




Criminal Justice Statistics, 2020

England and Wales

Overview

The number of individuals prosecuted or given an out of court disposal was 1.13 million in 2020, 26% lower than in 2019 when excluding cautions.



Number of individuals (in thousands) who were:


Out of court disposals

The overall use of out of court disposals (excluding cautions) increased by 18% compared to the previous year, driven by an increase in the use of community resolutions.



Prosecutions and convictions

960,000 defendants were prosecuted at magistrates' courts in 2020, 30% fewer than 2019. Most of this reduction was a result of **reduced court activity** during the second quarter of 2020. Court proceedings began to recover over the rest of the year, with the most serious indictable offences recovering faster than summary offences.



Offences related to COVID-19


4,400 defendants were prosecuted and 3,500 offenders convicted, the majority of which were for breaching emergency period restrictions.






Assault of an emergency worker

In 2020, prosecutions for violence against the person remained stable, with increases seen in offences relating to assaults on emergency workers.




Almost all of the 3,500 sentenced received a fine.

The majority of COVID-19 related offences were dealt with out of court via a fixed penalty notice.




Remands


The proportion of defendants **remanded in custody** was at a 5-year high. At magistrates' court and Crown Court, this was influenced by the prioritisation of offences likely to result in custody in response to COVID-19.




Sentencing

The number of offenders sentenced at all courts was impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and fell by 31% in the latest year to 816,000.






Custody rate



Custodial sentences fell by 19% to 61,900 in 2020 but the custody rate increased to 8%, the highest since 2013, driven by courts prioritising more serious offences during COVID-19 that were more likely to receive custodial sentences.

Motoring

Prosecutions and convictions for motoring offences decreased by 27% each over the last year, with sentencing following the same trend.
