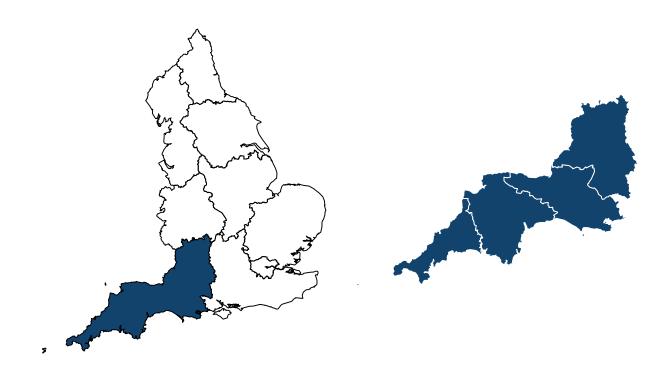

Section 1: Key statistics

The South West region comprises the Bath/Bristol area, Devon, Dorset, Somerset and the Isles of Scilly.

Key statistics for the South West region

- Total Income from Farming¹ in 2022 was £979 million, an increase of 21% since 2021 (Source: Total Income from Farming for the regions of England).
- In 2022, the largest contributors to the gross output² value (£5.0 billion) were milk (£1.6 billion) and cattle for meat (£572 million). These commodities accounted for 43% of the total output (Source: Total Income from Farming for the regions of England).
- The average farm size in 2023 was 69 hectares (Table 1.1). This is the second smallest average farm size of all the English regions and smaller than the English average of 88 hectares.
- The predominant farm types in 2023 were grazing livestock (47% of the region's holdings) and general cropping (22% of the region's holdings) farms (Figure 1.4).

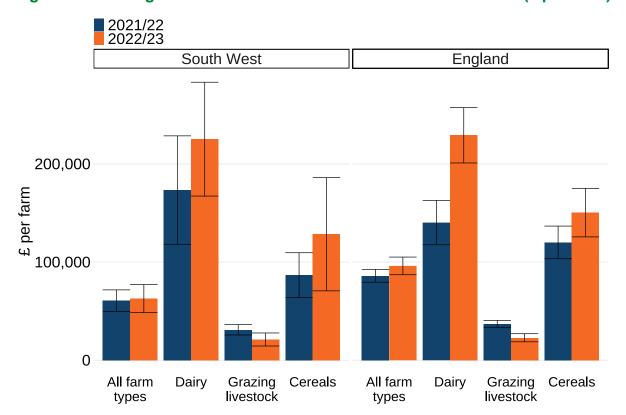


Figure 1.6: Average Farm Business Income in 2021/22 and 2022/23 (£ per farm)

- Across all farm types, average Farm Business Income³ was £62,800 per farm in 2022/23, which was an increase of 3.4% from 2021/22 (Figure 1.6).

¹ Total Income from Farming (TIFF) is the net income to farms once costs have been accounted for, so is calculated as "outputs & subsidies" minus "inputs & costs". More information on aggregate agricultural accounts can be found on GOV.UK.

² Total output is the gross value of commodities produced without considering production costs or any additional income received through subsidies. More information on aggregate agricultural accounts can be found on GOV.UK.

³ In simple terms, Farm Business Income (FBI) is the output generated by the farm business minus total farm costs. More information on Farm Business Income can be found on GOV.UK.

Figure 1.2: Distribution of farms by size in 2023 (percentage of farm holdings)

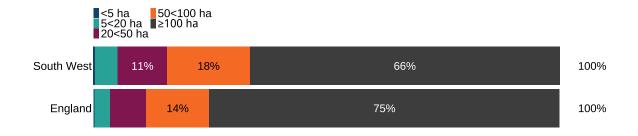

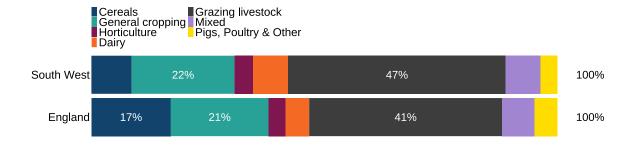

Figure 1.4: Distribution of farms by type in 2023 (percentage of farm holdings)

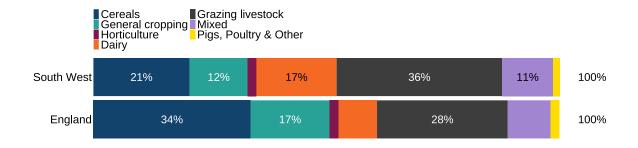
