and Order relating to the Harbour of Penzance  
and for other purposes.*

[ROYAL ASSENT 29TH JUNE 1883.]

WHEREAS the Borough of Penzance in the county of Cornwall Preamble.  
is a municipal Borough and the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses  
acting by the Council are the urban sanitary authority thereof:

And whereas the Corporation have jurisdiction within the  
5 harbour belonging to the Borough and are entitled to divers rates  
tolls duties and payments in respect of goods and vessels landed in  
or using the harbour and otherwise under the following Acts and  
Order (that is to say):—

An Act for fixing the dues duties and payments for all goods wares and merchandise landed on or shipped from the pier or quay of the town of Penzance in the county of Cornwall and on all ships and vessels resorting to the said pier or quay or to the harbour of Penzance (hereinafter called "the Act of 1817"): 5

An Act to amend an Act of the fifty-seventh year of King George the Third intituled "An Act for fixing the dues duties and payments for all goods wares and merchandise landed on or shipped from the pier or quay of the town of Penzance in the county of Cornwall and on all ships and vessels resorting to the said pier or 10 quay or to the harbour of Penzance" and for making and maintaining an additional pier and dock within the said harbour (hereinafter called "the Act of 1840"):

The Penzance Harbour Order 1879 (hereinafter called "the Order of 1879"): 15

And whereas the Corporation have from time to time borrowed various sums for purposes of the Public Health Acts from time to time in force and on the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two owed on account thereof twenty-eight thousand and sixty-four pounds five shillings and five pence 20 and they have also from time to time borrowed various sums for purposes of the recited Harbour Acts and Order and on the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two owed on account thereof eighty-two thousand four hundred and thirty-one pounds fifteen shillings and ninepence: 25

And whereas unforeseen difficulties and delay have been occasioned by accidents in the execution of the works authorised by the Order of 1879:

And whereas the Corporation have caused to be prepared an estimate shewing that they will or may require to borrow for 30 the execution of the works authorised by the Order of 1879 and relative purposes such sums as are in this Act mentioned:

And whereas many of the provisions of the Act of 1817 and 1840 are spent or obsolete and it is expedient that those Acts and

the Order of 1879 be repealed and that such of their provisions as are still in force be re-enacted in manner appearing in Part III. of this Act:

And whereas an absolute majority of the whole number of the  
5 members of the Council at a meeting held on the eleventh day of  
October one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two after ten  
clear days' notice by public advertisement of such meeting and of  
the purpose thereof in "The Cornishman" a local paper pub-  
lished or circulating in the Borough such notice being in addition  
10 to the ordinary notices required for summoning such meeting  
resolved that the expense in relation to promoting the Bill for this  
Act should be charged on the Borough Fund and Borough Rate  
and the General District Rate of the Borough:

And whereas such resolution was published twice in "The  
15 Cornishman" a newspaper circulating in the Borough and has  
received the approval of one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries  
of State:

And whereas the propriety of the promotion of the Bill for  
this Act was confirmed by an absolute majority of the whole  
20 number of the members of the Council at a further special meeting  
held in pursuance of a similar notice on the tenth day of January  
one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three being not less than  
fourteen days after the deposit of the Bill in Parliament:

And whereas the owners and ratepayers of the Borough by  
25 resolution passed in the manner prescribed by the Public Health  
Act 1875 (Schedule III.) have consented to the promotion of the  
Bill for this Act:

And whereas the objects aforesaid cannot be effected without  
the authority of Parliament:

MAY IT THEREFORE PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

That it may be Enacted and be it Enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same as follows (that is to say):

PART I.—PRELIMINARY.

- Short title.      **1.** This Act may be cited for all purposes as The Penzance Corporation Act 1883.
- Division of Act into parts.      **2.** This Act is divided into three Parts as follows— 10
- Part I. Preliminary;
- Part II. Borrowing for Harbour and Dock purposes; and
- Part III. Consolidation of Harbour and Dock enactments.
- Interpretation      **3.** In this Act—
- The Borough means the Borough of Penzance; 15
- The Corporation means the Mayor Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough;
- The Council the Town Clerk and the Borough Fund and Borough Rate mean the Council the Town Clerk and the Borough Fund and Borough Rate of the Borough; 20
- District Fund and General District Rate mean the District Fund and General District Rate of the district of the Corporation acting by the Council as a sanitary authority;

Person includes a corporation;

The Harbour Acts and Order means the Act of 1817 the Act of 1840 and the Order of 1879.

