PROVISION OF REQUESTED INFORMATION

Thank you for your request for information on the number of vists to salmon farms which we received on 23 April 2020. Your request has been handled under the Environmental Information Regulations 2004(EIR).

The information you requested and our response is detailed below:

"Why does APHA not conduct more inspections of salmon farms? In fact, how many salmon

farms has APHA inspected every year since 2013 (please consider this a formal FOI request)?"

The number of Salmon farm visits attended by APHA from 2013 up to April 2020 is thirty five

2013 – 13 visits

2014 - 1 visit

2015 - 1 visit

2016 - 2 visits

2017 - 2 visits

2018 - 3 visits

2019 - 13 visits

2020 - none to date.

The Fish Health Inspectorate (FHI) of Marine Scotland monitor farmed fish welfare as part of their inspection programme for notifiable disease.

Fish welfare is also monitored through membership of Farm Assurance Schemes, and the fish farms' designated veterinary surgeon as a practising member of the Royal College of Veterienary Surgeons has a duty to protect animals under their care.

The Scottish Government therefore only requires APHA vets trained in fish welfare to accompany the FHIs on a small number of their inspections annually.

APHA is an Executive Agency of the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and also works on behalf of the Scottish Government, Welsh Government and Food Standards Agency to safeguard animal and plant health for the benefit of people, the environment and the economy.

APHA also investigates complaints regarding fish welfare which may arise from the FHI, other regulators or third parties and carries out inspections where necessary.

This level of regulation is comparable with controls in place for terrestrial livestock farming systems in Scotland.

Information disclosed in response to this EIR request is releasable to the public. In keeping with the spirit and effect of the EIR and the government's Transparency Agenda, this letter and the information disclosed to you may be placed on GOV.UK, together with any related information that will provide a key to its wider context. No information identifying you will be placed on the GOV.UK website.
