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# **1** Introduction

- 1.1.1 This report presents a summary of the baseline data relating to breeding and wintering birds.
- 1.1.2 Baseline data have been collected for the Proposed Scheme in relation to the following community areas (CA):
  - Hough to Walley's Green (MA01);
  - Wimboldsley to Lostock Gralam MA02);
  - Pickmere to Agden and Hulseheath (MA02);
  - Broomedge to Glazebrook (MA04);
  - Risley to Bamfurlong (MA05);
  - Hulseheath to Manchester Airport (MA06);
  - Davenport Green to Ardwick (MA07); and
  - Manchester Piccadilly Station (MA08).
- 1.1.3 This report should be read in conjunction with the Map Series EC-08 and EC-09 in the Background Information and Data, Ecology Map Book. Criteria for selection of species to be mapped are provided in Section 2.2.2 for breeding birds and Section 3.2.2 for wintering birds.
- 1.1.4 The Environmental Statement<sup>1</sup> should be referred to for details of the ecology impact assessment.

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# 2 Breeding birds

## 2.1 Methodology

- 2.1.1 Details of the standard methodology utilised for breeding bird surveys are provided in Technical Note – Ecology and biodiversity – Ecological Field Survey Methods and Standards (FSMS) included in the Environmental Impact Assessment Scope and Methodology Report (SMR) (see Environmental Statement, Volume 5, Appendix CT-001-00001)<sup>2</sup>.
- 2.1.2 The approach taken to sampling breeding birds was based on:
  - desk study records relating to breeding birds for the area within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme obtained from the county biological records centres (Staffordshire Ecological Record<sup>3</sup>, rECOrd<sup>4</sup> (Local Biological Records Centre for the Cheshire region), GMLRC (Greater Manchester Local Record Centre<sup>5</sup>) and Merseyside Biobank<sup>6</sup>;
  - Local Biological Records Centre for the North Merseyside Region<sup>4</sup>;
  - records of breeding birds for the area within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme included in the West Midlands Bird Club Annual Report 2018<sup>7</sup>, Greater Manchester Annual Bird Report 2011<sup>8</sup> and Cheshire and Wirral Bird Report 2016<sup>9</sup>;
  - records of Schedule 1 birds from the Protected Species dataset provided by the National Trust;
  - records of Schedule 1 birds from the Vertebrate Species dataset provided by the Canal and River Trust;
  - records of Schedule 1 birds from the Nature Conservation and Ecology (NCE) Protected Species dataset provided by the Highways Agency;

- records of breeding barn owl from 2020 breeding season from Cheshire Barn Owl Group; and
- interpretation of aerial photography and data from Phase 1 Habitat Survey and scoping surveys to identify habitats that may be particularly suitable for breeding birds and nest sites for species subject to special protection (e.g. barn owl).

## **General breeding bird survey**

2.1.3 Survey visits to each site were carried out between March and July 2018 and April and July 2019, depending on when access was granted. Visits to a site were undertaken at least one week apart and normally more than ten days apart as required by the methodology. Table 1 summarises the 18 sites where breeding bird surveys were undertaken in MA01 to MA06. These surveys were scoped out for MA07 and MA08 because suitable habitats are limited, and the route is primarily in tunnel. This information is cross-referenced to the accompanying Ecology Map Series EC-08. Ecology survey codes consist of transect reference numbers and visit numbers. For example, AT01A-E\_BB1 refers to general breeding bird survey (BB1), transect AT01, visits 1-5.

## **Schedule 1 surveys**

2.1.4 Species specific surveys were carried out for species listed on Schedule 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981<sup>10</sup> (as amended) where suitable habitats were present, or the desk study or scoping information indicated potential for these to be present. However, Schedule 1 species are not identified in the EC-08 maps due to sensitivity of rare breeding birds, unless the risk of public disturbance is deemed to be negligible.

### **Barn owl surveys**

2.1.5 Single survey visits for breeding barn owl (*Tyto alba*) were undertaken between September and October 2018 and July and August 2019 for the 59 sites listed in Table 2.

### **Hobby surveys**

2.1.7 Two survey visits, undertaken in August 2018 and in July and August 2019 for locations where suitable nesting habitat for hobby (*Falco subbuteo*) was identified during breeding bird surveys, are listed in Table 4. Surveys consisted of transects conducted following guidance set out in Hardey et al. (2013)<sup>11</sup>.

# 2.2 Identification of species most relevant to the assessment

- 2.2.1 Notable bird species are those which are listed on:
  - Annex 1 of the Birds Directive<sup>10</sup>;
  - Schedule 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 (as amended)<sup>10</sup>;

- Rare Breeding Birds Panel (RBBP) Species List<sup>12</sup>;
- Section 41 of the National Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006<sup>13</sup> (species of principal importance);
- Cheshire Local Biodiversity Action Plan (LBAP)<sup>14</sup>;
- Birds of Conservation Concern<sup>15</sup> (Red<sup>16</sup> and Amber<sup>17</sup> species);
- the West Midland Bird Club, Cheshire and Wirral Ornithological Society and Greater Manchester annual bird reports regional breeding status ('very rare', 'rare', 'scarce' or 'uncommon'); and/or
- county rare or scarce species listed in Table 7 of the Cheshire Wildlife Trust's selection criteria for sites of county biological importance (Giles et al., 2014<sup>18</sup>) or in Greater Manchester sites of biological importance selection guidelines<sup>19</sup>.
- 2.2.2 Records of notable species are summarised for each survey location. Species listed on Annex 1 of the Birds Directive<sup>10</sup>, the Rare Breeding Birds Panel Species List (2018)<sup>12</sup>, those that are considered very rare, rare, scarce or uncommon in the relevant county, and any others that are used in site selection criteria on a county basis are identified in the accompanying Map Series EC-08. Schedule 1 breeding birds are not shown due to sensitivity, except where the risk of public disturbance is deemed to be negligible.