4. This Act shall be carried into execution by the Corporation acting by the Council. Act to be executed by Council.

PART II.—BORROWING FOR HARBOUR AND DOCK PURPOSES.

5. For the purposes of their Harbour and Dock undertakings the Corporation may from time to time borrow and reborrow at interest by mortgage or in any manner provided by The Local Loans Act 1875 including the creation of debenture stock any sums not exceeding in the aggregate forty thousand pounds all which sums shall be secured primarily on the rates dues and duties and other income arising from the Harbour and Dock undertakings of the Corporation and collaterally on the Borough Fund and Borough Rate and General District Fund and General District Rate. Power to borrow for completion of works.

6.—(1.) All mortgages granted by the Corporation under this Act shall rank together without any priority on account of the date of the deed or on any other account. Form &c. of mortgages

(2.) The provisions contained in sections two hundred and thirty-six to two hundred and thirty-nine both included of The Public Health Act 1875 with respect to the mortgages to be executed by a local authority shall apply in the case of all mortgages granted under this Act except where any such provisions are expressly altered or varied by this Act and for the purposes of such application the term local authority in the said provisions shall be construed to mean the Corporation.

7. The Corporation shall pay off or make provision for paying off all sums borrowed by them under the authority of this part of this Act within a period not exceeding sixty years from the time or respective times of borrowing the same. Period for discharge of moneys borrowed.

Mode of discharge of sums borrowed.

8. The Corporation shall pay off all sums borrowed by them under the authority of this part of this Act by equal yearly or half-yearly instalments of principal or of principal and interest or by means of a sinking fund or sinking funds created invested and applied in manner provided by the Local Loans Act 1875 and section fifteen of that Act shall apply accordingly Provided that any sums repaid by the Corporation otherwise than by instalments or by means of a sinking fund or out of the proceeds of the sale of superfluous lands before the expiration of the said period or respective periods of sixty years may be reborrowed from time to time so that they be finally discharged within the said period or respective periods and for the purposes of section fifteen of the Local Loans Act 1875 the moneys reborrowed and the moneys originally borrowed shall be deemed to form the same loan.

15

Application of sums borrowed.

9. All sums borrowed by the Corporation under this part of this Act shall be applied only for purposes to which capital is properly applicable.

Annual return to Local Government Board with respect to sinking fund.

10. The treasurer of the Borough shall within twenty-one days after the expiration of each year during which any sum is required to be set apart for a sinking fund or to be paid as an instalment under this part of this Act transmit to the Local Government Board a return in such form as may be prescribed by that Board and verified by statutory declaration if so required by them showing the amount which has been invested for the purpose of such sinking fund or paid as an instalment during the year preceding the making of such return and the description of the securities upon which the same has been invested and also showing the purposes to which any portion of the moneys invested for the sinking fund or any interest thereof have been applied during the same period and the total amount remaining invested at the end of the year and in the event of any wilful default in making such return the treasurer shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds recoverable in a summary way by the Local Government Board If it appears to the Local Government Board by such return or otherwise that the Corporation have failed to pay any instalment or to set apart the sum required by this part of this Act for any sinking fund or any interest

thereof or have applied any portion of the moneys set apart for that fund to any purposes other than those authorised by this Act the Local Government Board may by order direct that a sum not exceeding double the amount in respect of which such default has  
5 been made shall be set apart and invested as part of the sinking fund and such order shall be enforceable by writ of mandamus to be obtained by the Local Government Board out of the High Court of Justice.

11. All charges on the property revenues and rates of the  
10 Corporation existing at the passing of this Act shall during their continuance have priority over any mortgages or other security granted by the Corporation under the powers of this part of this Act.

Saving priority of existing charges.

