irregularities in the future is mitigated. It is acknowledged that some organisations will be new to European Structural and Investment Funds funding and will not have a track record.

### 3. Contribution rate and match funding

European Regional Development Fund investment must not be used to replace existing funding sources. European Regional Development Fund investment must enable activity to take place that would not otherwise happen or to increase the scope, scale or intensity of activity. The level of European Regional Development Fund awarded will be the minimum in order for the project to proceed The maximum contribution rate is 60% of the total eligible project costs subject to State Aid regulations.

The remaining 40% or more must come from other eligible sources as specified under section 6 of the National Eligibility Rules. During the application process applicants will need to satisfy the managing authority that they have, or are able to put in place eligible match funding for the balance of costs. Other EU funds cannot be used as a source of match funding.

European Regional Development Fund investment is limited by State Aid regulations and where the award of European Regional Development Fund would constitute State Aid the European Regional Development Fund grant rate may fall below the 60% maximum.

European Regional Development Fund is paid quarterly in arrears and expenditure must be defrayed prior to the submission of any grant claims. Applicants may be asked to demonstrate how they are able to cash flow the operation.

### 4. **Project timescales**

Projects approved through this call will normally be expected to:

- Submit a detailed and complete full application within three months of formal selection at outline stage. Projects which fail to meet this deadline may be deselected;
- Commence delivery within the agreed timescale as stated in the Grant Funding Agreement; and
- Have completed the delivery of project activity by the end of June 2023.

### 5. **Project extensions**

Existing grant recipients whose projects:

- Do not involve the direct development of premises or infrastructure; and
- Address the priorities set out in section 2.

may apply for a second phase of delivery – this will be expected to be in the same form as the current project (i.e. a genuine continuation of activity) but may reflect improvement/some change to reflect experience of the first phase of the project. The application must be made using the standard outline application form. Where changes to the first phase of the project are significant, these should be presented as a new application. The relevant Growth Delivery Team will apply judgment in considering the significance of any change. Applications in respect of the development of premises or other infrastructure should be presented as new projects, this includes applications that have a link to an existing European Regional Development Fund project e.g. further phases of the development of sites or premises.

**Please note -** extensions to existing projects will be assessed against the criteria set out in this call in the same way as 'new' projects. There is no guarantee that extensions will be selected. Extension requests that do not meet the requirements set out in this call will be rejected. The applicant's track record and the performance of existing contracts will be taken into account during the assessment process.

### 6. Capital projects

In developing the budget for the outline application, applicants seeking European Regional Development Fund to support a capital project should note that:

- New build projects will normally be expected to achieve the Building Research Establishment Environmental Assessment Method (BREEAM) rating of 'excellent'; however BREEAM 'very good' will be accepted where this is the maximum feasible standard;
- Refurbishment projects will normally be expected to achieve the BREEAM rating of 'Very Good'; and
- Infrastructure projects will normally be expected to achieve the Civil Engineering Environmental Quality Assessment rating of 'Very Good'.

### 7. Cross Cutting Themes / Horizontal Principles

All applications selected as a result of this call will be required to demonstrate how the Cross Cutting Themes have been addressed in the project design and development. Cross Cutting Themes for European Regional Development Fund are 'equality and anti-discrimination' and 'sustainable development'. Further information is available in Section 11 of the European Regional Development Fund Operational Programme.

Projects seeking funding under Priority Axis 1 will be expected to demonstrate measures that promote greater female participation in associated sectors.

Physical infrastructure such as incubation space must take into account the needs of disabled people as regards access and use. Buildings must meet minimum accessibility requirements. Where possible, accessibility toolkits and undertaking pre- and post-build access audits should be used to add quality to investments.

### 8. Additionality, duplication and displacement

Additionality is a core principle of European Regional Development Funding. Applicants must be able to demonstrate that the activity paid for out of European Regional Development Funding adds value to new or existing activity.

European Regional Development Funding cannot support activities that duplicate existing provision / services within the region.

Applications need to identify and evidence how the beneficiaries will use the service and demonstrate that the project does not displace other activity available in the market place.

### 9. State Aid and revenue generation

Applicants are required, in the outline application, to provide a view on how their proposal complies with State Aid law. Applicants must ensure that projects comply with the law on State Aid. Grant funding to any economic undertaking which is State Aid can only be awarded if it is compatible aid, in that it complies with the terms of a notified scheme under the General Block Exemption Regulation (EU) 651/2014.

Only if this is not possible should Applicants use the De Minimis Regulation or 'no aid'. <u>Guidance for grant recipients</u>, explaining more about State Aid, is available; it is important that Applicants take responsibility for understanding the importance of the State Aid rules and securing their full compliance with them throughout the project, if it is selected into the programme.

The managing authority is not able to give legal advice on State Aid. It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that the operation is State Aid compliant.

### **10. Procurement**

All costs claimed by the applicant (grant recipient and / or delivery partner(s)) must be recovered on an actual cost basis. Other costs must be procured in line with National (including <u>Public Procurement Regulation 2015</u>) and EU regulations. Procurement will be subject to audit and verification and any irregularity will result in a financial penalty of up to 100% of the grant paid. Robust and transparent procurement is required to ensure that grant recipients:

- Consider value for money;
- Maximise efficient use of public money; and
- Maintain competitiveness and fairness across the EU.

It is **strongly recommended** that applicants seek and follow legal advice in respect of procurement requirements. Procurement irregularities remain the most substantive cause of error and clawback of grants.

## 7. Support

Please note that this is a competitive call and to preserve impartiality the managing authority and, where appropriate, the intermediate body are unable to enter into correspondence with applicants over their outline application. Completed outline applications must be submitted via **email** to the address in Section 7. Applicants are asked to quote the call reference and project name in the subject line of your email as this will greatly assist the managing authority.

Outline application forms not received by the deadline will not be assessed. Outline applications which are not fully completed will be excluded.

The managing authority will normally acknowledge receipt of your application by email.

For this call applications will normally be required to **commence delivery / activity within three months** of the award of a funding agreement.
