PROVISION OF REQUESTED INFORMATION

Thank you for your request for information on bee diseases which we received clarity for on 18 September 2020. Your request has been handled under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOI).

The information you requested and our response is detailed below:

This is where we need to fill some gaps in our understanding of the outbreaks and we hope the NBU will supply the following information we need to do this.

1. Distribution of EFB outbreaks in Greater London at 1 sq km resolution.

A spreadsheet with distribution of European Foul Brood (EFB) in 1km squares is attached as Appendix 1.

The locations provided are the mapping co-ordinates provided after running a report on on the Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA)'s Bee Base system. They represent colony and apiary densities in blocks of 1km2 in Greater London where EFB has been reported.

The data refers only to that held on BeeBase. BeeBase is the APHA National Bee Unit website. It is designed for bee keepers and supports Defra, Welsh Government and Scotland's Bee Health Programmes and the Healthy Bees Plan, which set out to protect and sustain our valuable national bee stocks.

Please note that BeeBase is a voluntary registration system, the data is only representative of those bee keepers and colonies registered and the information is dependent upon beekeepers updating their records.

Some data in the spreadsheet at Appendix 1 has been redacted as this information could potentially identify a person with their private address. Apiary sites within those 1km2

blocks rarely number 5 or more and in those circumstances under the legislation this could lead to identifying individuals and is exempted from release.

APHA have supplied the number of colonies where there are 5 or more apiaries per 1km2 and hope this goes someway to help answering your question. We have also supplied the number of actual instances for each year.

The information on the number of instances of EFB per 1km2 where less than 5 apiaries are registered on Beebase is being withheld under Section 40(2) of the Freedom of Information Act (2000).

Section 40

It has been withheld under section 40(2) of the FOIA as the information constitutes personal data relating to a third party. The FOIA provides that personal data relating to third parties is exempt information. The release of third party information, if disclosed, would also breach Article 5(f) of the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) - Principles relating to processing of personal data.

APHA consider that disclosure of this information is likely to breach section 40(2) of the FOIA and Article 5(f) of the GDPR, which relates to appropriate security of personal data, including protection against unauthorized or unlawful processing. Therefore, we have concluded that this information is withheld.

2. The total number of beekeepers in London (including BFA members)?

In Greater London the number of beekeepers registered on our Beebase system is 1707. APHA do not hold information BFA members.

3. The number of different beekeepers with confirmed instances of foulbrood (guess that's the same or about, the number of infected apiaries, currently at or about 19).

The number of confirmed colonies and apiaries with disease is in 1km spreadsheet in Appendix 1, however some of the information has been redacted please see answer to question 1 above.

4. (You May not know this) Of the number of beekeepers with infected bees – how many are LBKA members?

APHA do not hold this information.

5. How many strains are involved? Are there any clues, theories as to the origins and behaviour of the main vectors? e.g. is it spreading horizontally or do there appear to be sources outside coming in?

APHA do not hold a record of strain typing information on our Beebase system.

Information disclosed in response to this FOI request is releasable to the public. In keeping with the spirit and effect of the FOI and the government's Transparency Agenda, this letter and the information disclosed to you may be placed on GOV.UK, together with any related information that will provide a key to its wider context. No information identifying you will be placed on the GOV.UK website.