12. Any sum not exceeding three thousand pounds which may  
15 have been pending the construction of the works authorised by the Order of 1879 paid out of capital by the Corporation in respect of interest on moneys borrowed by them for the purposes of the Harbour Acts and Order shall be deemed to have been applied to a purpose to which capital was and is properly applicable.

As to sums paid out of capital.

20 PART III.—CONSOLIDATION OF HARBOUR AND DOCK ENACTMENTS.

13. The Act of 1817 the Act of 1840 and the Order of 1879  
are hereby repealed and the enactments hereinafter contained shall take effect instead thereof.

Repeal of Harbour Acts and Order.

25 Notwithstanding the above repeal—

(i.) All existing bonds mortgages and other securities granted by the Corporation under the Harbour Acts or Order shall continue valid and available for all purposes and the holders thereof shall be in the like  
30 position in all respects and entitled to the like powers and remedies as if this Act had not been passed and the Corporation shall have exercise and be subject to the

- like powers duties and obligations in respect of such bonds mortgages and other securities and the re-borrowing and repayment of any principal moneys secured thereby and otherwise as if this Act had not been passed and all powers of borrowing money exerciseable 5 by the Corporation at the passing of this Act shall continue to be exerciseable by the Corporation to the like extent and in like manner as if this Act had not been passed;
- (ii.) The harbour undertaking of the Corporation and all 10 property rights powers and privileges connected therewith shall remain vested in the Corporation and the dock and other works authorised by the Order of 1879 may be continued and completed by the Corporation (subject to the provisions of this Act) as if this Act had 15 not been passed;
- (iii.) All acts matters and things before the passing of this Act done or commenced under the Harbour Acts or Order and available or in progress at the passing of this Act and all agreements awards contracts deeds and 20 other instruments in force at the passing of this Act shall continue valid and available and may be continued completed and enforced as if this Act had not been passed;
- (iv.) All actions prosecutions arbitrations or other pro- 25 ceedings by with or against the Corporation by reason of any matter or thing done before the passing of this Act in execution of or in relation to the Harbour Acts or Order or any bye-law thereunder may be continued commenced or prosecuted by or against the Corporation 30 as if this Act had not been passed;
- (v.) All existing bye-laws rules and regulations shall continue in force until repealed or altered under the provisions of this Act and may be enforced in like manner and with the same penalties as if made for 35 like purposes respectively under the provisions of this Act;

(vi.) All rates rents tolls and other sums at the passing of this Act due or accruing due to the Corporation may be collected and recovered by the Corporation as if this Act had not been passed;

5 (vii.) All books and documents which under the Harbour Acts or Order or otherwise would have been receivable in evidence shall be receivable in evidence as if this Act had not been passed.

14. The Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts 1845 1860 and <sup>Incorporation of general Acts.</sup> 1869 (except so much thereof as relates to the entry upon purchase and taking of lands otherwise than by agreement) and the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 are hereby incorporated with this Act save so far as any of the provisions may be expressly varied by or inconsistent with this Act and <sup>15</sup> words and expressions to which meanings are assigned by those Acts have in this part of this Act the same respective meanings provided that the expression "superior court" or "court of competent jurisdiction" or any other like expression shall be read and have effect as if the debt or demand with respect to which the <sup>20</sup> expression is used were a simple contract debt and not a debt or demand created by statute Provided also that Sections 16 to 19 inclusive of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 shall not be in force with reference to the Corporation unless the Board of Trade shall so require.

25 <sup>15.</sup> The limits within which the Corporation shall have authority and power to levy rates for the purposes of this part of this Act shall comprise the existing tidal harbour of the Corporation and the dock and other works constructed or completed under the Order of 1879 and this Act with all works and conveniences connected <sup>30</sup> therewith which limits are in this Act referred to as the harbour limits.

<sup>16.</sup> The Corporation may purchase and hold for extraordinary <sup>Lands for extraordinary purposes.</sup> purposes any land not exceeding in the whole two acres.

Tonnage rates  
on vessels  
using harbour.

