### Introduction

Estonia is the northernmost and smallest of the three Baltic States on the eastern shore of the Baltic Sea. It has existed as an independent state 1918 to 1940 and again since 1990. In size it is similar to Switzerland or the Dominican Republic and it has international boundaries with Latvia and Russia.

### Geographical names policy

PCGN recommends using place names as found on official Estonian-language sources, retaining all diacritical marks. Estonian generic terms frequently appear with lower-case initial letters, and PCGN usually recommends reflecting this style.

The **Place Names Board of Estonia**, <http://www.eki.ee/knn/index2.htm>, which has been the responsibility of the Ministry of Finance since September 2015, is the main advisory and coordinating body of the place name standardisation activities in Estonia.

### **Recommended Sources for Geographical Names**

Official Estonian government-produced mapping can be used as a source for geographical names in Estonia. Official maps of Estonia are produced by the **Estonian Land Board**: <http://www.maaamet.ee>.

Map data is also available through the **Geoportal of the Estonian Land Board**: <http://geoportaal.maaamet.ee/eng/>, which has several public map applications, including the Basic Map, address data map, place names register map, cadastral map, and historical maps. The maps can be queried using geographical names and the interface is bilingual Estonian-English. All spatial data on Estonia can also be found in the Estonian National Geoportal: <http://inspire.maaamet.ee/>.

### Language

The official language is Estonian (*eesti* in Estonian; the ISO 639 language code is *est*), a Finno-Ugrian language most closely related to Finnish, and rather distantly to Saami and Hungarian. The Finno-Ugrian languages are quite distinct from Indo-European, so Estonian grammar and vocabulary have nothing in common (except for borrowed words) with Russian, German, English, Latvian etc. In south-east Estonia, a dialect called Võro (ISO 639: *vro*) exists, which is sufficiently distinct from standard Estonian to be regarded by some as a separate but closely-related language.

The largest linguistic minority speaks Russian. This group forms the majority in Ida-Virumaa county and in the town of Narva.

A substantial Swedish-speaking minority lived on the islands and along the west coast of Estonia until the end of the Second World War; very few remain.

### Inventory of characters

Estonian is written in the Roman alphabet, but seven letters are found only in loan words, or to write foreign names etc. Certain other letters (e.g. B) are quite rare in Estonian. Three distinct diacritics are used to create four more vowel symbols plus two consonants which themselves are not often used. Any vowel can be doubled, but there are no other digraphs.

The usual letters of the Estonian alphabet are:

### Alphabetical order

The four vowels with diacritics appear in the order Õ Ä Ö Ü in an Estonian dictionary, after all other letters (i.e. after V). The consonants Š Ž appear in this order in an Estonian dictionary, between R and T.

### Territorial issues

Estonia became independent for the first time immediately after the First World War and the Russian Revolution, and was formed from the Russian Imperial provinces of Estland and half of Livland (Livonia). This gave it international frontiers with Latvia and the new Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR). The USSR occupied Estonia from 1940-41 and again in 1945, transforming it into the Estonian


Soviet Socialist Republic (SSR). At this time, the north-eastern and south-eastern corners were transferred to the Russian Soviet Federative Socialist Republic (RSFSR) and remained part of Russia after Estonian independence in 1991. This includes the town named Petseri in Estonian, or Pechory (Печоры) in Russian.

**Transnational features**

Some geographical features (rivers, lakes etc.) are shared between Estonia and one or more neighbouring countries. On a map they should be labelled in the appropriate language on each side of the boundary, with no preference given to either name, or with the conventional English name if one exists.

### Administrative divisions

Following the administrative reform of 2016, Estonia's first-order administrative divisions (ADM1s) are the 79 municipalities (64 rural: *vald* and 15 urban: *linn*). The previous ADM1s, counties (*maa*), are still frequently used for reference (and thus are included in the table below), but no longer have administrative significance.
