Magnox Socio-economic Story 2012-22



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Introduction

Magnox Ltd is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority (NDA) with the Magnox Socio-economic team working closely with our colleagues in the One NDA Socio-economic team. The principles and priorities remain the same whilst we continue to monitor any changes or priorities across the Magnox fleet that might warrant particular focus. Magnox's socio-economic aims and objectives align with those of the NDA.

NDA objectives

The NDA's objective "to support the creation of dynamic, sustainable local economies for communities living near our sites" is underpinned by five thematic priorities.

NDA thematic principles:

- Employment with a preference for higher value job creation
- Education / skills both to support decommissioning and clean-up and diversification into other sectors
- Economic and social infrastructure including environmental remediation and improvements and cultural and natural heritage
- Economic diversification
- Diversification into other industries and sector including support for the local supply chain.

Whilst we are not directly accountable for regeneration in the areas around our sites, the NDA and Magnox recognise the important role played in supporting the communities and partner agencies around our sites to develop plans and deliver initiatives which help mitigate the impact of decommissioning.

The Magnox Socio-economic Story

Socio-economic strategy:

Key areas of our overarching socio-economic strategy include:

- Employing an approach that enriches learning from experience across the sites yet still recognises individual site requirements
- Building upon existing stakeholder relationships and socio-economic initiatives
- Enhancing economic diversification and opening new employment opportunities
- Achieving value for money through targeted use of funds for socio-economic initiatives that offer the biggest impact for the lowest cost

Our plans consider:

- Existing local socio-economic development plans
- The prevailing socio-economic conditions in each Magnox site's locality
- Relevant Government policy, including Wales and Scotland
- Results of local stakeholder engagement

- Skills retention in localities and the transfer of skills from each Magnox site to local communities
- Transfer of learning
- Engagement with local education establishments, supporting curricula and raising aspirations
- Supporting the spin-out of functions from the Magnox sites to the local economy; and
- Availability of NDA-owned, proximate land to divest for socio-economic benefit.

Magnox Sites and regional spend

The Magnox Socio-economic Scheme

The Magnox Socio-economic Scheme provides funding for activities that benefit the social or economic life of communities, in support of the NDA's responsibilities under the Energy Act (2004) to mitigate the socio-economic impact of its work programme where it operates. The scheme has three funding aims:

- 1. Supporting transformational projects that mitigate the impact of decommissioning Magnox sites.
- 2. Helping to build sustainable communities
- 3. Being a good neighbour

Funding is prioritised towards aims 1 and 2, where the biggest and most sustainable socioeconomic benefit can be achieved.

Funding

Magnox Ltd and the NDA work together to manage a funding portfolio of £1million each financial year. Funding is available on a rolling programme to support our aims on three levels:

- Up to £1,000 for small projects neighbouring Magnox sites (good neighbour funding) (Note: As of 1 April 2022, the funding level for Good Neighbour applications through the Magnox Socio-economic Scheme has increase from £1,000 to £2,000).
- Up to £10,000 capital expenditure towards a sustainable project.
- Over £10,000 to support large transformational projects that make a significant contribution towards mitigating the impact of decommissioning in the areas around Magnox site/s.

Site socio-economic objectives

Magnox will support specific projects through grants, feasibility studies, capacity building and evaluation to aid underpinning and evidence need. In the coming years, we expect to be able to attract significantly higher levels of funding through joint working with local and national governments. This will be done by better targeting priority areas, maximising on opportunities for pooled funding and strengthening of capacity and capability for project and business case development.

The principles and rules for our grants programme are set out in the <u>detailed guidance</u> Our preference is for grant funded projects to support or align with the local initiatives, but we will consider grants that contribute more generally to:

- **Resilient economies** enable and support the conditions for local wealth building, inclusive growth in local economic output, improved productivity and significant growth in key economic sub-sectors
- **Thriving communities** Resources, investment programmes and interventions are targeted to activities that provide the largest social impact and improve the financial sustainability of community organisations.
- **Sustainable Incomes** Access and aspirations to work to improve through a programme of high impact education, skills, personal development and employability support activities
- Sustainable growth in a changing climate, reflecting the increasing importance of the climate agenda and trying to achieve economic, social and competitive advantage for our nuclear communities by early integration into our day-to-day activities and our socio-economic interventions focussed on environmental improvements and sustainability.

Within our grant function we consider:

- **Impact** Focus on outcomes, service users and communities and not just outputs, process, or inputs.
- **Priorities** Focus on outcomes that are priorities in terms of analysis of greatest public need and priorities of governance group.
- The long-term view Optimise and balance whole life costs and control of costs.
- Increasing the efficiency of providers investing in capacity of providers and use of competition.

