Thank you for your email concerning *diphenhydramine hydrochloride*.

According to our records diphenhydramine hydrochloride is not currently licensed in the UK for injection for local anaesthesia.

Please note that MHRA does not solicit applications for new medicines, or the addition of indications to current authorised medicines, and we do not conduct our own product development.

A company would need to approach us to apply for a Marketing Authorisation.

Sometimes there are clinical situations when the use of an unlicensed medicine or use of a medicine outside the terms of the licence (i.e., 'off-label') may be judged by the prescriber to be in the best interest of the patient on the basis of available evidence. Off-label use of a licensed medicine is the exclusive responsibility of the prescriber. We have published some information regarding off-label use on our website which you may find of interest. Please note that Healthcare professionals may have more responsibility to accurately prescribe an unlicensed medicine or an off-label medicine than when they prescribe a medicine within the terms of its licence: <u>https://www.gov.uk/drug-safety-update/off-label-or-unlicensed-use-of-medicines-prescribers-responsibilities</u>.
