### **PROVISION OF REQUESTED INFORMATION**

Thank you for your request for information about game bird (pheasant & partridge) statistics, which APHA received on 03 September 2021. Your request has been handled under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) 2000.

The information you requested and our response is detailed below:

"I am looking to find out how many game birds (pheasant & partridge) are reared in each postcode across the UK for a presentation."

Please refer to Appendix 1 for the data we do hold. The data provided is current at the time of this response.

The information provided is the population of reared game birds (pheasants and partridges) passed to the APHA when a premise is initially registered or when the record is updated. The stock numbers are the number of birds provided by the poultry keeper upon registration or when their record is updated. The stock numbers only show what they are on the day the report was run. Blank cells indicate information not held.

Please be aware that registration of poultry is only required when populations are above 50. To find out more about the registration of birds visit the GOV.Uk website for information here:

### Section 40

APHA is an Executive Agency of the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and also works on behalf of the Scottish Government, Welsh Government and Food Standards Agency to safeguard animal and plant health for the benefit of people, the environment and the economy.

We can confirm that post code data has been supplied using the first letters/digits of the post code as the full post code in some instances would lead to the identification of premises. Section 40(2), read in conjunction with 40(3)(a)(i), of the FOIA provides that personal data relating to third parties is exempt information if disclosure would breach the Data Protection Act 2018 (DPA).

APHA consider that disclosure of this information is likely to breach the first data protection principle in Schedule 1 of the DPA, which relates to the fair and lawful processing of personal data, in two ways. First, disclosure would not constitute 'fair' processing of the personal data, second, disclosure would not satisfy any of the conditions for data processing set out in Schedule 2 to the DPA. Therefore, we have concluded that this information is exempt from disclosure under section 40 of the FOIA

Information disclosed in response to this FOI request is releasable to the public. In keeping with the spirit and effect of the FOI and the government's Transparency Agenda, this letter and the information disclosed to you may be placed on GOV.UK, together with any related information that will provide a key to its wider context.
