

# HRA flows analysis for households owed a duty in 2019-20

The objective of this document is to provide an overview of the flow of households initially assesses as owed a Prevention or Relief duty between April 2019 and March 2020 and whose case had closed or received a Main duty decision as of March 2021. Flows are based on all cases with an initial assessment dated within a financial year and do not indicate the length of time taken for each case.

England level figures are presented rounded to the nearest 10 households.

This document can provide a better understanding of the data behind the statistics release flows breakdowns, for all households and for key sub-groups as filtered cohort. These cohorts are:

- All households
- Households with children
- Single households
- Rough sleeping at time of application
- Departure from custody
- Care leavers aged 18-20

The pages included in this document, and their purposes, are:

- 1. Annual flow to view key cohorts and metrics for the households initially assess as owed a Prevention or Relief duty.







- •141,540 households (54.7%) ended with an accommodation secured at the end of Prevention or Relief.
- •62,340 households (24.1%) left the system for other reasons.
- •54,730 households (21.2%) were homeless and due a Main duty decision following Relief.

The outcomes for those households homeless at the end of Relief, due a Main duty decision, are:

- -35,980 households (13.9%) ended with a Main duty owed.





An overall 148,080 households were owed a Relief duty. This includes the 22,460 households owed a Relief duty following unsuccessful Prevention, in addition to 125,620 households assessed as homeless on initial approach.





## The household's accommodation when Relief duty ended.









An overall 54,730 households were homeless and due a Main duty decision following Relief:

- •35,980 households (65.7%) were owed a Main duty.
- •18,750 households (34.3%) were homeless and not owed a Main duty, of which:
  - -14,400 households (26.3%) were no priority need
- -3,070 households (5.6%) were priority need and intentionally homeless.
- -1,290 households (2.4%) were not owed a Main duty for other reasons.











## Relief outcomes

### Departure from custody

An overall 4,450 households were owed a Relief duty. This includes the 490 households owed a Relief duty following unsuccessful Prevention, in addition to 3,960 households assessed as homeless on initial approach.


- •1,710 households (38.4%) secured accommodation for 6+ months.
- •1,550 households (34.8%) left the system for other reasons.
- •1,190 households (26.8%) were homeless and due a Main duty decision following Relief.






## Departure from custody

An overall 1,190 households were homeless and due a Main duty decision following Relief:

- •420 households (35.3%) were owed a Main duty.
- •770 households (64.7%) were homeless and not owed a Main duty, of which:
  - -590 households (49.5%) were no priority need
- -140 households (11.8%) were priority need and intentionally homeless.
- -40 households (3.4%) were not owed a Main duty for other reasons.






This page shows the overall outcomes of those cases that have reached a conclusion or Main duty decision, a combination of Prevention and Relief duty owed.

An overall 3,130 households were owed a Prevention or Relief duty:

- •1,730 households (55.1%) ended with an accommodation secured at the end of Prevention or Relief.
- •790 households (25.3%) left the system for other reasons.
- •620 households (19.7%) were homeless and due a Main duty decision following Relief.

The outcomes for those households homeless at the end of Relief, due a Main duty decision, are:

- -480 households (15.3%) ended with a Main duty owed.
- -140 households (4.3%) ended with homelessness and no Main duty owed.
- \* The percentages are referring to the total number of accommodations secured at the end of Prevention (securing an alternative or existing accommodation) and Relief.









### The household's accommodation when Relief duty ended.





An overall 620 households were homeless and due a Main duty decision following Relief:

- •480 households (77.9%) were owed a Main duty.
- •140 households (22.1%) were homeless and not owed a Main duty, of which:
  - -30 households (5.2%) were no priority need
- -90 households (14.8%) were priority need and intentionally homeless.
- -10 households (2.1%) were not owed a Main duty for other reasons.