**17.** The Corporation may demand and take for every vessel coming into or going out of the existing tidal harbour of the Corporation (hereinafter called the harbour) any sums not exceeding the rates specified in the First Schedule to this Act and such rates shall be payable on such vessel entering or before its leaving the harbour as the case may be.

Rates on  
goods.

**18.** The Corporation may demand and take for all goods shipped or unshipped in any part of the harbour (other than the Dock) any sums not exceeding the rates specified in the First Schedule to this Act.

Rates on  
fractional  
quantities  
of goods.

**19.** The rates by this Act authorised to be taken in respect of any specified quantity of goods may be taken in respect of any fractional part of such quantity in proportion to the amount which may be taken for such quantity but in no case shall the rate in respect of a fractional part be less than one penny.

Rates by  
whom to be  
paid.

**20.** The several rates by this Act authorised to be taken for vessels coming into or going out of the harbour shall be paid by the masters of such vessels respectively and the rates by this Act authorised to be taken for goods shipped or unshipped in any part of the harbour shall be paid by the owners consignees or persons in charge of such goods respectively.

Additional  
rate for goods  
lying on quays  
beyond six  
days.

**21.** All goods landed on any legal quay or wharf within the harbour shall be removed within six days from the time of landing and if not so removed the owner shall pay to the Corporation over and above the rates specified in the First Schedule to this Act six pence for every ton of goods so left on the quay or wharf and so in proportion for a less quantity than a ton and also the further sum of six pence for every ton and in proportion for a less quantity than a ton for every succeeding six days that the goods so remain.

Payment for  
fishing boats  
and yachts  
laid up.

**22.** The Corporation may demand and take for every fishing boat above the burden of three tons laid up and wintered in the harbour the sum of one shilling and six pence per ton by the

year and the like sum per ton by the year for every yacht and pleasure boat so laid up.

23. When a certificate has been obtained from the Board of Trade that all consents and approvals required on their part in relation to the construction of the dock and works authorised by the Order of 1879 and this Act have been given the Corporation may subject and according to the provisions of this Act for the use of the said dock and works demand and take in respect of the vessels goods wares merchandise and things mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Act any sums not exceeding the rates specified in the said Schedule Provided that if and so soon as it shall be at any time or from time to time certified in writing under the hand of an officer to be appointed for the purpose by the Board of Trade and paid by the Corporation that the works authorised by the Order of 1879 and this Act have been so far completed as to afford increased accommodation for vessels or for the shipping and unshipping of goods by means of such works then notwithstanding the twenty-fifth section of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 and although the whole of the said works shall not then have been completed the Corporation may demand and receive such of the rates or such proportion of all or any of the rates specified in the Second Schedule to this Act as shall by the officer certifying under this section be stated in his certificate to be commensurate to the increased accommodation afforded.

24. The Corporation may from time to time confer exemptions from such portion as they think fit of the rates by this Act authorised in respect of vessels using the harbour and dock or either of them Provided that every such exemption shall be made equally to all persons in respect of all vessels falling within the same class or description carrying the same description of cargo and in the like circumstances.

25. Notwithstanding anything in this Act or the repeal of the Harbour Acts and Order the rates and sums authorised by this Part of this Act to be taken in respect of the vessels goods or things mentioned in the First and Second Schedules to this Act shall not commence to be taken before the ninth day of November

one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three and up to that day the rates and sums receivable under the Harbour Acts and Order shall continue to be taken and received in respect of vessels and goods and shall be recoverable as if this Act had not been passed.

Power to take rents &c. for use of warehouses.

**26.** The Corporation may demand and take such rents and payments or other consideration as the Board of Trade may sanction for the use of any warehouses sheds rooms cranes works and conveniences for the use of which rates are not specially fixed by this Act.

Annual account to be sent to Board of Trade.

**27.** The Corporation within one month after sending to the clerk of the peace the copy of their annual account in abstract shall send a copy of the same to the Board of Trade and if they refuse or neglect to comply with this provision they shall for every such refusal or neglect be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Power of Corporation to dredge &c.

**28.** The Corporation may from time to time for the purposes of this Act dredge scour and deepen the bed of the harbour and the approaches thereto and to the dock and works authorised by the Order of 1879 and this Act but so that any works under this section below the line of high-water mark shall not be commenced without the written consent of the Board of Trade nor be executed otherwise than in the form and manner approved in writing by the Board of Trade.