## 2.3 Deviations, constraints and limitations

2.3.1 No deviations to the standard methodology were applied, and subject to the constraints and limitations identified in the following section, all surveys were conducted as per the standard methodology provided in the Technical Note HS2 Ecological Surveys: FSMS included in the SMR.

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- 2.3.2 Surveys undertaken were limited to locations where landowner permission was obtained and from public rights of way (PRoW) (except where access for survey was refused).
- 2.3.3 Survey access to a few sites was intermittent because of restrictions imposed by landowners. Consequently, the final survey visits for two transects (BB1\_AT06 and BB1\_DT04) were undertaken in July, after most young birds from first broods are likely to have fledged. These surveys were still carried out despite this limitation, as they will have recorded birds present and later breeding activity.
- 2.3.4 The FSMS states that surveys should have at least ten days between each visit. Scheduling constraints meant that three survey visits were undertaken less than 10 days from the previous visit: BB1\_BT01, visit 2 (eight days), BB1\_BT02, visit 3 (nine days) and BT04, visit 2 (eight days).
- 2.3.5 Land access was not available during the appropriate survey period for general breeding bird surveys at 18 locations that were selected as representative of suitable habitats for notable species and/or assemblages of breeding birds. These sites are listed in Table 6.

2.3.7 Most kingfisher surveys carried out were partially limited by vegetation or safe access to the bankside restricting visibility of parts of the banks of watercourses.

## Hough to Walley's Green (MA01)

## **Coppenhall Moss to Warmingham Moss (BB1\_AT01)**

#### General breeding bird survey

- 2.4.2 Five survey visits were carried out at Coppenhall Moss to Warmingham Moss between 13April and 20 June 2018. In total, 42 bird species were recorded, including 15 notable species.Breeding territories of 31 species were recorded, of which seven are notable.
- 2.4.3 Table 8 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

2.4.4 In addition to the above records, the surveys identified possible breeding territories of teal.

2.4.5 The desk study returned records of: common crossbill, common sandpiper, corn bunting, cuckoo, curlew, garganey, goosander, lesser spotted woodpecker, little egret, little ringed plover, long-eared owl, merlin, peregrine, pochard, redstart, ringed plover, siskin, snipe, stonechat, teal, water rail, whinchat and woodcock within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Coppenhall Moss to Warmingham Moss area since 2010. In addition, the desk study returned records of common crossbill, siskin, snipe, teal and woodcock within 2km of land required for the Coppenhall Moss to Warmingham Moss area, since 2010.

#### Schedule 1 surveys

#### Barn owl surveys

2.4.6 A probable barn owl nest site was identified within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, near Coppenhall, during barn owl surveys on 4 September 2018. This consisted of two ash trees with suitable features for barn owl to nest and roost, with evidence of previous breeding activity at one of these trees. A further potential nest site was present in a tree 230m east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. Cheshire Barn Owl Group provided three records for 2020 of breeding barn owl in the Coppenhall Moss to Warmingham Moss area, and four in the Crewe area. The nearest of these was located 75m south of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned 10 further records of barn owl, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Coppenhall Moss to Warmingham Moss area, and 12 within the Crewe area, since 2010. The nearest of these

records was within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. An incidental observation of a barn owl flying overhead was recorded to the north of Coppenhall Moss in June 2019, during other ecological surveys.

#### **Hobby surveys**

2.4.7 No hobby surveys were carried out in this section due to limited habitat suitability within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned seven records of hobby, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Coppenhall Moss to Warmingham Moss area, since 2010, and four records in the Crewe area. The nearest of these records was 505m north-east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

#### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.8 No kingfisher surveys were carried out in this section due to limited habitat suitability within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. Since 2010, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, there were five records of kingfisher in the Coppenhall Moss to Warmingham Moss area and nine records in the Crewe area. The nearest of these records was within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. An incidental observation of a kingfisher flying over Sandbach Flashes was recorded during other ecological surveys in October 2018.

## Moss Lane to Park Hall Farm (BB1\_AT02)

#### General breeding bird survey

- 2.4.9 Five survey visits were carried out in the Moss Lane to Park Hall Farm area between 14 March and 21 June 2018. In total, 46 bird species were recorded, including 19 notable species. Breeding territories of 30 species were recorded, of which 10 are notable.
- 2.4.10 Table 9 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

2.4.11 In addition to the above records, the surveys identified possible breeding territories of tree sparrow.

2.4.12 The desk study returned records of common crossbill, curlew, lesser spotted woodpecker, little egret, little ringed plover, merlin, redstart, siskin, snipe, teal, water rail, willow tit and woodcock, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Moss Lane to Park Hall Farm area, since 2010.

