

STATEMENT TO MEMBERS of the Boots Pharmacists' Association in Connection with the Union's Annual Return for the period ended December 2020;

- 6. Irregularity Statement, the exact wording which is reproduced below;-" A Member who is concerned that some irregularity may be occurring, or have occurred, in the conduct of the financial affairs of the Union may take steps with a view to investigating further, obtain clarification and, if necessary, securing regularisation of that conduct. The member may raise such concern with one or more of the following as it seems appropriate to raise it with: the officials of the union, the Certification Officer (who is an independent Officer appointed by the Secretary of State) and the Police. Where a member believes that the financial affairs of the union have been or are being conducted in breach of the law or in breach of the rules of the union and contemplates bringing civil proceedings against the union or responsible officials or trustees, he/she should consider obtaining independent legal advice."
