Prime Minister,

Your Independent Adviser Lord Geidt discussed my declaration of interests with me and informed me of the advice he proposed to provide you.

I am grateful to Lord Geidt for noting that my shareholding in the company in question was declared properly and diligently. I want to make it clear to you that my goal has always been to act properly and honestly in these matters, and I am glad Lord Geidt agrees. I took the advice of my Permanent Secretary in all these matters and I have always sought to act within the Ministerial Code, including in this instance.

Lord Geidt's assessment appears to be that I should have declared an interest following the placement of the company that my sister and her husband own on a procurement framework by NHS Shared Business Services. At that point, in February 2019, I had no involvement in, interest in, ownership of, or anything else to do with the company. I did not know about the framework decision, and so I do not think I could reasonably have been expected to declare it. Nor can I see how a conflict of interest can arise on a matter about which I had no knowledge. For the record I still have no active participation in the company and I am also not, and have never been, involved in any of NHS SBS's decisions or activities.

I therefore agree with Lord Geidt that any perceived breach could only be technical in nature, because it is simply not possible to declare something I did not know. Though of course I understand and agree that the Ministerial Code is designed to ensure that there is no appearance of any conflict of interest and accept his advice.