Corporation may provide steam-engines dredgers &c.

**29.** The Corporation may provide maintain and use such steam-engines steam-vessels filling-engines steam and other cranes diving-bells dredgers ballast-lighters barges boats buoys mooring posts mooring craft weighing-machines warps warping-ropes tackle machinery appliances and conveniences as they think proper for carrying on the business of the harbour docks and works or for any of the purposes of this part of this Act and may demand and take such sums for the use thereof as the Board of Trade may sanction.

Corporation may provide and license steam-tugs.

**30.** The Corporation may from time to time build purchase contract for or hire and may maintain use and let steam-tugs or

other power for the use and accommodation of vessels frequenting the harbour docks and works and may also from time to time licence such number of steam-tugs or other power belonging to any person for such period and on such terms and conditions as they think fit.

31. The Corporation may from time to time with the approval of the Board of Trade fix such rates or charges as appear to them reasonable for or in respect of the use of such steam-tugs or other power maintained used and let or licensed by them and such rates or charges shall be paid by the owner agent master consignee or other person having charge of the vessel obtaining the assistance of such steam-tug or other power to the Corporation or to their lessee or to the person with whom they may contract or to the owner of such steam-tug or other power if licenced by the Corporation as the case may be and such rates and charges shall be due and payable whether such steam-tug or other power shall be actually employed or not provided the assistance thereof shall have been required and shall in consequence of a requisition have been tendered by the master or other person having the command of such steam-tug or other power.

Charges for steam-tugs.

32. The Corporation shall apply all the rates rents and sums received under this part of this Act for the purposes and in the order following and not otherwise (that is to say):—

Application of rates and income.

- (1.) In paying the expenses of the maintenance repair management and regulation of the harbour pier docks and other works;
- (2.) In paying year by year the interest accruing on money borrowed under the Harbour Acts and Order or under Part II. of this Act;
- 30
- (3.) In payment of the yearly or half-yearly instalments or in providing the sinking fund or funds prescribed by this Act;

(4.) In repayment to the Corporation of all sums advanced or expended by the Corporation on or after the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three for the purposes of the harbour or any works connected therewith together with interest on such sums at the rate of four per cent. per annum from the date of advance or of so much of such sums and interest as remains due;

(5.) The surplus (if any) shall be applied for the general improvement of the harbour pier dock and works or for other shipping purposes connected with the harbour.

Separate  
accounts.

**33.** The Corporation shall keep separate accounts (distinguishing capital and revenue) of all moneys received and expended by them under the provisions or for the purposes of this part of this Act.

Provision of  
accommoda-  
tion for  
lifeboat &c.

**34.** The Corporation shall when directed by the Board of Trade provide to the satisfaction of the Board a site near the harbour and build on such site a house and other proper accommodation for a lifeboat rocket apparatus and other life-saving apparatus and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every month during which they omit to provide such accommodation after having been required so to do by the Board of Trade.

Certain fish-  
ing vessels  
under stress of  
weather  
exempt from  
rates.

**35.** Fishing vessels belonging to countries with which for the time being treaties exist exempting from dues and port charges such vessels when forced by stress of weather to seek shelter in the ports or on the coasts of the United Kingdom shall when forced by stress of weather to make use of the harbour and not breaking bulk while making use thereof be exempt from rates leviable under this part of this Act.

Custom-house  
officers.

**36.** Officers of Customs being in the execution of their duty shall at all times have free ingress to and passage through and egress from the harbour limits by land and with their vessels and otherwise without payment.



37. All persons going to or returning from any lifeboat or Lifeboat crew. using any apparatus for saving life and being persons either belonging to the crew of the lifeboat or to the coastguard or being persons for the time being actually employed in saving life or in  
5 exercising or using the lifeboat or the apparatus for saving life and also all persons brought ashore from any vessel in distress shall at all times have free ingress to passage through and egress from the harbour limits without payment.

