The Reviewing Committee on the Export of Works of Art and Objects of Cultural Interest

Section 10 of the Export Control Act 2002 requires the Secretary of State to lay before Parliament (a) a report on the operation during the year of the Export of Objects of Cultural Interest (Control) Order 2003 relating to the export of objects of cultural interest; and (b) a report on other matters relating to the operation of the Act.

Cases referred to me by the Reviewing Committee on the Export of Works of Art ("the Committee")

The Committee advises me in all cases where a refusal of an export licence for an object of cultural interest is suggested on the grounds of national importance. The Committee will designate an object as a 'national treasure' if it considers that its departure from the UK would be a misfortune on one or more of the following three grounds:

These are known as the Waverley criteria (named after the 1950 committee chaired by Viscount Waverley which was appointed to consider and advise on an export policy). They are used to measure an object's importance and are not, nor ever have been, mutually exclusive, nor is any one criterion more important than the others. An object need only meet one criterion to be considered a national treasure.

The Committee met 11 times during the 2022-23 reporting period and considered 18 objects referred to it at 8 of those meetings. The Committee is reporting on 16 objects. For all but three of these the Committee recommended that their export licences should be deferred. I accepted the Committee's recommendation that 13 objects were national treasures, and they were deferred. Their aggregate value came to £15,593,430.

To date 7 of them have been saved for the nation:

Case 14 Autograph verses in Greek by Samuel Taylor Coleridge

Two are still under deferral and the other 4 were or can be exported.
