Gold standard prevails at NWS



We have been awarded an 18th consecutive Gold Award and the RoSPA Order of Distinction – the largest occupational health and safety awards programme in the UK. RoSPA is the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents – the award confirms that we have been recognising our commitment to health and safety excellence.

This one really does feel special, it's the first time the awards recognise us as Nuclear Waste Services (we previously entered as LLW Repository Ltd). Mike Pigott, Director of Sites & Operations praised the teams for 'showing continued commitment to safety, security and the environment during times of change, and maintaining stakeholder confidence so we can deliver the wider NWS mission'.

Capping work continues at the Repository site



As you may be aware, our key priority at the Repository site is the final capping of the north end of the historic trench disposal area, together with Vault 8.

We've previously managed this activity under the 'umbrella' term of the Repository Development Programme (RDP), but our delivery model has evolved, and this work is now part of our wider site operations portfolio.

What does it mean for me?

From now on, you'll see this work referred to as Capping Operations. There's no change to the work being carried out – we communicated this at our recent Repository dropin events in Drigg Village Hall and we'll keep you updated through our newsletters. It's a large, complex programme of work. To minimise any associated noise, dust, traffic, ecological and visual impacts, we've installed noise barriers and visual screening bunds, we carry out regular noise monitoring of activities and we've made a commitment to bring most of the aggregate and materials to the site via rail.

What's happening now?

We are engaging with the supply chain to select the contractor for the next phase of the Southern Trench Cap Interim Membrane (STIM) project, which is planned to be phased over the next five years and expected to commence late in 2024. The project involves the installation of an additional membrane under the interim trench cap.

This membrane will continue to protect the waste on the southern

trenches and will remain in place for up to 100 years. It will be gradually covered by the final cap as it moves south over future vaults and adjacent trenches.

The early enabling works include installing drainage in a herringbone formation across the trenches to drain soft spots (see picture) to allow the installation of the interim membrane. This phase of the project is nearing the completion.

We've also been removing stumps and roots from the area next to the trenches, using excavators, tractors, and trailers. This work is required to allow us to build temporary water lagoons to assist with drainage during installation of the interim membrane. We had to complete this work before hibernation begins for our diverse wildlife population, which is a key consideration when planning activities. Thank you for your understanding during this time.

Mike Pigott, Director of Sites and Operations said "It's great to see our Southern Trench Cap Interim Membrane (STIM) project come to market as a result of a collaborative effort across our Commercial, Projects and Technical teams, to name a few, and we look forward to engaging with the supply-chain. This important work is a key enabler for the final capping of our disposal vaults and trenches, and is critical to our mission."

Muncaster Microbus needs volunteer drivers

The Muncaster Microbus provides a community transport service to the mid Copeland area. They need volunteer drivers to help keep the service going.

They run regular 'town trips' to Whitehaven on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and less frequent trips to Workington, Cockermouth, Barrow, Carlisle, Kendal, Keswick and Penrith on Wednesdays and Saturdays. The bus is also available for private hire with or without a driver. Drivers need a D1 category on their driving licence (all drivers who passed their test before January 1997 should have this). Drivers without a D1 would need to take a PSV licence.

Volunteer drivers can drive at times and frequency to suit themselves and the drivers usually get together each month to populate the rota. Drivers are usually asked to try to drive at least every couple of months, but an occasional driver is far better than no driver!

Gosforth Amateur Dramatic Society

Millom STEM club

Encouraging young people to take up Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) subjects is particularly important for the future of our industry, so providing funding to equip a dedicated Design and Technology (D&T) workshop was an easy decision.

Each year, pupils in years 5 and 6 from seven local primary schools are given the knowledge and skills to carry out a project brief through STEM Club. Once the new workshop is complete, the prototyping and building of their final models will be done there, taking pupils away from the classroom and into a real-world environment.

This local, community-run football club is an important local hub and allows both juniors and adults to express themselves through sport.

The current home kit is in poor condition and cannot be used for another season, so we've helped the team to purchase new kit.
