

Application to fish Atlantic Bluefin Tuna (*Thunnus thynnus*) 2024 Guidance

Introduction

The Marine Management Organisation (MMO) and Defra have launched for a second year a trial UK commercial fishery for bluefin tuna (BFT). The aim of the trial is to evaluate the sustainability of a small scale commercial BFT fishery and the social and economic benefits this new fishery could potentially provide to UK fishers.

This trial will consist of 13 commercial vessels able to fish for BFT with 3 tonnes of quota per vessel. The fishery will be open from 1 July to 31 December 2024.

To be eligible to apply you must:

- Have a commercial fishing licence and be registered in either England, Scotland, Wales, or Northern Ireland.
- Apply for a vessel of 12 metres and under in <u>overall</u> length.
- Agree to have individual fishing trips last less than 24 hours in duration.
- Agree to use rod and reel fishing gears only. No chumming will be permitted.
- Agree to record all catches of bluefin tuna and submit an eBCD record for all landings (see reporting conditions).

How to complete and submit the application

Applications must be completed on an individual basis per vessel. No group applications will be accepted or applications for more than one vessel per application.

Applicants will be required to complete vessel, nominee and owner details. Applicants will also need to provide answers to two questions which relate to how applicants are best placed to deliver an environmentally sustainable fishery which brings economic and social benefits to the United Kingdom.

Consideration will also be given to an applicant's history of compliance with regulatory requirements relating to fishing. Further detail on what will be considered is available in the terms and conditions.

When completing this form, you should:

- answer all required questions. Incomplete applications forms will not be considered and will cause your application to be unsuccessful.

Applications are open from 8 April and will close at midnight on 28 April 2024. Applications received outside of this period will not be considered.

Next steps

Due to the commitments made in the 2024 UK fishing plan to ICCAT there are a limited number of vessels will be authorised to fish for BFT as part of this trial.

Applying for an authorisation does not guarantee that your application will be successful, and you must not fish for BFT without a letter of authorisation from the MMO.

A panel chaired by MMO will review and assess all applications for eligibility, consideration of history of compliance relating to fishing and responses to how applicants are best placed to deliver an environmentally sustainable fishery with substantial economic and/or social benefits.

Applications will be ranked based on their score and licence authorisations awarded to the 13 highest scoring applicants. Equal scoring applicants will be selected randomly to fulfil the available licence authorisations.

MMO will notify successful applicants in early June before the trial starts on 1 July 2024.

Licence authorisations will be non-transferable and valid for the 2024 fishing season only. Licence authorisations will not provide successful applicants with a track record for future quota considerations and provide no guarantee of access to BFT quota in future.

If you are successful, you will receive an authorisation letter to fish BFT, this is in addition to your domestic licence. Fishing for BFT must not commence until you have received the letter of authorisation.

Prior to commencing fishing for BFT those whose applications are successful will be required to do the following:

- Register their vessel on the International Commission for the Conservation of Atlantic Tunas (ICCAT) registry. Fishing must not begin until 15 days after the successful vessel details appear on the ICCAT registry.
- Register on the ICCAT Electronic Bluefin Tuna Catch Document Programme (eBCD) online system.
- Complete training on the ICCAT eBCD system.

During fishing for BFT successful applicants must:

- Comply with all conditions within their domestic fishing vessel licence and additional conditions contained within the authorisation.
- Only fish for bluefin tuna within the UK Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ), excluding Northern Irish and Welsh waters.
- Have individual fishing trips last less than 24 hours in duration.



- Use rod and reel fishing gears only, with no chumming permitted.
- Record all catches using paper or electronic logbooks at sea.
- Report all catches to the UK Fisheries Monitoring Centre (UKFMC) or UK single liaison office (UKSLO).
- Report all catches on the ICCAT eBCD system.
- Agree to be contacted as part of the formal evaluation of the trial.

Section 1: Vessel Details

Note: that not having an ICCAT serial number will <u>not</u> reduce the chances of you receiving a bluefin tuna licence. We ask this simply for administrative purposes.

8. Which ports would you be operating from and landing into? *

Note: Defra must register all landing ports with ICCAT. Landings of bluefin tuna can only be made into designated ports registered with ICCAT. 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Section 4: Fishing Objectives questions

These questions relate to meeting the Fisheries Objectives in section 1 of the Fisheries Act 2020 and in particular the sustainability and national benefit objectives.

