MLLE LENGLEN AGAIN.

Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen is still lady champion. In the presence of the Queen, Princess Mary, and a crowd which more than filled the centre court yesterday, the French holder defeated Miss Ryan in the challenge round by two sets to love. In the first set Mlle. Lenglen lost two games, the first two service games of Miss Ryan; in the second she lost none.

The match does not call for much description. It had five forerunners on the Riviera this year; in the methods employed; and in the result registered. it differed in no appreciable clement from those one-sided engagements. Miss Ryan opened confidently enough, winning and earning points with her backhand and her drop; but this prospect of a good match evaporated as soon as Mlle. Lenglen, breaking the ice of her acquaintance as challenger with the centre court environment, had found her touch and had practised tactics rehearsed many a time in the past. She gave no exhibition of her most enterprising game; none was required. She did not keep a very good length; a sliced return does not invite good length, nor was good length its best parry. She was never hustled into audacity, never threatened with a loss of breath and an open court, such as I saw her threatened by Mrs. Mallory in some of the longer Paris rallies in May. She had merely to return the ball, guiding it with easy effort, for Miss Ryan to make the inevitable net or out, and the fact that she lost only ten points in the second set is an indication of her progressive security.

It may be asked why a girl like Miss Ryan, who has strength of limb and purpose, a sound temperament, and an unbroken record in this country since Wimbledon of last year, cannot do better against a player who is not so strong physically. The answer is that Mlle. Lenglen's stroke production provides for an all-round equipment, her footwork for all-round movement. Miss Ryan's grip and stance are those of a specialist; her backhand is vulnerable if tested in the right place. Her footwork supports her own game when that game is not unduly strained: it does not serve her adequately when the opposing player is not dominated by her specialism, and has the skill and the confidence to expose its limitations. Mlle. Lenglen has that power - it is an inherent gift, cultivated by practice against the best male players in France - and she has but to exercise it quietly, as she did yesterday, to prove the efficacy of the standard strokes. The lesson is not taught by Mlle. Lenglen for the first time. H. L. Doherty (whom the French girl most resembles in style and though Nature imposes limitations on her strength) taught it fifteen years ago when playing the specialists from America. Wilding taught it when he played McLaughlin.

Rhum Production Increase

As advised in a public notice published Friday 11 June 2021, Serica Energy (UK) Limited has made an application for consent to the Oil and Gas Authority ("the OGA") in relation to the above project. Since publication of the original notice, a number of corrections have been implemented in the associated environmental impact assessment ("EIA") which is now available for review. Those corrections are: Abbreviations - EEMS added, Section A2 and A5 - licensee name clarification, A4 - top row of table reformatted, B2 - WIA number updated and Bruce quadrant/block numbers corrected, Introduction - unit of measurement changed to million m3, Section 4 - pipeline descriptors amended, Section 6 - location clarified as existing, 7.4.3 - block names corrected, Table 8-2 - titles amended, Table 8-3 - title amended, correction of numerical values and footnote added, and Section 8.2 – text update in final paragraph - diesel added.

Summary of Project The project involves a workover of the R3 well to increase production levels from the Rhum Field. The R3 well will produce condensate and gas to the Rhum central manifold that is tied back to the Bruce platform (59° 44' 34" North; 01° 40' 22" East). Located in the NNS in block 3/29, the associated subsea infrastructure includes the Rhum manifold, 16" Production Pipeline (PL2091), IMS Line (PL2092) and umbilical (PLU2099). **Environmental Impact Assessment and Consent Process**

In accordance with the above-mentioned Regulations, the project is subject to an environmental impact assessment procedure ("EIA").

The OGA is responsible for deciding whether or not to grant consent for the project, but agreement to the grant of consent must be obtained from the Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy ("the Secretary of State") prior to consent being granted. (b) the Secretary of State refuses to agree to the OGA's grant of consent following the Secretary of State's conclusion regarding the environmental effects of the project, so the project may not proceed; or (c) the Secretary of State agrees to the OGA's grant of consent following the Secretary of State's conclusion regarding the environmental effects of the project, but the OGA does not grant consent, so the project may not proceed.

Where the Secretary of State agrees to the grant of consent, conditions that Serica Energy (UK) Limited must comply with may be attached to the agreement, including environmental conditions to avoid, prevent, reduce or offset any significant adverse effects on the environment, and measure to monitor such conditions.
