Release of Information

Further to our letter of 26 November 2019, I am now able to respond in full to your request for the following information:

- '1. Between the dates June 3rd 2019 and August 1st 2019, did the Ministry of Defence have any contact with the Dutch Cultural Heritage Agency and/or Dutch Ministry of Education, Culture and Science regarding allegations that Sovereign Immune Royal Navy wrecks have been subjected to illicit salvage by divers and/or vessels and/or trawlers?
2. If such communications have taken place what was the result of the contacts?
3. Between the dates June 3rd 2019 and August 1st 2019, please supply any records in any medium which mention, HM Submarines E3 and/or E5 and/or E26 and/or D2 and/or illicit salvage by Dutch divers and/or vessels and/or trawlers.'

Your enquiry has been considered to be a request for information in accordance with the Freedom of Information (FOI) Act 2000.

As explained in our interim response, a search was completed within the Ministry of Defence (MOD) and it was confirmed that some information in scope of your request that is held may fall within the scope of the qualified exemptions under Section 27(1)(a) (International Relations) and Section 31 (Law Enforcement) of the FOI Act.

Under S27(1)(a), information is exempt if its disclosure under the Act would, or would be likely to, prejudice relations between the United Kingdom and any other State. Under S31(1)(a) and (b) information is exempt if its disclosure would, or would be likely to, prejudice the prevention and detection of crime, the apprehension or prosecution of offenders and/or the administration of justice. As these are both qualified exemptions, the decision to withhold the requested information is subject to a Public Interest Test. This has

been conducted and it may assist you to understand our decision if I outline the factors that were considered.

While it is recognised that there is a long-standing high level of public interest in the management and preservation of our underwater heritage, divulging some of the information in scope of your request could impact on the UK's relationship with another State and has the potential to make the wrecks sites vulnerable to criminal activities. Consequently, it has been concluded that public interest balance favours some information being withheld under these exemptions.

The information that the MOD can provide relating to all parts of your request can be found enclosed with this letter. I should advise, however, that, as some of the information was designed for internal purposes only and not intended for public distribution, the enclosed documentation has been redacted to remove any personal information in accordance with Section 40(2) of the FOI Act. Section 40(2) applies to personal data relating to third parties. The release of personal information relating to other individuals would contravene the principles of the Data Protection Act 2018.

If you have any queries regarding the content of this letter, please contact this office in the first instance.

If you wish to complain about the handling of your request, or the content of this response, you can request an independent internal review by contacting the Information Rights Compliance team, Ground Floor, MOD Main Building, Whitehall, SW1A 2HB (e-mail CIO-FOI-IR@mod.uk). Please note that any request for an internal review should be made within 40 working days of the date of this response.

If you remain dissatisfied following an internal review, you may raise your complaint directly to the Information Commissioner under the provisions of Section 50 of the Freedom of Information Act. Please note that the Information Commissioner will not normally investigate your case until the MOD internal review process has been completed. 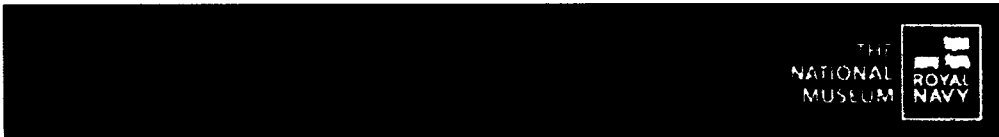

Meeting on the recovery of artefacts from sunken wrecks

2. Introduction and Context

The purpose of this meeting was to exchange information on how the Netherlands and the UK deal with the recovery of artefacts from sunken

wrecks and the protection of wrecks in general. Furthermore, ways to improve the collaboration on this subject were discussed.

3. Main topics

The new law is very strict. Key is: "look, don't touch". This makes it sometimes difficult to identify unknown wrecks and to rescue objects that are threatened by erosion. A pilot was therefore started to experiment with a broader interpretation of the law. The pilots were executed around Texel, the North Sea and the Zeeland Delta. One dive (from the North Sea pilot) took place to the E5 by diving club the Zeester. Artefacts were taken from the E5 and E26.

[REDACTED] stressed that this is UK property and it should not have been taken up.

[REDACTED] emphasized that we learned from the pilots that we should have consulted the flag state of the wrecks beforehand. Another outcome of the pilot phase is that for military wrecks the rule should always be "look, don't touch". No exceptions.

Nevertheless within the pilots that were carried out the basic rule was that objects can only be taken up in very special cases: if it is really necessary for identification or if there is a direct threat for the object. In one case the amateur divers did not obey this rule. They were strongly told this was against the agreement.

Alison Kentuck explained that if someone brings an artefact up, they should contact the Receiver of Wreck at the Maritime and Coastguard Agency. The Receiver will try to track down the owner and contact them to see what arrangements should be made

2. Context

The purpose of this meeting was to consolidate progress on the recovery of artefacts salvaged from UK wrecks, to discuss the effectiveness of current deterrents and to agree a sustainable pathway to deal with artefacts in future cases.

3. Main topics

Introduction: There was an introduction by all parties present and a brief catch-up on what has happened since the last meeting (5th June 2018). Some artefacts that had been salvaged by divers were returned to the UK in May 2019.

Correction to last meeting minutes: There was a correction to the record of the last meeting, within point '3. Main Topics' it states that 'both UK-law and Dutch law do have an age limit', this has been corrected and should state 'both UK-law and Dutch law do not have an age limit'.

Java Sea: Both the Netherlands and UK have conducted surveys on their wrecks in the SE Asia Region, both countries are working with regional authorities to ensure adequate protection is in place.

Reporting UK artefacts: When an artefact is landed in the UK the Receiver of Wrecks (RoW) should be contacted, RoW staff can be contacted through the generic email address: row@mcga.gov.uk

Summary of progress on returning UK artefacts: The group was brought up to date on the recent recovery of UK artefacts (14) with some items still outstanding. Having contacted the National Museum of the Royal Navy (NMRN), it will not be possible to recover all outstanding artefacts to the UK. It requires resource for the transportation, storage and conservation. Some artefacts require urgent intervention and there is finite resource, others are of very limited historical or emotional significance. MOD policy is that Naval artefacts should be offered to NMRN in the first instance. The NMRN have agreed that in future they would be willing to consider items of provenance. When artefacts are recovered by Dutch authorities, the British Defence attaché to the Netherlands should be contacted in the first instance by the DCHA and they will decide on their future on a case by case basis.

owned items, the UK Defence Attaché to the Netherlands should be notified and appropriate arrangements should be made to return them to the UK.
