PROVISION OF REQUESTED INFORMATION

Thank you for your request for information varroa numbers which we received on 09 January 2019. Your request has been handled under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOI).

The information you requested and our response is detailed below:

'I know the NBU receives samples from beekeepers, and I was wondering if you have long term data about Varroa numbers, not just in Wales but UK wide?'

The introduction of 'The Bee Diseases and Pests Control Order 2006', revoked the listing of Varroa as a statutory notifiable pest across England and Wales. Routine screening for the presence of Varroa was replaced by the Exotic Pests Surveilance Programme, focussing attention on surveillance for the exotic pests Aethina tumida (Small Hive Beetle) and Tropilaelaps spp, however, the NBU continues to offer advice on the monitoring, treatment and control of Varroa as a significant pest of honeybees. Data on Varroa resistance (to pyrethroid medicines) is published here: <u>http://www.nationalbeeunit.com/public/BeeDiseases/vrtReport.cfm?year=2009</u> (2009 and prior).

We have not collected data on mite counts routinely since this period. The current inspection regime does not require Inspectors to record the presence/absence of Varroa (and other minor disorders), however, data is collected where clinical infections are problematic for the colony, based on the judgement of an Bee Inspector.

There are several publications available on Varroa spread, notably: Thompson, H.M., Brown, M.A., Ball, R.F. and Bew, M.H., (2002) First report of *Varroa destructor* resistance to pyrethroids in the UK. Apidologie, 33(4), pp.357-366. (<u>https://hal.archives-ouvertes.fr/hal-00891907/document</u>).
