# Voter registration form for someone with no fixed or permanent address

You can still register to vote if you do not have a fixed address. This could be because:

- you are homeless or have no fixed address
- you are under 18 and are/or have been a child looked after by a local authority or are being kept in secure accommodations
- you are a patient in a mental health hospital
- you are a person who has been remanded in custody, but you have not yet been convicted of an offence.

To register, you need to give an address where you would be living if it were not for your current situation, or an address where you have lived in the past. If you are homeless, you can give details of where you spend a substantial part of your time.

## How to register to vote

- 1 Fill in this voter registration form.
- 2 Make sure you sign the declaration.
- **3** Return your completed form to your electoral registration office. You can find their address and more information at **electoralcommission.org.uk/voter.**

#### **Registering to vote**

You can register to vote if you are resident (usually live) in Wales and aged 14 or over (but you will not be able to vote in local council elections or Senedd elections until you are 16 and you will not be able to vote in UK Parliament or Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) elections until you are 18).

You must also be one of the following:

- British citizen
- Irish citizen
- Commonwealth citizen (including Maltese and Cypriot) who has permission to enter or stay in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man, or who does not need permission
- foreign national who has permission to enter or stay in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man, or who does not need permission (you can vote in Senedd and local council elections only)
- European Union (EU) citizen (you can vote in Senedd and local council elections and you may be able to vote in PCC elections).

Permission to enter or stay in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man (also called Leave to Enter or Remain) refers to a legal immigration status.

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#### Voting at the polling station

#### Your nationality and immigration status

Permission to enter or stay in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man (also called Leave to Enter or Remain) refers to a legal immigration status.

We may need additional evidence about your nationality or we may check your nationality or immigration status against government records.

Section 3 'Your immigration status' determines your eligibility to vote in Police and Crime Commissioner elections only. It does not determine your eligibility to register to vote, or to vote in Senedd or local council elections in Wales. If this section applies to you, we may check your historical nationality or historical immigration status against government records.

#### Your date of birth

If you don't know your date of birth please give the date you put on official documents (for example, your passport or driving licence) or tick one of the boxes. Your date of birth identifies you, confirms your eligibility to vote and can be used to call you for jury service.

#### Changed your name?

For example, you may have got married and changed your name. You do not have to give us details of your name change but it will help us identify you. If this information is not given then you may need to provide additional documentary evidence.

#### The open register

**There are two registers. Why?** Using information received from the public, registration officers keep two registers – the electoral register and the open register (also known as the edited register).

The open register is an extract of the electoral

register, but is not used for elections. It can be bought

by any person, company or organisation. For example,

it is used by businesses and charities to confirm name

and address details. Your name and address will be included in the open register unless you ask for them

to be removed. Removing your details from the open

register does not affect your right to vote.

**The electoral register** lists the names and addresses of everyone who is registered to vote in public elections. The register is used for electoral purposes, such as making sure only eligible people can vote. It is also used for other limited purposes specified in law, such as:

detecting crime (e.g. fraud)

- calling people for jury service
- checking credit applications.

If you are aged 14 or 15, you will not be included on the open register.

You will be included on the electoral register, but only Electoral Registration Officers and their staff can usually see the details you provide. Your details will not be included in any register that is published.

About six weeks before an election certain people need details of everyone who can vote in that election. If you will be 16 on the date of the Senedd or local council elections, your name and address will be given to people who run the elections, and to candidates who want to provide information to voters.

If you are concerned that having your name or address on the register may affect your safety, there could be other options available to you. In certain circumstances, you can register without your name and address showing on the register.

#### **Privacy statement**

The Electoral Registration Officer is the Controller. Their lawful basis for collecting the personal information in this application form is that the processing is necessary in order to perform a task in the public interest as set out in the Representation of the People Act 1983 and related legislation.

The Electoral Registration Officer is legally required to process your personal information securely and comply with data protection legislation.

If you opted-out of the open register, your name and address can only be used for electoral purposes (including matching it against other data sources to support the electoral register) and other limited purposes specified in law. The law allows your information to be used for democratic engagement activities (by political parties, candidates, and agents), crime detection, jury summoning, and credit application identity checks.

If you did not opt-out of the open register your name and address can be bought by anyone and used for lots of purposes, including direct marketing.
