REQUEST FOR INFORMATION: Brucella Canis Information

Thank you for your request for information of 22nd May about Brucella Canis Information. APHA have handled your request under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (FOIA).

Your information request and our response are set out below.

"Please provide a monthly breakdown (or quarterly, if monthly data is not available) of how many epidemiologically separate incidents of Brucella canis outbreaks there have been identified dating back to 2013.

Over the same timeframe please also provide the number of dogs tested, and how many were serologically positive.

Please provide a breakdown of how many of each month's cases were associated with importation."

Prior to 2020 there have been three confirmed cases of Brucella canis in the UK. These were confirmed by culture of B. canis. Brucella canis was isolated from blood samples from dogs on two separate occasions in 2017. Both dogs had been imported. More information can be found here:
