Whereas TOTALENERGIES E&P UK LIMITED has made an application dated 13th October 2023, under The Offshore Oil and Gas Exploration, Production, Unloading and Storage (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2020, and whereas the Secretary of State has considered the application and is satisfied that the project is not likely to have a significant effect on the environment; in exercise of the powers available under regulation 6, the Secretary of State hereby directs that the application for consent in respect of the project need not be accompanied by an Environmental Impact Assessment, provided that the project is carried out as described in the application for the screening direction and in accordance with the conditions specified in the attached schedule.

In giving a screening direction under regulation 6 of the above Regulations, the Secretary of State accordingly gives agreement to the Oil and Gas Authority to the grant of consent for the project as detailed in the application, WONS/15211/0/C/1 Version 1.

SCHEDULE OF SCREENING DIRECTION CONDITIONS

The grant of this screening direction is conditional upon the screening direction holder complying with the following conditions.

1 Screening direction validity

The screening direction shall be valid from 13 October 2023 until 30 November 2023.

2 Commencement and completion of the project

The holder of the screening direction must notify the Department for Energy Security & Net Zero (hereinafter called the 'Department') of commencement and completion of the project within two days:

- a) of commencement of the project and
- b) of completion of the project.

3 Prevention of pollution

The holder of the screening direction must ensure that appropriate measures are taken to minimise discharges, emissions and waste, in particular through the appropriate use of technology; and to ensure that necessary measures are taken to prevent incidents affecting the environment or, where they occur, to limit their consequences in relation to the environment.

4 Inspections

Should the Department consider it necessary or expedient for an inspector appointed by the Secretary of State to investigate whether the conditions of the screening direction are being complied with, the holder of the screening direction shall afford the inspector with such facilities and assistance as the inspector considers necessary to exercise the powers conferred by the regulations. The holder of the screening direction shall additionally ensure that copies (electronic or paper) of the screening direction and any other relevant documents are available for inspection by the inspector at:

- a) the premises of the holder of the screening direction; and
- b) the facilities undertaking the project covered by the screening direction.



5 Check monitoring

Should the Department consider it necessary or expedient to undertake an independent monitoring programme to assess the impact of the project covered by the screening direction, the screening direction holder shall afford the Department with such facilities and assistance as the Department considers necessary to undertake the work.

6 Atmospheric emissions returns

Following completion of the project covered by the screening direction, the holder of the screening direction shall report all relevant atmospheric emissions, such as combustion emissions, extended well test emissions or flaring and venting emissions relating to a well test, using the appropriate Environmental Emissions Monitoring System (EEMS) reporting forms. In the case of atmospheric emissions relating to drilling projects undertaken from a fixed installation, they should be included in the annual EEMS reporting forms for the fixed installation.

7 Unauthorised deposits

Following completion of the project covered by the screening direction, the holder of the screening direction shall recover any materials accidentally or temporarily deposited on the seabed, such as debris, temporary containers, structures or deposits, or scientific instruments, and shall return the materials to land. If it is not possible to recover any of these deposits, full details of the materials remaining on the seabed must be reported to the Department in accordance with the requirements of Petroleum Operations Notice No.2 (PON2).

8 Screening direction variation

In the event that the holder of the screening direction proposes changes to any of the particulars detailed in the application for a screening direction, the holder must notify the Department immediately and submit an application for a post screening direction amendment. The post screening direction must be in place prior to the amended proposals taking effect.

SCHEDULE OF SCREENING DIRECTION DECISION REASONS

The Secretary of State has decided that, based on the information provided, the project is not likely to have a significant effect on the environment. The main reasons for this decision are:

1) Decision reasons

This document provides a summary of the assessments undertaken by OPRED to determine whether an Environmental Impact Assessment is required for this project. This document summarises the information considered, the potential impacts and sets out the main reasons for the decision made. In considering whether an Environmental Impact Assessment is required or not, the following have been taken into account:

- a) The information provided by the developer.
- b) The matters listed in Schedule 5 of The Offshore Oil and Gas Exploration, Production, Unloading and Storage (Environmental Impact Regulations 2020) (the Regulations).
- c) The results of any developer assessments of the effects on the environment of the project; and
- d) Any conditions that the Secretary of State may attach to the agreement to the grant of consent.

Characteristics of the Project

Having regard, in particular, to the matters identified at paragraphs 1(a) to (g) of Schedule 5 to the Regulations, the characteristics of the project include the following:

Summary of project

This application was for the well bore clean up and completions section for well N59 due to the previous direction (DR/2229/2) expiring. The well has been drilled as a side track from the existing donor well N43 now renumbered to N59. There have been no changes to the well programme as part of this application (DR/2429/0) chemical usage or well design.

The application covers the following:

- i) Wellbore clean up to inhibited seawater.
- ii) Once cleaned the well will be filled with completion fluid and handed to production

The Alwyn East well is considered as Extended Reach Drilling (ERD). No new



subsea facilities will be required within the Alwyn East field. Alwyn East will be classed as High Temperature (HT) but not High Pressure (HP).

The completions operations have previously been consented by the NSTA with a reference of WONS/15211/0/C/1 Version 1 with no changes as a result of this direction.

Description of project

This Direction (ref DR/2429) is to cover the completions operations only as the previous direction (DR/2229/2) expired. There have been no changes to the project or environmental sensitivities as a result of this application. Completions operations on Alwyn East are anticipated to begin in October up until the end of November 2023.

The original Screening Direction (DR/2229) related to the Alwyn East exploration high temperature well being drilled as a side-track from donor well N43 (renumbered to N59) from the Alwyn Platform rig located at the North Alwyn Alpha platform (NAA) with operations expected to last 181 days. The well was re-entered and subsequent sections drilled utilising oil-based mud (OBM). There was no discharge of cuttings to the sea as they were skipped and shipped to shore for disposal.

This direction (DR/2429) covers wellbore clean-up from OBM to inhibited freshwater using clean up pills until all residual OBM fluid has been removed from the well. Visibly clean fluids will be discharged to sea. Once the well is clean it will be filled with a completion fluid comprising inhibited fresh water containing chemicals to protect the well. Following completion, the well will be handed over to production.

No cumulative impacts are expected to occur with any other existing or approved projects. It is not considered to be likely that the project will be affected by natural disasters.

The risk of a major accident such as a well blowout has been assessed. The Developer has control measures in place to reduce the risk of a major accident and the probability of such an event occurring is very low.

Other than the matters considered further below, there is not likely to be any significant impact of the project on the population and human health.

Location of the Project

Having regard to the matters identified at paragraphs 2(a) to (c) of Schedule 5 to the Regulations, the environmental sensitivity of geographical areas likely to be affected by the project has been considered as follows:

The NAA platform is in Quad/Block 3/09a in the Northern North Sea approximately 138 kilometres (km) east of Shetland and approximately 9 km west of the UK/Norwegian median line in a water depth of approximately 130 metres (m). The



Alwyn East well is situated in Quad/Block 3/04.

The wave height within the NAA Platform area ranges from 2.4 to 2.7 m.

Environmental surveys indicate two habitat types within the Alwyn field. The first is Deep Circalittoral sand which is characterised by motile epifaunal community comprising sea urchins (Echinoidea), sea stars (Asteroidea) and hermit crabs (Paguroidea) and occasional squat lobsters (Galatheidae). Sedentary epifauna included anemones (Actinaria) and cup corals (Hexacorallia) and an infaunal community of brittle stars (Ophiuroidea), tube worms (Polychaeta) and tusk shells (Scaphopoda). The second habitat recorded was deep circalittoral mixed sediment. This habitat was characterised by erect and encrusting sponges (Porifera), bryozoans (Bryozoa), hydroids (Hydroida), cup corals and anemones, in addition to a sparse motile epifauna including hermit crabs and squat lobsters.

No evidence of sub tidal reefs or submarine structures were found in the vicinity of NAA. The area was assessed for Stony reef habitat, however the assessment concluded low potential for reefiness therefore were not considered to be an Annex I Habitat.

There are no marine protected areas within 40 km of The NAA platform or the Alwyn East Field and therefore it is unlikely that the project will have any effect on protected sites.

Fish spawning and nursery activity will occur in the area, which may coincide with the drilling operations. Minke whale, white beaked dolphin, long-finned pilot whale, harbour porpoise and Atlantic white-sided dolphin have been recorded in block 3/04 and 3/09. Densities of these species range from high to low throughout the year. Seals are not expected to be seen at this location. Seabird vulnerability in blocks 3/04 and 3/09a is low all year round. The project area is primarily used for demersal fishing and the effort in the area is rated low.

The Alwyn North field is in an area of major oil and gas developments and infrastructure and there are several oil and gas fields nearby. Block 3/04 and 3/09 features a Ministry of Defence restriction as it lies within military training grounds, but there is no known concurrent activity and the well is being drilled from the existing NAA Platform. There is one wreck, possibly of the Blagdon, which is located north of the centre of Block 3/04. Due to the nature of the operations, this wreck is not considered to be at risk from the drilling operations. There are no scheduled monument war graves, Historic Marine Protected Areas or other wrecks located within the vicinity of the NAA. There are no known cables in the vicinity of the NAA and no planned renewable energy developments. Shipping density in the area is very low.

Given the location of the project, it is not likely that the areas identified at paragraphs 2(c)(i), (iii), (iv), (vi), (vii) of Schedule 5 to the Regulations will be affected by the project.



Type and characteristics of the potential impact

In accordance with paragraph 3 of Schedule 5 to the Regulations, the likely significant effects of the project on the environment have been considered. Potential effects on the environment from the activities associated with the project were assessed, including impacts arising from atmospheric emissions, seabed disturbance, physical presence, planned discharges and accidental spills.

Other than the matters considered further below there is not likely to be any significant impact from the project.

There is a 500 m radius safety zone around the NAA Platform excluding unauthorised access of vessels and prohibiting access to fishing vessels. Discharge of offshore chemicals associated with the completion operations have been assessed as not likely to have a significant effect on the environment. The wellbore clean-up operations will result in the discharge of wastewater containing residual base oil from the OBM. This discharge has been assessed and is not considered to have a significant effect on the environment.

Although there are fish spawning and nursery activity in the vicinity of the well at certain times of the year, the spawning and nursery areas are part of larger offshore areas and therefore are not expected to be significantly impacted by the operations as any impacts will be localised to the platform.

There are no expected transboundary effects from the drilling operations at the NAA Platform. The nearest boundary (UK/Norwegian median) is located approximately 9 km west of the operations. It is not considered likely that any planned operational discharge (chemicals) will be detectable at this distance from the well location.

Although not a planned activity, a worst-case major accident scenario resulting from a potential well blow-out was modelled and assessed. Although the consequences of an oil spill can be severe, the probability of a large oil spill from the proposed operations are low. The control measures in place to prevent loss of well control minimise the risk of a major oil spill thus a significant effect on the environment is unlikely.

The atmospheric emissions associated with the project result from power demand for the proposed operations. Drilling facilities are integrated on the platform and use the electricity generated by the offshore combustion installations. It is anticipated there will be a small temporary increase in atmospheric emissions during drilling operations as a third power generator will be required. It is expected the emissions will be rapidly dispersed and are not likely to have a significant impact.

Drilling operations will be conducted from the existing NAA Platform and therefore there is no increase in the infrastructure footprint.

No cumulative impacts are expected to occur. The Field has been developed for several years and the locations of the NAA platforms are well known to other marine



users and marked on the appropriate navigational charts. It is considered that the drilling of the well from the platform is not likely to have a significant impact on other offshore oil and gas activities or other users of the sea.

There is no aggregate extraction, dredging, or dumping activity. There are no planned, consented or operational wind farms within block 3/09a. Additionally, both fishing activity and shipping activity within block 3/09a is considered relatively low.

The project is in the vicinity of other oil and gas developments, but there are no expected cumulative impacts with other oil and gas activities. Cumulative impacts have been assessed as not likely to have a significant effect on the environment.

Decision

Taking the above considerations into account, the Secretary of State has concluded that the project is not likely to have a significant impact on the environment and that an environmental impact assessment is not required.
