Thank you for your information request, dated November 21st 2023, where you asked for information about how the call for evidence on Hormone Pregnancy Tests (HPTs, which was open between March 2015 and June 2015) was publicised and how many people responded to the call for information.

I am pleased to provide you with the information requested, please see below.

As noted in the report of the Expert Working Group (EWG) on HPTs and annex 5 to the report (which are available on the Government website¹), the launch of the call for evidence was accompanied by a press release and the Association for Children damaged by HPTs was informed of the launch. An article in the MHRA's 'Drug Safety Update' bulletin in June 2015 also drew further attention to the call for evidence.

In response to the call for evidence, information was provided by 20 individuals or organisations, including:

- Yellow Card reports of suspected malformations and adverse effects on pregnancy reported in association with HPTs;
- Information on the malformations and adverse effects on pregnancy reported in association with HPTs in the UK and Germany and documents from the Landesarchiv Berlin (provided by the Association for Children Damaged by HPTs and by a Duogynon campaigner in Germany);
- Testimonials from people describing their experiences with HPTs;

- Assorted documents from representatives of patient organisations and other individuals including two former Chairs of the Association for Children Damaged by Hormonal Pregnancy Tests (which cover a range of topics including a chronology of events, opinion pieces, copies of company correspondence, published literature and press clippings);
- A review of the literature published since 1982 regarding the teratogenic risk of Primodos provided by the UK Teratology Information Service.

This information was considered alongside information from other sources by the EWG on HPTs.
