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PROVISION OF REQUESTED INFORMATION

Thank you for your request for information about animal transport, which APHA received on 08 May 2022. Your request has been handled under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) 2000.

The information you requested and the response is detailed below:

"Specifically regarding the transport of research dogs destined for laboratories under 65km is it acceptable for these to travel in crates in a car or breeding facility owned non-customised van? Would the drivers of either vehicle need to be specifically insurer to transport commercial animals?"

The rules concerning the commercial transportation of animals are set out in Council Regulation (EC) 1/2005 (as Retained) on the protection of animals during transport and in domestic legislation, The Welfare of Animals (Transport) (England) Order 2006 (WATEO) with parallel legislation in Scotland and Wales. The retained EU legislation aims to protect the welfare of animals during transportation and applies to animals transported in connection with an economic activity on journeys over 65km.

Under article 4 of The Welfare of Animals (Transport) (England) Order 2006, there are some general provisions for the protection of all animals during transport, including dogs being transported for less than 65km. It is an offence to transport animals, including people transporting dogs, in a way that will cause injury or unnecessary suffering. Animals must be transported in a means of transport which takes in to consideration the conditions required. Further to these regulations, the Animal Welfare Act 2006 also applies; the Animal Welfare Act 2006 allows action to be taken where there is evidence of cruelty to an animal or a failure to provide for that animal's welfare needs.

The Animal & Plant Health Agency (APHA) do not hold information on road vehicle insurance.

APHA is an Executive Agency of the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and also works on behalf of the Scottish Government, Welsh Government and Food Standards Agency to safeguard animal and plant health for the benefit of people, the environment and the economy.

"Whilst I appreciate you cannot give names of transporters, could you please tell me in the UK how many transporters licences are currently in place with regard to laboratory (research) animals. Included in this figure could you please also tell me how many of these include the species of a) dogs and b) non human primates."

APHA do not hold data relating to transporter authorisations specifically for research animals. In line with Council Regulation (EC) 1/2005 (as Retained), Transporter Authorisation is issued for the following categories: bovine, ovine, caprine, porcine, poultry, equine and "other" species. "Other" species covers all live vertebrate species that are not listed separately. Transporter Authorisation does not include the purpose of transport – e.g. research animals.

"Regarding transporters of research animals, are they ever audited to confirm what procedures they have in place for an emergency situation, if animals have suitable supplies of water and if drivers are skilled in animal first aid and handling?"

Transporters have a legal duty to protect the welfare of the animals in their care. Transporters should have contingency plans in place to ensure that animal welfare is not compromised, even in the event of disruption to the journey. The primary responsibility for the enforcement of the transport legislation rests with Local Authorities. Local Authorities carry out routine welfare checks on animals and their means of transport and will take appropriate enforcement measures up to and including prosecution if required.

Your final question with reference to allegations about a named animal transporter. This is not a request for recorded information and asks for an opinion. However as part of APHA's responsibility to provide help and guidance, please see the following:

APHA are unable to comment on individual cases. Local Authorities (LA's) are responsible for enforcement where any non-compliance with the animal welfare in transport rules is found and will take prosecution action when serious welfare issues relating to the transport of live animals are identified.

APHA acts as a national regulator for the welfare of animals in transport rules and is able to take regulatory action following non-compliance by transporters. APHA works closely with its local authority enforcement partners to support enforcement action and prosecution of those involved in breaches of the welfare in transport legislation.

Information disclosed in response to this FOI request is releasable to the public. In keeping with the spirit and effect of the FOI and the government's Transparency Agenda, this letter and the information disclosed to you may be placed on GOV.UK, together with any related information that will provide a key to its wider context. No information identifying you will be placed on the GOV.UK website.
