REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: Dangerous dog attacks Taskforce

Thank you for your request for information of 9 July 2023 about dangerous dog attacks taskforce. We have handled your request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

Your information request and our response are set out below.

On 6 July 2023, during a parliamentary debate, Rt Hon Therese Coffey MP responded to the SNP's Amy Callaghan MP, on the topic of the Animal Welfare Bill: "My right hon. Friend the Minister for Food, Farming and Fisheries set out on 25 May how we intend to take through our manifesto commitments. We also have a taskforce working on this situation, and I expect a report with some recommendations later this year."

Who are the members of the taskforce mentioned by Therese Coffey, and what are their designations?

We can confirm that the taskforce Steering Group is chaired by Defra officials and the membership is made up of representatives from the following organisations:

- Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs
- Welsh Government
- Local authorities in England and Wales
- The National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC) Dangerous Dog Working Group
- Battersea (representing the Dog Control Coalition which comprises Battersea, Blue Cross, Dogs Trust, The Kennel Club, RSPCA, Scottish SPCA and British Veterinary Association)
- RSPCA (representing the Dog Control Coalition which comprises Battersea, Blue Cross, Dogs Trust, The Kennel Club, RSPCA, Scottish SPCA and British Veterinary Association).

We confirm that Defra does hold the names of the individual members of the taskforce, however after careful consideration we have decided that the information should be withheld under sections 40(2) and 40(3A) of the FOIA as the information constitutes personal data relating to persons other than you. These sections exempt personal information from disclosure if that information relates to someone other than the applicant, and if disclosure of that information would breach any of the data protection principles in Article 5(1) of the UK General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).



We consider that disclosure of this information is likely to breach the first data protection principle, which provides that personal data must be processed lawfully, fairly, and in a transparent manner. Disclosure would not constitute 'fair' processing of the personal data because the individuals concerned would not reasonably have expected their names to be made public.

In our obligation to advise and assist under section 16 of FOIA we can inform you that in December 2021 Defra published research in collaboration with Middlesex University investigating measures to reduce dog attacks and promote responsible dog ownership across all breeds of dog.

In response to this research, we are working with police, local authorities and animal welfare organisations through the Responsible Dog Ownership taskforce to consider how the recommendations could be taken forward and to identify ways in which to improve the application of the full range of existing dog control powers.

Conclusions from this work are expected later this year.
