Thank you for your email of 14 March 2022 requesting the following information:

I am emailing to request the following information if you have it available.

1. The number of UK Regular Armed Forces personnel with a NFCI recorded between the earliest and the latest available year, split by ethnicity and year.

If it is available, I would greatly appreciate if you could pass it on.

I am treating your correspondence as a request for information under the Freedom of Information Act 2000.

A search for the information has now been completed within the Ministry of Defence, and I can confirm that the information in scope of your request is held. Some of the information falls entirely within the scope of the absolute exemptions provided for at section 40 (Personal Data) of the FOIA and has been withheld.

Section 40(2) has been applied to some of the information to protect personal information as governed by the Data Protection Act 2018 and GDPR. In line with JSP200 Statistics Disclosure Guidance, numbers fewer than five are suppressed to reduce the possible inadvertent disclosure of individual identities. Section 40 is an absolute exemption and there is therefore no requirement to consider the public interest in making a decision to withhold the information.

Between 1 January 2010 and 15 March 2022, **4,925** UK regular armed forces personnel had an initial Read code for a non-freezing cold injury (NFCI) entered into their electronic medical record. Of these, **145** were Asian, **1,724** were Black, **2,942** were White, and **114** had an Other or unknown ethnicity. **Table 1** presents a breakdown of these figures by ethnicity and year.

Under section 16 of the Act (Advice and Assistance) you may find it useful to note:

Data have been compiled from the Defence Medical Information Capability Programme (DMICP) data warehouse. The DMICP programme commenced during 2007 and comprises an integrated primary Health Record (iHR) for clinical use and a pseudo-anonymised central data warehouse. Prior to this data warehouse, medical records were kept locally at each individual medical centre. By 2010, DMICP was in place for the UK and the majority of Germany. Rollout to other overseas locations commenced in November 2011.

DMICP has a centralised data warehouse of Read coded information. It is the source of electronic, integrated healthcare records for primary healthcare and some MOD specialist care providers from which searches can be run.

The figures presented are for all UK armed forces trained and untrained personnel with an assignment type of Regular, Gurkha, or Full Time Reserve Service. This response relates to all personnel who had a DMICP record and served between 1 January 2010 (the point at which the majority of the DMICP rollout had been completed) and 15 March 2022, and is not limited to the currently serving population.

Personnel with a NFCI were identified by searching for Read codes in their electronic medical records. The numbers quoted in the text and in Table 1 indicate the number of UK armed forces personnel who had their first Read code entered into their medical record within the period presented. Please note, individuals who have more than one Read code are counted only once, in the year of the earliest entry.

The following Read codes were used to identify any personnel that have had a NFCI:

Please note that if information was entered as free text in the patient record, then it is not available in the DMICP data warehouse and was not retrieved using the search for Read codes.

DMICP is a live data source and is subject to change. Date of data extract: 17 March 2022.

Joint Personnel Administration (JPA) is the most accurate source for demographic information for UK armed forces personnel and was used to gather information on the ethnicity of serving personnel.