#### Schedule 1 surveys

#### **Barn owl surveys**

2.4.13 A probable barn owl nest site was identified near Warmingham, 370m east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, during barn owl surveys on 4 September 2018. This comprised trees with suitable features for barn owl to nest and roost, and evidence of previous breeding activity. Trees with potential nest sites were recorded near Walley's Green, 40m west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, during surveys in 2019. Cheshire Barn Owl Group provided six records for 2020 of breeding barn owl, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Moss Lane to Park Hall Farm area. The nearest of these records was located 135m south-west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned three further records of barn owl, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Moss Lane to Park Hall Farm area, since 2010. The nearest of these records was within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

#### Hobby surveys

2.4.14 No hobby surveys were carried out in this section due to limited habitat suitability within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned two records of hobby, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Moss Lane to Park Hall Farm area, since 2010. The nearest of these records was 1.1km south-east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

#### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.15 No kingfisher surveys were carried out in this section due to limited habitat suitability within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned one record of kingfisher, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Moss Lane to Park Hall Farm area, since 2010. This record was 1.1km south-east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

## Wimboldsley to Lostock Gralam (MA02)

## Wimboldsley Hall to Wimboldsley Grange (BB1\_AT03)

#### General breeding bird survey

- 2.4.16 Five survey visits were carried out in the Wimboldsley Hall to Wimboldsey Grange area between 14 April and 22 June 2018. In total, 43 bird species were recorded, including 18 notable species. Breeding territories of 34 species were recorded, of which 10 are notable.
- 2.4.17 Table 10 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

2.4.18 The desk study returned no important<sup>20</sup> records of notable birds, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Wimboldsley Hall to Wimboldsley Grange area, since 2010.

#### Schedule 1 surveys

#### Hobby surveys

2.4.19 The presence of breeding hobby was confirmed by the presence of fledged young, recorded during hobby surveys in August 2018. These were calling from four locations close to a potential nest site previously identified during general breeding bird surveys, 190m west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. There is very limited suitable habitat for hobby within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in this area. The desk study returned no records of hobby, within 2km of the land required for

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the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Wimboldsley Hall to Wimboldsley Grange area, since 2010.

#### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.20 Kingfisher surveys along the Shropshire Union Canal (Middlewich Branch) were carried out in 2018, reported below under Wimboldley to Yew Tree Farm (BB1\_AT04). The desk study returned no records of kingfisher, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Wimboldsley Hall to Wimboldsley Grange area, since 2010.

## Wimboldsley to Stanthorne (BB1\_AT04)

#### General breeding bird survey

- 2.4.21 Five survey visits were carried out in the Wimboldsley to Stanthorne area between 20 March and 21 June 2018. In total, 52 bird species were recorded, including 27 notable species.Breeding territories of 39 species were recorded, of which eight are notable.
- 2.4.22 Table 11 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

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2.4.23 In addition to the above records, the surveys identified a possible breeding territory of snipe and woodcock. The desk study returned records of snipe, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Wimboldsley to Stanthorne area, since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

#### Barn owl surveys

- 2.4.24 A potential barn owl nest site and a confirmed roost site were identified near Lea Hall during barn owl surveys in 2018 and 2019, within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. A confirmed roost site in a barn owl nest box was identified near Norcroft Farm, 325m east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, during surveys in 2019. A barn owl was recorded flying from a nest box near Clive Green during breeding bird surveys in June 2018.
- 2.4.25 Cheshire Barn Owl Group provided three records of breeding barn owl for 2020, within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Wimboldsley to Stanthorne area. One record was within the land required for construction of the Proposed Scheme and one immediately adjacent to the west of it. There was no further desk study record of barn owl, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Wimboldsley to Stanthorne area, since 2010.

#### Hobby surveys

2.4.26 The presence of a pair of breeding hobby was confirmed 490m east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Wimboldsley to Stanthorne area. This was recorded during surveys through observations of young calling from the nest on the first survey (7 August 2018), and adults and young calling on the second survey (14 August 2018). There was one desk study record of hobby, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in this area, since 2010. This record was 1.8km east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.27 Potential kingfisher nest sites were identified along the Shropshire Union Canal (Middlewich Branch) during kingfisher surveys. These were located near Wimboldsley Wood, adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, on 19 April 2018, and near Yew Tree Farm, 65m from the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, on 7 June 2018. There were no records of kingfisher, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Wimboldsley to Stanthorne area, since 2010.

# Bostock House Farm to Pear Tree Farm Cottage (BB1\_AT05)

#### **General breeding bird survey**

- 2.4.28 Five survey visits were carried out in the Bostock House Farm to Pear Tree Farm Cottage area (BB1\_AT05) between 15 March and 22 June 2018. In total, 63 bird species were recorded, including 27 notable species. Breeding territories of 52 species were recorded, of which nine are notable.
- 2.4.29 Table 12 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

2.4.30 In addition to the above records, the surveys identified a possible breeding territory of woodcock. A single peregrine was observed passing over but is unlikely to be breeding in the

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vicinity. The desk study returned no important records of notable birds, except Schedule 1 species noted below, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Bostock House Farm to Pear Tree Farm Cottage area, since 2010.

#### Schedule 1 surveys

#### **Barn owl surveys**

2.4.31 Four potential barn owl nest sites and a confirmed roost site were identified near Dairy House Farm, the nearest being within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, during barn owl surveys on 5 September 2018. A barn owl roost and possible nest site was identified south of Brook House, 550m east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, during barn owl surveys on 6 September 2018. Three trees were identified near Greenheyes Farm in 2018, between 70 and 120m east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, with potential as roost or nest sites and evidence to indicate roosting barn owl. A possible nest or roost site and an unoccupied barn owl box were recorded near Croxden Hall farm, 820m east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, during surveys in 2019. Cheshire Barn Owl Group provided seven records of breeding barn owl for 2020, within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Bostock House Farm to Pear Tree Farm Cottage area. The nearest of these records was located 350m south-east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

#### **Hobby surveys**

2.4.32 Hobby were observed in flight and hunting during hobby surveys in the Bostock House Farm to Pear Tree Farm Cottage area on 8 August and 15 August 2018. However, no evidence of nesting was recorded. There were no records of hobby, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Bostock House Farm to Pear Tree Farm Cottage area, since 2010.

#### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.33 A kingfisher nest site was identified on the River Dane near Bull's Wood, within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, on 19 April 2018. A kingfisher was recorded flying along the Trent and Mersey Canal during breeding bird surveys in May 2018. Three incidental records of kingfisher were recorded during other ecological surveys, two along the canal and one at Puddinglake Brook. The desk study returned four records of kingfisher, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Bostock House Farm to Pear Tree Farm Cottage area, since 2010. The nearest of these records was adjacent to the west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

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### Winsford Industrial Estate to Bostock Hall (BB1\_AT06)

#### General breeding bird survey

- 2.4.34 Five survey visits were carried out at Winsford Industrial Estate to Bostock Hall (BB1\_AT06) between 21 March and 11 July 2018. In total, 54 bird species were recorded, including 24 notable species. Breeding territories of 45 species were recorded, of which six are notable.
- 2.4.35 Table 13 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

2.4.39 Details of kingfisher surveys and desk study data in this section of the route are covered under Bostock House Farm to Pear Tree Farm Cottage (BB1\_AT05), above, as both transects cover land parallel to the same section of the route.

## Marshall's Gorse to High House (BB1\_BT01)

#### **General breeding bird surveys**

- 2.4.40 Five survey visits were carried out in the Marshall's Gorse to High House area between 27March and 5 June 2018. In total, 42 bird species were recorded, including 18 notable species.Breeding territories of 36 species were recorded, of which 11 are notable.

2.4.42 In addition to the above records, the surveys identified possible breeding territories of curlew. The desk study returned records of willow tit, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Marshall's Gorse to High House area, since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

#### Barn owl surveys

2.4.43 Two barn owl boxes were observed east of Higher Shurlach, within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, during barn owl surveys. One of these was confirmed as a roost site and possible nest site, with a male barn owl emerging from the box. Three buildings were also noted as providing potential roost sites, with one being confirmed by the presence of pellets and splash marks. Barn owls were also sighted on three occasions south of Higher Shurlach, during other ecological surveys in 2018. Cheshire Barn Owl Group provided two records of breeding barn owl for 2020 in the Marshall's Gorse to High House area, within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The nearest of these records was located within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.44 No kingfisher surveys were carried out in this section due to access restrictions. The desk study returned one record of kingfisher, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Marshall's Gorse to High House area, since 2010, approximately 1.3km to the west.

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### **Broken Cross to Fieldhouse Farm (BB1\_BT02a)**

### General breeding bird surveys

- 2.4.45 Five survey visits were carried out from Broken Cross to Fieldhouse Farm between 13 March and 18 May 2018. In total, 58 bird species were recorded, including 32 notable species.Breeding territories of 21 species were recorded, of which five are notable.
- 2.4.46 Table 15 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

Cheshire Barn Owl Group provided one record of breeding barn owl for 2020 in the Broken Cross to Fieldhouse Farm area, within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. This record was located within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.49 No kingfisher surveys were carried out in this section due to access restrictions. There was one desk study record of kingfisher, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Broken Cross to Fieldhouse Farm area, since 2010. The record was located 550m north-west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### Fieldhouse Farm to Pickmere (BB1\_BT02b)

### General breeding bird surveys

- 2.4.50 Five survey visits were carried out from Fieldhouse Farm to Pickmere between 15 March and 6 June 2018. In total, 44 bird species were recorded, including 20 notable species. Breeding territories of 35 species were recorded, of which nine are notable.

This record was 1.5km north-west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.54 Two kingfisher survey visits were carried out, in April and June 2019, during which two kingfisher were observed in suitable nesting habitat adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. However, no potential nests were recorded. There were no desk study data records, within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Fieldhouse Farm to Pickmere area, since 2010.

2.4.58 A barn owl box, 30m north of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, was inspected during barn owl surveys, but no evidence of occupation was recorded.Cheshire Barn Owl Group provided two records of breeding barn owl for 2020, within 2km of

land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the B5391 Pickmere Lane to Litley Farm area. The nearest of these records was 925m north-east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

#### **Hobby surveys**

2.4.59 Surveys carried out in 2018 identified a confirmed hobby nest site within this area, within 280m of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned no records of hobby within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the B5391 Pickmere Lane to Litley Farm area since 2010.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.60 One kingfisher survey visit was carried out on Waterless Brook in April 2019. Two sightings of kingfisher were observed, and suitable nesting habitat was present within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. One incidental record of kingfisher was recorded on Arley Brook during other ecological surveys in 2018. The desk study returned two records of kingfisher within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the B5391 Pickmere Lane to Litley Farm area since 2010. The nearest of these records was 1km south of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

## Pownallgreen Farm to Park Farm (BB1\_BT04)

### General breeding bird survey

- 2.4.61 Five survey visits were carried out from Pownallgreen Farm to Park Farm between 27 March and 8 June 2018. In total, 41 bird species were recorded, including 15 notable species. Breeding territories of 11 species were recorded, of which two are notable.

