Thank you for your email of 3 May 2020 requesting the following information:

What procedures are currently in place for warning the public of an incoming nuclear attack on the UK?

Which bodies are responsible for issuing and implementing any orders for giving such a warning?

In the case that there are no such contingency plans in place, when, and on whose authority, such measures that were previously in place were abandoned.

We have treated your correspondence as a request for information under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

A search for the information has now been completed within the Ministry of Defence, and I can confirm that no information in scope of your request is held.

Under Section 16 of the Act (Advice and Assistance) you may find it helpful to note that, while the Ministry of Defence is the lead government department for the UK's nuclear deterrent capability and other military capabilities which may deter or defend against a nuclear ballistic missile attack, the Cabinet Office (specifically its Civil Contingencies Secretariat) is the lead department for civil contingencies. If you are not satisfied with this response or you wish to complain about any aspect of the handling of your request, then you should contact us in the first instance at the address above. Please note that any request for an internal review must be made within 40 working days of the date on which the attempt to reach informal resolution has come to an end.

If you remain dissatisfied following an internal review, you may take your complaint to the Information Commissioner under the provisions of Section 50 of the Freedom of Information Act. Please note that the Information Commissioner will not normally investigate your case until the MOD internal review process has been completed.
