## FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT 2000: MINISTRY OF DEFENCE POLICE: DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COMPLAINTS AGAINST OFFICERS.

We refer to your email dated 13<sup>th</sup> April 2023 to the Ministry of Defence which was acknowledged on the 13<sup>th</sup> April 2023 by The Ministry of Defence Police.

We are treating your email as a request for information in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA 2000).

In your email you requested the following information:

1. How many police officers serving with your force had a complaint of domestic violence made against them in each of the last three calendar years (i) 2020, (ii) 2021 and (iii) 2022?

2. In (i) how many of these cases was disciplinary action taken against the officer and (ii) was some sort of disciplinary sanction imposed on the officer?

## 3. For each case where a sanction was imposed please detail what this sanction was.

A search for information has now been completed I can confirm that the Ministry of Defence Police do hold information in scope of your request. However I must advise you that some of the information in scope of your request falls entirely within the scope of the exemption provided for at Sections 40 (Personal Data) of the FOIA and has been redacted. Section 40(2) has been applied to some of the information in order to protect personal information as governed by the Data Protection Act 2018. Section 40(2) requires the Department to conduct a balancing exercise, this exercise involves balancing the rights and interests of individuals against the legitimate interests in disclosure, this is not the same as carrying out the public interest test associated with certain exemptions in FOIA. The balancing exercise is carried out in order to decide whether the absolute exemption in section 40(2) is engaged. In particular, there is no assumption of disclosure in the legitimate interests test, as there is with qualified exemptions. The outcome of the balancing exercise lay in withholding the third-party personal data identified in the attached information.