2.4.73 Two tree-mounted barn owl nest boxes were noted between Heatley and Mossbrow during barn owl surveys, within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. Barn owl feathers were found under one of these trees. A tree roost was confirmed by a barn owl sighting in the same area near Lower Carr Green Farm during other ecological surveys in 2018. The desk study returned one record of barn owl within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Agden Brow to Bent Lane area since 2010. This record was 1.3km north-east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### **Hobby surveys**

2.4.74 Two hobby surveys were carried out in the area of Lymm, Warrington in August 2018. One active hobby nest was recorded in this area, 75m west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned no records of hobby within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Agden Brow to Bent Lane area since 2010.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.75 Two survey visits for kingfisher were carried out on the River Bollin in the Agden Brow to Bent Lane area in May and July 2019. Despite limited access to the banks, one kingfisher was observed during surveys adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. There was one desk study record of kingfisher within 2km of land required for the construction for the Proposed Scheme in the Agden Brow to Bent Lane area since 2010. This record was located 1.1km to the north-east of the land required for the construction for the Proposed Scheme.

## **Manchester Ship Canal**

### General breeding bird surveys

- 2.4.76 General breeding bird surveys were not carried out in the Manchester Ship Canal area due to limited access and because surveys in adjacent survey sections provide sufficient coverage to sample the habitats present.
- 2.4.77 The desk study returned records of corn bunting, cuckoo, curlew, goosander, kingfisher, little ringed plover, merlin, peregrine, siskin, snipe, stonechat, teal, whinchat and willow tit within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Manchester Ship Canal area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

### Barn owl surveys

2.4.78 A confirmed barn owl roost site was identified at Hollingreave Farm, 25m from the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, during surveys in 2019. The desk study returned 19 records of barn owl within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Manchester Ship Canal area since 2010. The nearest of these records was 1.2km south-west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### Hobby and kingfisher surveys

2.4.79 No hobby or kingfisher surveys were carried out in this area due to access restrictions and limited suitable habitats within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the

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Proposed Scheme. One incidental observation of a kingfisher was recorded along the Manchester Ship Canal during other ecological surveys in 2019. The desk study returned two records of hobby and one record of kingfisher within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Manchester Ship Canal area since 2010. The nearest hobby and kingfisher records were 1.2km south-west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

## **Risley to Bamfurlong (MA05)**

### Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm (BB1\_DT04)

### General breeding bird survey

- 2.4.80 Five survey visits were carried out from the Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm area between 22March and 6 June 2018. In total, 47 bird species were recorded, including 23 notable species.Breeding territories of 29 species were recorded, of which 13 are notable
- 2.4.81 Table 21 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

2.4.82 In addition to the above records, the surveys identified possible breeding territories of curlew, snipe and wood warbler. The desk study returned records of bittern, black-necked grebe, common crossbill, common sandpiper, corn bunting, cuckoo, curlew, goosander, goshawk, lesser spotted woodpecker, little egret, little ringed plover, long-eared owl, marsh tit, merlin, nightjar, peregrine, pochard, ringed plover, siskin, snipe, stonechat, teal, water rail, whinchat, willow tit and woodcock. All of these species were recorded within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

### Barn owl surveys

2.4.83 No barn owl surveys were carried out in this area as no suitable features were identified during scoping. The desk study returned 71 further records of barn owl within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm area since 2010. The nearest three of these records were within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

#### **Hobby surveys**

2.4.84 No hobby surveys were carried out in this section due to limited suitable nesting habitat within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned 83 records of hobby within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm area since 2010. The nearest of these records was 70m south of the land required for the construction of the Proposed

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Scheme, while most were recorded at Glazebrook Moss, Risley Moss and Risley disused landfill site.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.85 Kingfisher surveys were not carried out in this section, as suitable habitats were covered by breeding bird surveys and none were recorded. The desk study returned five records of kingfisher within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm area since 2010. The nearest two of these records were within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme to the west of Holcroft Moss in 2012. Only one of these records to the south of New Hall is in suitable breeding habitat.

## Pestfurlong to Culcheth (BB1\_DT02)

### General breeding bird survey

- 2.4.86 Five survey visits were carried out from Pestfurlong to Culcheth between 22 March and 27 June 2018. In total, 59 bird species were recorded, including 28 notable species. Breeding territories of 25 species were recorded, of which 10 are notable.
- 2.4.87 Table 22 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

2.4.88 Desk study records for the Pestfurlong to Culcheth area are presented above under the Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm area (BB1\_DT04), as both transects cover land parallel to the same section of the route.

### Schedule 1 surveys

### Barn owl surveys

2.4.89 Two nest boxes were observed during barn owl surveys in 2018 near Yew Tree Farm, 180m south-west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. One had no visible evidence, the other had remains of pellets and was considered to have high potential for use as a nest site. A derelict building with a confirmed old roost site was identified within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme at Wigshaw during surveys in 2019, with a tree nearby providing a suitable site for roosting or nesting. Three barn owl nest boxes and a building with potential to provide a barn owl nest site were identified between 345m and 500m from the land required for the Proposed Scheme at Lane Head during surveys in 2019, but no evidence of nesting was recorded. Barn owl desk study records for the Pestfurlong to Culcheth area are presented above under the Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm area, as both transects cover land parallel to the same section of the route.

### **Hobby surveys**

2.4.90 Two hobby surveys were carried out in the area of Culcheth, Warrington in August 2018. No active hobby nest was recorded in this area. Hobby desk study records for the Pestfurlong to Culcheth area are presented above under the Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm area, as both transects cover land parallel to the same section of the route.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.91 No kingfisher surveys were carried out in this section due to limited suitable habitat within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. Kingfisher desk study records for the Pestfurlong to Culcheth area are presented above under the

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Holcroft Moss to Hole Mill Farm area, as both transects cover land parallel to the same section of the route.

