

Community Life Survey: Formal Volunteering

This factsheet summarises official statistics on formal volunteering at least once a month and at least once in the last 12 months by adults (16+) in England, based on data from the 2018-19 Community Life Survey

Formal Volunteering is defined here as giving unpaid help through clubs or organisations.

22% of adults formally volunteered at least once a month

36% of adults formally volunteered at least once in the last year

These rates are lower than in 2013-14



Monthly volunteering was similar among men and women, but women were more likely to have volunteered once in the last year

People living in Rural areas were more likely to volunteer formally...






People who were economically inactive were more likely to have volunteered monthly than those in employment or who were unemployed...



Around 1 in 4 living in either the South West or the South East volunteered at least once a month compared to around 1 in 6 in the North East...



People living in the least deprived areas were more likely to volunteer than those living in the most deprived areas...