38. The officers of the Coastguard and all other persons for Life-saving apparatus may be attached to pier. the time being actually employed in connection with the lifeboat or the apparatus for saving life may either permanently or temporarily and from time to time attach or cause to be attached to any part of the pier dock or works spars and other apparatus for saving life and may also either in course of using or of exercising  
15 the apparatus for saving life fire rockets over or in the harbour limits.

39. The Corporation shall have the appointment of Appointment of meters and other officers. meters and weighers and other officers on and in connexion with the harbour pier dock and works.

20 40. After completion or permanent discontinuance or abandonment of the works authorised by the Order of 1879 and this As to lights after completion of works. Act the Corporation shall at the outer extremity of the harbour dock and works or the completed portion thereof exhibit from sunset to sunrise such light or lights as shall from time to time be  
25 directed by the Corporation of Trinity House Deptford Strond and shall apply to that Corporation for directions as to lighting and the Corporation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every month during which they omit so to apply.

41. Any person who permits any gravel sandstone or any Penalty on laying gravel &c. on the edge of the piers. other substance to be placed within three feet of the edge of any pier or quay of the Corporation or within such a distance of any such pier or quay or of the harbour that the same would be liable to be washed into the harbour shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

Power to make

**42.** The Corporation are hereby empowered to repeal or amend any bye-law made by them under the Harbour Acts or Order and in force at the passing of this Act subject to the provisions of the Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act 1847 with respect to the bye-laws to be made by the undertakers and subject to the 5 said provisions the Corporation may also make and from time to time repeal or amend bye-laws for the purpose of levying the rates and other sums payable under this part of this Act Provided that the Board of Trade and not a judge or the justices at quarter sessions shall be the confirming authority for the pur- 10 poses of the section and of any bye-laws made altered or repealed under the authority of the said Harbours Docks and Piers Clauses Act.

**43.**—(1). If at any time after the passing of this Act the works authorised by the Order of 1879 are virtually suspended for 15 twelve consecutive months the powers conferred by that Order and by this part of this Act for continuing and completing such works shall cease except as to so much of such works as shall be then completed unless the time for completion be extended by the special direction of the Board of Trade. 20

(2). A certificate from the Board of Trade to the effect that the works have been virtually suspended for twelve consecutive months shall for the purposes of this enactment be conclusive evidence of the facts stated in such certificate.

**44.** If at any time the Board of Trade deems it expedient for 25 the purposes of this Act to order a survey and examination of a work constructed by the Corporation on in over through or across tidal lands or tidal water or of the intended site of any such work the Corporation shall defray the expense of the survey and examination and the amount thereof shall be a debt due from the Cor- 30 poration to the Crown and be recoverable accordingly with costs or the same may be recovered with costs as a penalty is recoverable from the Corporation.

**45.** If a work constructed by the Corporation on in over through or across tidal lands or a tidal water is abandoned or suf- 35 fered to fall into decay the Board of Trade may abate and remove

the work or any part of it and restore the site thereof to its former condition at the expense of the Corporation and the amount of such expense shall be a debt due from the Corporation to the Crown and be recoverable accordingly with costs or the same may be recovered with costs as a penalty is recoverable from the Corporation.

46. The Corporation shall on or near the works below high-water mark hereby authorised during the whole time of the constructing altering or extending exhibit and keep burning at their own expense every night from sunset to sunrise such lights (if any) as the Board of Trade from time to time requires or approves and (notwithstanding the enactments for the time being in force respecting lighthouses) shall also on or near the work when completed always maintain exhibit and keep burning at their own expense every night from sunset to sunrise such lights (if any) for the guidance of ships as the Board of Trade from time to time requires or approves.

If the Corporation fail to comply in any respect with the provisions of the present section they shall for each night in which they so fail be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

47. The Corporation and the Great Western Railway Company may from time to time enter into and carry into effect agreements and arrangements for or with respect to the construction use maintenance and working by that Company of Railways or tramways to connect the works of the Corporation with the Railways of that Company in the Penzance Station and all incidental matters on such terms and conditions pecuniary and otherwise as they from time to time think fit.