### Golborne to Bamfurlong (BB1\_DT03)

### General breeding bird survey

- 2.4.92 Five survey visits were carried out from Golborne to Bamfurlong between 21 March and 29 June 2018. In total, 66 bird species were recorded, including 35 notable species. Breeding territories of 33 species were recorded, of which 13 are notable.
- 2.4.93 Table 23 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

2.4.94 In addition to the above records, the surveys identified possible breeding territories of Cetti's warbler, grey partridge, redshank and willow tit. An incidental record of a willow or marsh tit was recorded in woodland around Ince Moss during other ecological surveys in 2018. The desk study returned records of bittern, black-necked grebe, Cetti's warbler, common crossbill, common sandpiper, corn bunting, cuckoo, curlew, kingfisher, little ringed plover, peregrine, teal and willow tit within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Golborne to Bamfurlong area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

### Barn owl surveys

2.4.95 Two barn owl nest boxes were observed at Little Byrom Hall Farm and at Ballam during barn owl surveys, adjacent and 300m east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme respectively. The landowners reported that the former was an active nest, and hearing calls from the location of the latter over the previous weeks. The desk study returned 45 records of barn owl within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Golborne to Bamfurlong area since 2010. The nearest four of these records were 15m south-east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in 2010 and 2011.

### Hobby surveys

2.4.96 One hobby survey was carried out in the area of Stubshaw Cross, Wigan in August 2018. No active hobby nest was recorded in this area. Although only one survey was carried out due to access restrictions, it is considered unlikely that hobby were nesting in this area at that time. The desk study returned 50 records of hobby within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Golborne to Bamfurlong area since 2010. The nearest of these records was 40m from the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme and they have been recorded as being present regularly around Abram Flashes, which is likely to provide foraging habitat.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.97 Two kingfisher surveys were carried out in the area of Stubshaw Cross, Wigan in April and June 2018. No evidence of nesting kingfisher was recorded in this area. Two incidental observations of kingfisher were recorded along the canal during other ecological surveys in 2018 and 2019. The desk study returned 304 records of kingfisher within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Golborne to Bamfurlong area since 2010. Generally associated with the Hey Brook, ponds and canal and the Leeds and Liverpool Canal at Abram Flashes, the nearest of these records was 55m north-east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

## Hulseheath to Manchester Airport (MA06)

### Booth Bank to Newhall Farm (BB1\_BT10)

### **General breeding bird surveys**

- 2.4.98 Five survey visits were carried out from Booth Bank to Newhall Farm between 30 April and 3 July 2019. In total, 44 bird species were recorded, including 18 notable species. Breeding territories of 23 species were recorded, of which nine are notable.
- 2.4.99 Table 24 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

2.4.100 In addition to the above records, the surveys identified possible breeding territories of grey partridge and yellow wagtail. Desk study records for the Booth Bank to Newhall Farm area are presented above under the Park Farm to Agden Brow area, as both transects cover land parallel to the same section of the route.

### **Schedule 1 surveys**

#### **Barn owl surveys**

2.4.101 A tawny owl box was recorded 95m east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme at Booth Bank, which provides a potential nest site for barn owl. No evidence of occupation was observed. An incidental observation of a barn owl flying overhead was recorded in the same area during other ecological surveys in 2018. Barn owl desk study records for the Booth Bank to Newhall Farm area are presented above under the Park Farm to Agden Brow area, as both transects cover land parallel to the same section of the route.

### **Hobby surveys**

2.4.102 No hobby surveys were carried out in this section due to limited suitable nesting habitats within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. Hobby desk study records for the Booth Bank to Newhall Farm area are presented above under the Park Farm to Agden Brow area, as both transects cover land parallel to the same section of the route.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.103 No kingfisher surveys were carried out in this section as suitable habitats were sufficiently covered by general breeding bird surveys, where none were recorded. Kingfisher desk study records for the Booth Bank to Newhall Farm area are presented above under the Park Farm to Agden Brow area, as both transects cover land parallel to the same section of the route.

### Cherry Tree Farm to Mobberley Road (BB1\_BT09)

### **General breeding bird surveys**

2.4.104 Five survey visits were carried out from Cherry Tree Farm to Mobberley Road between 29April and 25 June 2019. In total, 44 bird species were recorded, including 15 notable species.Breeding territories of 24 species were recorded, of which seven are notable.

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2.4.105 Table 25 provides a summary of the estimated number of breeding territories for the notable species recorded.

The desk study returned records of bittern, black-necked grebe, common crossbill, common sandpiper, cuckoo, curlew, goosander, lesser spotted woodpecker, little egret, peregrine, pochard, redstart, siskin, snipe, stonechat, teal, water rail, willow tit and woodcock within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Cherry Tree Farm to Mobberley Road area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

#### Barn owl surveys

2.4.107 No survey for barn owl were carried out in this section as no suitable features were identified during scoping. The desk study returned 14 records of barn owl within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Cherry Tree Farm to Mobberley Road area since 2010. The nearest two of these records were within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### Hobby surveys

2.4.108 No survey for hobby were carried out in this section due to limited suitable nesting habitat within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned 42 records of hobby within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Cherry Tree Farm to Mobberley Road area since 2010. The nearest 11 of these records were within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.109 No kingfisher surveys were carried out in this section as suitable habitats were sufficiently covered during general breeding bird surveys. The desk study returned 43 records of kingfisher within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Cherry Tree Farm to Mobberley Road area since 2010. The nearest 11 of these records were within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. These records were primarily clustered around Rostherne Mere, the nearest being approximately 450m to the south.

