PROVISION OF REQUESTED INFORMATION

Thank you for your request for information about the number of dogs imported into the UK, which APHA received on 20 July 2021. Your request has been handled under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) 2000.

The information you requested and our response is detailed below:

"Under the Freedom of Information Act I would like some data on dogs being brought into the U.K. as pets (not commercial imports)

The information I am requesting pertains to the following questions:

1) in 2019, how many dogs were imported into the U.K. (as pets, not commercial imports)."

Year	Dogs

2019	307263
2020	163562

- "2) What breeds were they registered as?
- 3) Of those dogs, how many were suspected to be a banned breed?
- 4) Of those dogs, how many were confirmed banned breeds, and which breeds were they?
- 5) How many in point 3 required further assessment to establish whether they were "Pitbull types"
- 6) Of the Pitbull types, how many were then identified through the assessment process to be a Pitbull type.

APHA is an Executive Agency of the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and also works on behalf of the Scottish Government, Welsh Government and Food Standards Agency to safeguard animal and plant health for the benefit of people, the environment and the economy.

7) Of the Identified Pitbull types, what was the outcomes of the attempt to import the dog (eg destroyed, sent to kennels awaiting court, etc)

Could I also have this same data for 2018, and if you have it, 2020."

APHA do not hold the information to questions 2-7. APHA do not record the breed of dog upon entering Great Britain, unless a non-compliance is identified. All instances where suspicion of attempting to import a suspected banned breed, are referred to the Police under the Dangerous Dogs Act who then assess whether the dog is a banned breed or not.

Information disclosed in response to this FOI request is releasable to the public. In keeping with the spirit and effect of the FOI and the government's Transparency Agenda, this letter and the information disclosed to you may be placed on GOV.UK, together with any related information that will provide a key to its wider context.
