Equipment, utensils, tools and materials for a Little Troopers club. These clubs (broken down into Early Years, KS1 and KS2) will centre around cooking, woodworking and outdoor activities. Our request also includes one year of staff costs.

In 2018, a new school block was built to accommodate increasing pupil numbers (including service children). This block includes a Food Technology room, but challenging budgets means we have been unable to fund equipment, such as cookers and utensils. We also require equipment and materials to fund a woodwork club, which will take place in the school hall. These include work-benches, tools and material.

Supporting statement by Armed Forces sponsor (PLEASE SEE NOTE 4) (No more than 1,400 characters, approx. 200 words)

The Little Troopers Club will provide valuable, extra-curricular activities for service children, predominately from families with a parent(s) serving with the high readiness airborne brigade.

This year sees elements of the brigade deployed at an unprecedented level, whether on extended overseas training exercises, or an operational tour of Afghanistan centred on the 2nd Battalion The Parachute Regiment.

Little Troopers recognises the close relationship between the school and the

service community, that is only enhanced with initiatives such as this. It recognises the effects of deployment and service life and then practically goes about delivering solutions to it. I expect the club to create a positive engagement opportunity for parents

The school has a proven track record of obtaining value for money and to measure this against the achieved effects. They are trusted to build in resilience so that projects continue after initial grants.

In the wider community, the school has contributed to supporting the Garrison, participating both in Armed Forces Covenant Fund integration projects, and commemorative services including a very successful D-Day 75 service held at the Colchester war memorial.

I fully endorse and support this application and I look forward to visiting the Club when it is fully up and running.

What are the effects on your school and the children by either exceptional mobility and/or deployment?

The turbulence caused by the continual deployment of parents affects all classes within the school and results in us having to have rigorous systems in place for pupil induction and transfer - far more than would normally be expected for other schools. These systems have been established to enable both children and parents to be quickly integrated into the life of the school and to minimise the impact of the education of the children. We have a dedicated team of staff who work with military children in order to support the emotional difficulties they can suffer when moving to a new school.

Colchester is home to 16th Air Assault Brigade which comprises multiple units on the Garrison. By definition, it is a rapid reaction force where parents can be deployed anywhere in the world at short notice. At present, we are seeing a continual flow of army families into the local area and this is putting a strain on class numbers as the school grows. With admissions operated by the Local Authority, we regularly experience army families having to put children into different schools, creating not only logistical issues but stress for those involved.

What evidence do you have that this course of action will make a difference to service children?

As always, we seek to engage with children and parents to try and understand their requirements. Parent Forums chaired by the

The clubs were well attended and feedback from parents, pupils and the staff involved was very positive. Consequently, we would like to operate these on a regular basis – at least half termly.

In terms of children's' social and emotional needs, we work closely with specialist teachers from our Local Authority and Service Pupil Premium has given the school the ability to partly fund an Inclusion Leader (whose husband is part of 16th Air Assault Brigade), who works closely with military pupils, their parents and the local MOD Welfare Support Officer.
