In 2024 the Office for Product Safety and Standards marks 15 years of running the Primary Authority (PA) scheme for UK businesses.

Over 146,000 businesses are now in the scheme benefitting from reduced administrative burdens of regulation. PA creates a single point of contact that helps simplify the regulatory system for UK businesses by enabling them to get tailored advice to meet environmental health, trading standards or fire safety regulations.

#### UK to introduce groundbreaking protections against vulnerable internet devices



The United Kingdom is set to make history as it becomes the first country in the world to introduce ground-breaking, common-sense protections for consumers using internet connected devices.

The UK's product regulator, the Office for Product Safety and Standards (OPSS) will enforce the new laws, due to be introduced this spring by the Department for Science, Innovation and Technology, (DSIT), positioning the UK as the global pioneer in minimum cyber security standards for connectable products.

#### **Product recalls spotlight:**



High Pressure Shower Head with Stop Button sold via Temu: The product presents a serious risk of burns as it is deemed to be unsafe for use with electric showers due to the presence of a stop button.

<u>Portable Electric Space Heater sold via Temu</u>: The product presents a serious risk of electric shock as the poor quality of the external build could allow the front grill to become live under conditions of normal use.

<u>Cylo Wireless Charger sold by TK Maxx</u>: The product presents a risk of burns as it has been identified that, if a metal object is placed near the charger during use, the product can overheat which may cause it to melt or burn the skin if touched.

<u>UPP Battery E-Bike Battery Packs sold via Amazon, AliBaba, eBay, Made in China and Desertcart:</u> The product presents a serious risk of fire.

<u>ideal Heating Logic 2 Combi & System Boiler Range</u>: The product presents a risk of fire due to the dry operation, meaning the boiler lights gas but the heat generated doesn't cool it.

<u>Various Baby Socks and Tights sold by Poundland</u>: The products pose a risk of injuries or cuts as the material inside of the socks may cause a tourniquet around a child's toe.
