THE GOOD DEED FEED...

Ending Veteran Homelessness

A team of Community members, staff, union lawyers and MPs took part in a lock-down fitness challenge to raise money for the FirstLight Trust charity.

The fund-raiser is part of the union's Ending Veteran Homelessness campaign — one of the priority campaigns chosen at Community's conference last year.

Leading up to Armed Forces Day on 27 June, people were out and about across the country, walking, running or cycling in a bid to raise funds for the charity. Together the team covered over 1,500 miles while raising money to provide support to homeless veterans.

The fund-raiser is still live and as we went to print donations totalled over £5,000.

Melantha Chittenden is Community's campaign lead. She ran a half marathon during the event.

"Too many veterans have too little support and struggle with the transition from military to civilian life, leaving them without a roof over their head. We wanted to do our bit to support them.

How is furlough changing?

Employers now have the option of agreeing a flexible furlough arrangement with Under employees. scheme, employees who have previously been furloughed can work part time for their employer. The employer is responsible for paying their full wages for the hours they work. During July, August, September

and October, the per cent of wages that are funded by the Government through the scheme changes from 80% of employees' wages down to 70% and 60% with additional conditions. As before, employers can 'top up' the wages of their furloughed employees which we have been working locally to encourage them to do.

What is a COVID-19 Risk assesment?

A risk assessment identifies what hazards currently exist or may appear in the workplace, and which hazards are likely to cause harm to employees and visitors. This includes taking reasonable steps to protect workers and others from coronavirus. By conducting a risk assessment an employer better manages risks and protects people.

The assessment should identify what work activity or situations might cause transmission of the virus, who could be at risk, how likely it is that someone could be exposed, and remove the activity or situation to control the risk. The government expects businesses with over 50 staff to publish their results online.

How do I keep my details updated?

Remembering those we have lost...

At this time we wanted to remember and pay tribute to two members who were working on the frontline of the COVID-19 crisis and sadly died after contracting the disease.

Mark Woolcock - Mark worked as an Ambulance Care Assistant at Barts Health NHS Trust in Newham. He passed away on 20th April. He was only 60 years old.

Ted Purcell, National Organiser, who knew Mark for a number of years said: "He was such a friendly, genuine person that loved helping others. It's such a tragic loss.

It really brings home the fact that our frontline workers are putting their lives on the line every day."

Earl Fuller - Earl was a member at HMP Dovegate in Staffordshire, where he worked as a prison officer for five years before he died on April 29 aged just 60.

Earl served more than 20 years with the Worcestershire and Sherwood Foresters Regiment, becoming a Colour Sergeant. During that time he became the first black drum major in the British army.

His colleagues said he was well-liked and respected by everyone who knew him.

60 Second interview with Jessica Morden MP

Jessica Morden is a Community member and MP for Newport East. She was first elected in 2005 - the first female MP in Gwent.

What's keeping you busy?

I've been working with my office to help constituents affected by the coronavirus - we've had a big increase in the amount of casework coming through and it's our priority to provide all the help and guidance we can at this challenging time.

You were at the forefront of the Save Orb Steel campaign, what do you think the future holds for steel? It was devastating to see the Orb close, knowing that the UK is losing its only electrical steel plant just when we need to do more to decarbonise our economy.

A strong UK steel industry is essential for the UK's economic recovery and our industrial security.

What's been the most challenging part of being an MP during lockdown?

Not being able to meet people face-to-face to hear their concerns. I'm looking forward to being able to see my constituents again.

Thousands of members have contacted the union's Member Service Centre since lockdown began. seeking advice on a whole range of issues. Community has been providing members with advice and guidance on a broad variety of concerns including safety, furlough and equalities issues.

Community is here for the self-employed

Community has been championing the cause of the millions of self-employed workers who have been severely impacted by the coronavirus crisis.

The union's campaigning has had many successes including: getting the government to introduce, extend and speed up payments for the self-employed support scheme; lobbying for grants for self-employed people in Scotland; and sharing best practice with local authorities across England.

Community's Head of Research, Policy & External Relations, Kate Dearden, said: "Far too many people have fallen through the gaps in the government's self-employed income support scheme. We've been lobbying the Chancellor's advisers and calling for more action.

"The crisis has shown just how much self-employed workers need a collective voice."



Partnerships for recovery

The world of work is constantly changing, so we must find new ways of ensuring that Community continually supports our members and reaches out to those yet to join us.

The Commission on Workers Technology, a initiative of Community and the Fabian Society, is due to publish its final recommendations after two years of taking evidence and listening to employers, experts and workers.

Automation already had the potential to have a big impact on people. The pace and effects of change have been amplified by the COVID-19 crisis, leaving people across the country uncertain of their futures.

Yvette Cooper MP is the chair of the Commission and she recently outlined some of what to expect in the final report.

"We need a new future jobs fund on a much bigger scale as part of wider government support for the economy. We will call for a jobs guarantee scheme to prevent the scarring effects of long-term unemployment for young and older workers. And crucially we need an urgent programme of training guarantees for workers in sectors where jobs aren't coming back soon."

THE OUTLOOK

Community's NEC member for Black And Minority Ethnic (BAME) members, Chris Knight, talks about the need to address racial discrimination and inequality.

I'm sure that all members will join me to express deep distress at the death of George Floyd, and their support for all those affected by his death and their legitimate right to protest without violence to draw attention to the need to address urgently historic and systemic racial discrimination.

This brutal unnecessary murder in Minneapolis has caused grief, anger and has sent shockwaves across the globe including here in the UK. There has been deep public concern expressed about the ingrained institutional racism that exists against Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic people not just in the USA but also in this country too. The Black Lives Matter protests are of such a scale that has not been seen since the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr. in 1968.

The root cause of the protests is the systemic disadvantage suffered the Black community. That disadvantage manifests itself socially, educationally, in health outcomes, and in opportunities for employment for Black,

Asian, and Minority Ethnic communities.

Systemic disadvantage has been further highlighted by anxieties about the Covid-19 pandemic where research shows it has disproportionately affected Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic communities

with higher mortality and infection rates.

Across the world, countries, organisations, and institutions have pledged not only to express their deep distress and revulsion racial discrimination but to take action to eradicate its pernicious effect, this is a pivotal moment where silence is not an option for any one of

We must move beyond compliance, it is not enough to be non-racist, we must act on being systemically and overtly anti-racist.

Anti-racism like any form of progression must be consciously intentional, it must be more than a declaration it must be a demonstration. To champion this fight against racism we must listen and learn from members of our communities and use these conversations and dialogue to catalyse action and change. why is ending racism even a debate?