Questions 1 and 2 will be assessed with the following scoring system:

- 0 No demonstration. No attempt made to answer the question. The application will not be considered further.
- 1 Minimal demonstration. For example, but not limited to: some information has been provided which relates to one or two bullet points suggested to help answer the question. However, there is a lack of detail or evidence provided.
- 2 Low level of demonstration. For example, but not limited to: some information has been provided which relates to the majority of the bullet points suggested to help answer the question; some detail or evidence has been provided.
- 3 Good level of demonstration. For example, but not limited to: some information has been provided which relates to all of the bullet points suggested to help answer the question; a good level of detail or evidence has been provided.
- 4 Excellent level of demonstration. For example, but not limited to: detailed information has been provided which relates to all of the bullet points suggested to help answer the question; very good level of detail and evidence has been provided with multiple examples.
- Explain how your vessel set-up, knowledge and experience will enable the sustainable fishing of bluefin tuna (BFT) and bring the best quality product to market.*

When answering this question you may wish to include information on:

- The suitability of your vessel for catching and storing BFT, and the equipment and handling processes you would employ to maintain quality of BFT.
- Your knowledge and experience of hook and line fishing to efficiently catch BFT (or any large pelagics) and minimise catches of undersize BFT and other species.
- Equipment, knowledge and experience to land, store and transport high quality BFT.
- How you would ensure the full traceability/legality of any BFT caught.

2. Explain how your involvement in the BFT fishery will bring economic, social and employment benefits to the UK. *

When answering this question you may wish to include information on:

- Any potential direct and indirect economic and employment benefits e.g. how landing and selling of BFT could benefit harbours/processers/markets/people etc.
- Any potential social benefits e.g. culture, education, community.
- How these benefits may relate to local areas.

Section 5: Terms and conditions and declaration

Terms and conditions

By issuing this expression of interest, UKSIA is not bound to accept any application or grant a bluefin tuna fishing authorisation to any applicant. MMO reserves the right to withdraw or terminate the application exercise at any time.

MMO reserve the right to refuse applications due to an applicant's history of compliance with regulatory requirements relating to fishing.

The criteria which will be taken into account when assessing applications include a conviction, fixed administrative penalty (FAP) or official written warning related to:

- Illegal, unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing
- Traceability issues (e.g. catch records, eBCD, sales note issues)

Weighting on infringements will be based on the number of offences committed as well as the level of offending and enforcement action.

Applicants are responsible for ensuring that they understand the requirements for this expression of interest process. If any information is unclear, you can raise a query with the UKSIA. The UKSIA will respond to all clarifications as quickly as possible but cannot guarantee a minimum response time. It is the responsibility of applicants to make sure that they raise any queries sufficiently early to allow them to submit their expressions of interest by the deadline. If a query is relevant to other applicants, the UKSIA will share all clarifications with other applicants, as and when necessary.

Applicants are responsible for ensuring they submit a complete and accurate application and provide all the information requested. Only completed applications will be considered. Once applications are submitted, amendments will not be accepted. If they wish to make an amendment, applicants should withdraw their existing application and submit a new application before the expiry of the expression of interest deadline.

Applicants may withdraw an application at any time by contacting the UKSIA. Applications received after the deadline will not be considered except in exceptional circumstances at the UKSIA's discretion. The UKSIA may also, at its own discretion, change the deadline and in such circumstances, the UKSIA will notify all applicants of any change via email.

MMO reserves the right to amend or withdraw this guidance and the application exercise at any time. This could include by way of example amending the process for submitting applications or extending the deadline.

Declaration

By submitting this application, you are agreeing that the information you have provided is to the best of your knowledge, true and accurate.

Any personal information provided within your application would be handled only for the purpose of processing your application and for formally evaluating the scheme. The UK government undertakes commensurate and appropriate evaluation to understand efficiency and effectiveness of interventions and their impacts. Your application will be shared with evaluation teams at the MMO and Defra and the panel appointed to consider applications, or their agents, solely for evaluation of the trial. Your personal details will not be published in any evaluation reporting.
