Release of Information

Thank you for your correspondence of 4 July 2023 in which you requested the following information:

'Please would it be possible to know how many female naval officers there are of the rank of captain, commodore, rear admiral, vice admiral and full admiral? Please would it also be possible to know how many of these female naval officers are currently in warfare and operational roles ie NOT comms, training, HR, logistics, etc.'

Your enquiry has been considered to be a request for information in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000 (the Act).

A search has now been completed within the Ministry of Defence and I can confirm that information in scope of your request is held.

The MOD is permitted to withhold information where an exemption is considered justifiable. As some of the information you have requested is already available to the public, we have assessed your request falls under the absolute exemption at Section 21 (information reasonably accessible to the applicant by other means) of the Act. Consequently, we are not obliged to provide you with this information.

Please be advised, that as at 1 April 2023, there are no female Officers serving in the Royal Marines.

In response to part two of your request, figures for female RN officers in the Warfare Branch, can be found at Annex A to this letter.

Please be advised that Officers in the Warfare branch can undertake a range of functions in their roles. Due to the nature of role variation across the service and frequency of movement between assignments, it is not appropriate to distinguish which Officers working in the Warfare branch are currently in a role that is considered combative compared to a desk-based role.

For information on Females in all roles, all Trained Regular Female figures are detailed in the link provided for UK Armed Forces Biannual Diversity Statistics.