### Newhall Farm to Manchester Airport (BT11)

### General breeding bird surveys

2.4.110 General breeding bird surveys were not carried out in the Newhall Farm to Manchester Airport area due to limited access and because surveys in adjacent survey sections provide sufficient coverage to sample the habitats present. The desk study returned no important records of notable birds, except those Schedule 1 species noted below, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Newhall Farm to Manchester Airport area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

#### **Barn owl surveys**

2.4.111 No surveys for barn owl were carried out in this section. One incidental observation of a barn owl roost site was recorded near Thorns Green during other ecological surveys in 2018. Cheshire Barn Owl Group provided two records of breeding barn owl for 2020 within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Newhall Farm to Manchester Airport area. The nearest of these records was located 205m north-east of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### **Hobby surveys**

2.4.112 Two hobby survey visits were carried out in the area of Newhall Farm to Manchester Airport in July and August 2019. No active hobby nests were recorded in this area. The desk study

returned no records of hobby within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Newhall Farm to Manchester Airport area since 2010.

### **Kingfisher surveys**

2.4.113 Two kingfisher survey visits were carried out on the River Bollin in April and July 2019. A potential nest site was identified within the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, but no activity was recorded. The desk study returned no records of kingfisher within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Newhall Farm to Manchester Airport area since 2010.

### **Manchester Airport**

### General breeding bird surveys

2.4.114 General breeding bird surveys were scoped out in the Manchester Airport area due to survey coverage in nearby sections and limited habitat value and extent within and adjacent to the land required for construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned records of cuckoo, curlew, dipper and peregrine within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Manchester Airport area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

2.4.115 No Schedule 1 species surveys were carried out in the Manchester Airport area due to access restrictions and limited suitability of habitats for nesting within and adjacent to the land required for construction of the Proposed Scheme. Cheshire Barn Owl Group provided one record of breeding barn owl within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Newhall Farm to Manchester Airport area in 2020. The nearest of these records was located 1.5km south-west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. Desk study records within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Manchester Airport area since 2010 included: 12 records of barn owl and one record of black redstart. For these species, the nearest records to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme south-east.

## **Davenport Green to Ardwick (MA07)**

2.4.116 General breeding bird surveys were scoped out because, the route is in tunnel through this section and the extent of suitable habitats is limited within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. As such, map series EC-08 does not include any mapsheets for MA07.

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## **Newall Green to Northenden**

### General breeding bird surveys

2.4.117 General breeding bird surveys were scoped out because, the route is in tunnel through this section and the extent of suitable habitats is limited within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. The desk study returned records of common sandpiper, curlew and willow tit, plus a heronry at Wrengate Wood, Didsbury, within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Newall Green to Northenden area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

2.4.118 No schedule 1 species surveys were carried out in the Newall Green to Northenden area due to limited suitability of habitats for nesting within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. Desk study records within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Newall Green to Northenden area since 2010 included: two records of barn owl and two records of kingfisher. For these species, the nearest records to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Newall Scheme Scheme were barn owl, 265m north-east, and kingfisher, 1.7km south-east.

## Northenden to Didsbury

### **General breeding bird surveys**

2.4.119 General breeding bird surveys were scoped out because the route is in tunnel through this section and the extent of suitable habitats within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme is limited. The desk study returned records of common sandpiper, lesser spotted woodpecker and willow tit within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Northenden to Didsbury area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

2.4.120 No Schedule 1 species surveys were carried out in the Northenden to Didsbury area due to the limited suitability of habitats for nesting within and adjacent to land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme. Desk study records within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Northenden to Didsbury area since 2010 included: one record of barn owl; two records of black redstart; and 10 records of kingfisher. For these species, the nearest records to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme were: barn owl, 625m east; black redstart, 1.5km north-west; and kingfisher, 780m north-west.

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### **Didsbury to Manchester city centre**

### General breeding bird surveys

2.4.121 General breeding bird surveys were scoped out because the route is in tunnel through this section and the extent of suitable habitats within and adjacent to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme is limited. The desk study returned records of curlew, little ringed plover and peregrine within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Didsbury to Manchester city centre area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

2.4.122 Desk study records within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Didsbury to Manchester city centre area since 2010 included: two records of barn owl and 13 records of kingfisher. For these species, the nearest records to the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme were: barn owl, 1.5km north-west and kingfisher, 885m south-east.

### **Black redstart surveys**

2.4.123 Five survey visits for black redstart were carried out around Ardwick Station and Depot between 17 April and 19 June 2018. Suitable habitat was present, but no evidence of black redstart was recorded. The desk study returned no records of black redstart within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Didsbury to Manchester city centre area since 2010.

## Manchester Piccadilly Station (MA08)

### Manchester City Centre

### General breeding bird surveys

2.4.124 General breeding bird surveys were scoped out due to limited suitable habitats in urbanised areas through this section. As such, map series EC-08 does not include any mapsheets for MA08. The desk study returned records of common sandpiper, cuckoo, little ringed plover and peregrine within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Manchester city centre area since 2010.

### Schedule 1 surveys

2.4.125 The desk study returned 15 records of kingfisher within 2km of land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme in the Manchester city centre area since 2010. The nearest of these records was 800m south-west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

### Black redstart surveys

- 2.4.126 Five survey visits for black redstart were carried out at Manchester Piccadilly Station between 20 April and 14 June 2018. Suitable habitat was present, and a single singing male was recorded on the first visit, 160m west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.
- 2.4.127 The desk study returned 74 records of black redstart within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme since 2010. The nearest of these was recorded 315m south-west of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme.