48. All offences fines penalties and sums under this part of this Act or any Act incorporated herewith or any bye-law made thereunder may (unless their prosecution and recovery is otherwise expressly provided for) be prosecuted and recovered in a summary manner according to the provisions of the Summary Jurisdiction Acts.

49. Nothing contained in this Act shall authorise the Corporation to take use or in any manner interfere with any portion of the shore or bed of the sea or of any river channel creek bay or

estuary or any right in respect thereof belonging to the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in right of Her Crown and under the management of the Board of Trade without the previous consent in writing of the Board of Trade on behalf of Her Majesty (which consent the Board of Trade may give) neither shall anything in this Act contained extend to take away prejudice diminish or alter any of the estates rights privileges powers or authorities vested in or enjoyed or exercisable by the Queen's Majesty her heirs or successors. 5

**50.** Nothing contained in this Act or to be done under the authority thereof shall in any manner affect the title to any of the subjects or any rights powers or authorities mentioned in or reserved by sections twenty-one and twenty-two of The Crown Lands Act 1866 and belonging to or exercisable on behalf of Her Majesty Her heirs or successors. 10

**51.** Nothing contained in this Act shall extend to authorise the Corporation to take use enter upon or interfere with any land soil or water or any rights in respect thereof belonging to Her Majesty her heirs or successors in right of the Duchy of Cornwall without the consent in writing of some two or more of such of the regular officers of the said Duchy or of such other persons as may be duly authorised under the provisions of The Duchy of Cornwall Management Act 1863 section thirty-nine to exercise all or any of the rights powers privileges and authorities by the said Act made exercisable or otherwise for the time being exercisable in relation to the said Duchy or belonging to the Duke of Cornwall for the time being without the consent of such Duke testified in writing under the seal of the Duchy of Cornwall first had and obtained for that purpose or to take away diminish alter prejudice or affect any property rights profits privileges powers or authorities vested in or enjoyed by Her Majesty her heirs or successors in right of the Duchy of Cornwall or in or by the Duke of Cornwall for the time being. 15 20 25 30

**52.** Save as by this Act expressly provided nothing in this Act shall take away abridge or affect any power right remedy or privilege of the Corporation. 35

53. The costs charges and expenses of and incidental to the Costs of Act. preparing applying for and obtaining this Act shall be paid by the Corporation out of the rates dues and duties and other income arising from the harbour and dock undertakings of the Corporation and out of the Borough Fund and Borough Rate or out of money borrowed on the security thereof respectively in such proportions as the Corporation shall think fit to order and direct and such costs shall include the costs incurred by the Corporation in or with the object of complying with the provisions of the Act of the Session of Parliament held in the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth years of the reign of her present Majesty chapter ninety-one with respect to the Bill for this Act and all matters relating thereto as taxed and ascertained by the taxing officer of the House of Lords or of the House of Commons and all moneys borrowed by the Corporation for the purposes of this section shall be repaid by means of instalments or a sinking fund within the period and in manner provided by this Act as respects moneys borrowed under Part II. thereof.

The Corporation of the Borough of Penzance, in Cornwall, being the Harbour Authority of the Harbour of and in and belonging to the said Borough, acting by their Town Council, hereby give Notice, that, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by "The Harbours, Docks, and Piers Clauses Acts, 1847," and by "The Penzance Corporation Act, 1883," they vary by reduction for the time being, from and after the 9th day of November now next until further variation and notice thereof given, the Rates which they are authorized by the Tariff incorporated with the last mentioned Act to levy in the following particulars, that is to say:—

The owners of every boat shall have the option to be declared on the first time of the boat entering the harbour in each year of paying as per tariff for each occasion of her entering the harbour, or of paying according to the above revised tariff. The revised tariff rate shall be paid in respect of all such trawlers and boats on or before the 9th day of May in each year.

On failure to make the payments on or within the above date, the full tariff dues shall be payable in respect of each boat in default.

Except in the case of trawlers the tariff rates will be payable on the fish landed from any of the boats aforesaid.

Only outer harbour rates shall be paid in respect of vessels shipping or discharging cargo on the northern side of the north wall of the dock, or on the eastern side of the eastern wall of the dock.
