Whilst being completely supportive of renewable energy, both solar and land based wind in the appropriate places, I cannot see the sense of covering vast acreages of Best and Most Versatile farm land with thousands of solar panels and I therefore object to proposal S62A/2022/0011 and any similar proposals anywhere in the United Kingdom.

We must protect our BMV farm land.

The UK has decided to step away from complete involvement with the EU and wishes to go it alone and, I presume, be as self sufficient as possible.

In an ever changing world that seems to be more vulnerable to food insecurity, currently due to a major European war, summer droughts and the vagaries of rainfall, we need to look to our own needs as well as those less fortunate than ourselves.

Our ability to protect our agricultural and livestock farming must be paramount. I have heard it said that some of our local fields involved in the two current local solar proposals (S62A/2022/0011 and S62A/2200/006) are only good for growing animal feed.