Recent Key projects and initiatives:

Key projects and initiatives in 2021/22:

 Ayrshire College Future Skills Hub: Magnox has committed £499,999 to create a sector leading North Ayrshire Future Skills Hub, delivering an innovative curriculum in Engineering, Construction and SMART Technologies to be the primary location for high quality STEM vocational skills development for college students, primary and secondary school pupils, employers and their workforce and North Ayrshire residents seeking to train and upskill.

The timescales for the North Ayrshire Future Skills Hub were significantly disrupted by the Covid-19 pandemic. In addition, the project timelines were then revised to allow the college to take up an opportunity to acquire adjacent land from North Ayrshire Council. The additional land will make a significant improvement to the overall project and was approved by the Council at the end of January 2021. Construction is due to begin the end of July 2022 and completion by March 2023.

Magnox funding is still committed and will be released as milestones are achieved.

Key projects and initiatives in 2021/22:

- Bala Lake Railway (BLR) Trust established Project Red Dragon to develop and build a £3.5m railway extension into Bala town. This will see significant direct benefits to BLR and also local businesses through increased visitor numbers to the town centre. The Trust received £23k Magnox funding in 2019 which supported early stages of the project. An additional £38,970 was supported in 2021 for professional fees to meet obligations by planning and regulatory bodies. The work is being carried out in tandem with a £6.5m project by Natural Resources Wales to significantly upgrade the flood defences for the town following planning permission by Snowdonia National Park Authority. The work commenced in December 2021.
- The Outdoor Partnership: Magnox committed £180,000 towards the £1.5m five-year continuation of the Pathways to Employment Programme (initially funded by the NDA with £169k in 2012). Working with local people with mental health problems and individuals with disabilities the Outdoor Partnership continues to remove barriers for underrepresented groups in the outdoor sector. Magnox funding is for annual revenue costs for an Inclusion Officer, Pathways to Employment Officer and full time Volunteer Officer. Having successfully completed the fourth year, despite Covid restrictions, a total of 26,383 people took part in outdoor activities for health and social wellbeing. 279 volunteers attended National Governing Body Awards, 258 young people took part in the Pathways to Employment programme, 13 of which gained sustainable employment as a result. The Outdoor Partnership were chosen and received £3m National Lottery funding to replicate their success in Northern Ireland, Ayrshire, Cumbria and South Wales.
- Arloesi Gwynedd Wledig: The project received £285,000 directly from the NDA in 2016 for phase one. Arloesi Gwynedd Wledig was awarded a further £285,000 Magnox funding in 2020 over three years to continue the £5m pilot scheme and initiatives programme to 2023.

Magnox funding contributes to the LEADER Programme, in particular Implementation and Cooperation.

Three schemes in particular excelled in 2021 - Llwyddo'n Lleol (and Llwyddo'n Lleol Bach), Ffiws (the makerspace) and Byw a Bod. All three projects are pilot projects, working alongside local young people to develop their talents into employment, promoting the benefits of doing so on their doorstep, whilst upskilling local businesses.

Key projects and initiatives in 2021/22:

- **Grŵp Llandrillo Menai** were awarded £386,034 Magnox funding towards a £1.9m LabSTEM project. 10 laboratories across their campuses are benefitting from refurbishment and upgrades. The three on Coleg Meirion-Dwyfor sites at Pwllheli and Dolgellau were completed November 2021. Llangefni campus is due for completion Summer 2022 in readiness for the September intake.
- Môn Communities First (Môn CF) received £98,000 Magnox funding to support the £200,000 new multi-agency hub in the old Barclays Bank, Amlwch. The facility will open Summer 2022, creating an additional four full time jobs. The hub will provide full time support for individuals in the Amlwch area to gain qualifications, find work placements and employment or assistance with setting up their own businesses.
- Menter Amlwch received £35,000 over 18 months to support a new Business Manager role, after which the role will be self-sustainable. The Business Manager will support Y Llofft in Amlwch Port to develop into a quality cafe/bistro, establish and manage the community hub/ FFIWS repair café and support and develop new community initiatives.

- Unlocking Watchet's East Quay: The East Quay project is located on the East Quay in Watchet, a rural coastal town in West Somerset. The development area is situated on the quayside, adjacent to Watchet Marina and alongside a working boatyard. It is within easy walking distance of the West Somerset Railway Station and the Watchet Visitor Centre and Boat Museum and close to the new England Coast Path extension. It is an ambitious £6.7m community-led project headed by the Onion Collective CIC. The plans include the development of the creative and entrepreneurial workspaces, educational space, a gallery, restaurant and accommodation. The development is now open for business.
- Somerset Education Business Partnership (SEBP): A four-year funded project to improve connections with employers, education providers and young people to showcase availability of work and careers in the area to retain talented young people in the region. Will be monitoring impact and outputs.

 Envision: The major funding this year was for an additional three-year project with Envision for Community Apprentices to work with five local schools situated in areas of deprivation by engaging with employers and employees to mentor disadvantaged students to help them understand what they can achieve and to aspire for better outcomes in their future careers.
