Ahead of the fourth allocation round of the Contracts for Difference (CfD) scheme, the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy will host a special online seminar on Supply Chain Plans.

Open to developers, suppliers and investors involved in a CfD project, the seminar will set out the new Supply Chain Plan process in detail to help give those involved confidence regarding what the changes may mean for them.

Specifically, the seminar will cover:

- The application process and what is expected, including pass and fail criteria
- The monitoring process and how it works
- The implementation assessment and what is expected, including pass and fail criteria
- The post-build report and its contents
- Frequently Asked Questions