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## **3** Wintering birds

## 3.1 Methodology

## **General wintering bird survey**

- 3.1.1 Details of the standard methodology utilised for wintering bird surveys are provided in the Technical Note Ecology and biodiversity Ecological Field Survey Methods and Standards (FSMS) included in the Environmental Impact Assessment Scope and Methodology Report (SMR).
- 3.1.2 The approach taken to sampling the Proposed Scheme for the presence of wintering birds was based on:
  - desk study records relating to wintering birds for the area within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme, obtained from the county biological records centres (Staffordshire Ecological Record, rECOrd (Local Biological Records Centre for the Cheshire region), GMLRC (Greater Manchester Local Record Centre) and Merseyside Biobank, Local Biological Records Centre for the North Merseyside Region;
  - records of wintering birds for the area within 2km of the land required for the construction of the Proposed Scheme included in the West Midlands Bird Club Annual Report 2016, Greater Manchester Annual Bird Report 2011 and Cheshire and Wirral Bird Report 2016; and
  - interpretation of aerial photography and Phase 1 surveys to identify habitats that may be suitable for wintering birds.
- 3.1.3 Monthly survey visits to each site were undertaken between September 2017 and February 2018, September 2018 and March 2019 and November 2019 and March 2020, depending on when access was obtained to the site. Therefore, each site was surveyed on up to seven occasions.
- 3.1.4 Table 26 summarises the 23 locations where surveys for wintering birds were undertaken in MA01 to MA06. These surveys were scoped out for MA07 and MA08 because suitable habitats are limited and the route is primarily in tunnel. This information is cross-referenced to the accompanying Ecology Map Series EC-09. Ecology survey codes consist of transect reference numbers and visit numbers. For example, AT01A-F\_WB1 refers to general wintering bird survey (WB1), transect AT01, visits 1-6.

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## Vantage point surveys

- 3.1.5 The survey methodology for Vantage Point (VP) surveys was adapted from guidance by Scottish Natural Heritage<sup>21</sup> and Natural England<sup>22</sup> as referred to in the Technical Note – Ecology and biodiversity - Ecological Field Survey Methods and Standards (FSMS) included in the Scope and Methodology Report (SMR).
- 3.1.6 VP surveys were carried out within MA04 and MA06 where viaducts are proposed to be built. Surveys were carried out between 28 September 2017 and 21 March 2018 and between 14 November 2019 and 24 March 2020. VP surveys were also carried out within MA01, MA05 and MA06 where additional wintering bird information was required in relation to supporting habitats for designated sites. These surveys were carried out between 23 October 2018 and 27 March 2019. Table 27 summarises the surveys.

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# **3.2 Identification of species most relevant to the assessment**

- 3.2.1 Notable bird species are those which are listed on:
  - Annex 1 of the Birds Directive<sup>10</sup>;
  - Schedule 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 (as amended)<sup>10</sup>;
  - Section 41 of the National Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006 (species of principal importance);
  - Cheshire Local Biodiversity Action Plan (LBAP);
  - Staffordshire Local Biodiversity Action Plan;
  - Birds of Conservation Concern (Red and Amber species);
  - the West Midland Bird Club and Cheshire and Wirral Ornithological Society annual bird reports regional breeding status ('very rare', 'rare', 'scarce' or 'uncommon'); and
  - county rare or scarce species listed in Table 7 of the Cheshire Wildlife Trust's selection criteria for sites of county biological importance (Giles et al., 2014).
- 3.2.2 Records of notable species are summarised for each site, along with any groups of otherwise non-notable species that occur in numbers that may be important within the relevant county. Species listed on Annex 1 of the Birds Directive, those that are considered very rare, rare, scarce or uncommon in the relevant county, and any others that are used in site selection criteria on a county basis are identified in the accompanying Map Series EC-09.
- 3.2.3 Species of specific relevance for vantage point surveys are described as 'target species'<sup>23</sup>. For vantage point surveys relating to proposed viaducts, target species consist of those listed on:
  - Annex 1 of the Birds Directive<sup>10</sup>;
  - Schedule 1 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981<sup>10</sup> (as amended);
  - county rare or scarce species:
  - Birds of Conservation Concern Red list species);
  - qualifying species of relevant protected sites; and
  - notable species as defined above that are likely to be at high risk of collision, i.e. ducks and geese.
- 3.2.4 Target species for vantage points not related to viaducts are the same as notable species defined above, plus any additional qualifying species cited for protected sites relating to the vantage point location.

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## 3.3 Deviations, constraints and limitations

- 3.3.1 No deviations to the standard methodology were applied and, subject to the constraints and limitations identified in the following section, all surveys were conducted as per the standard methodology provided in the Technical Note HS2 Ecological Surveys: FSMS included in the SMR.
- 3.3.2 Surveys undertaken were limited to locations where landowner permission was obtained and from PRoW (except where access for survey was refused).
- 3.3.3 Survey access to WB1\_BT08 was intermittent and, consequently, only four survey visits were carried out at this site. Due to access and weather limitations, some vantage point surveys were subject to less than the full 36 hours of surveying (see Table 27).
- 3.3.4 Land access was not available during the appropriate survey period for general wintering bird surveys at three locations that were selected as representative of suitable habitats for notable species and/or assemblages of wintering birds. Access was also not available for three vantage point survey locations. These sites are listed in Table 28.

- 3.4.2 Six survey visits were carried out at Coppenhall Moss to Warmingham Moss between 25 September 2017 and 12 February 2018. In total, 31 bird species were recorded during the surveys, of which 12 are notable.
