Annex A National Highway's assessment of the proposed development

National Highways has been appointed by the Secretary of State for Transport as a strategic highway company under the provisions of the Infrastructure Act 2015 and is the highway authority, traffic authority and street authority for the Strategic Road Network (SRN). The SRN is a critical national asset and as such we work to ensure that it operates and is managed in the public interest, both in respect of current activities and needs as well as in providing effective stewardship of its long-term operation and integrity.

This response represents our formal recommendations with regards to the above application S62A/2024/0057 and has been prepared by Dr Shamsul Hoque.

Recommended No Objection

National Highways offer no objection.

Reason:

The proposed application site will be accessed from the local road network (Mount Pleasant Road). In the vicinity of the application site, National Highways is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the A11 or M11 (SRN).

We have reviewed the details and information provided. From this proposed application location there are a number of travelling routes to and from the nearest SRN Junction/s. Therefore, the generated peak hours trips will be distributed using different travelling routes/directions.

Due to the location, scale, and nature of the proposed development, there is unlikely to have any adverse effect on the Strategic Road Network.

Therefore, we offer no objection.

Standing advice to the local planning authority

The Climate Change Committee's <u>2022 Report to Parliament</u> notes that for the UK to achieve net zero carbon status by 2050, action is needed to support a modal shift away from car travel. The NPPF supports this position, with paragraphs 73 and 105 prescribing that significant development should offer a genuine choice of transport modes, while paragraphs 104 and 110 advise that appropriate opportunities to promote walking, cycling and public transport should be taken up.

Moreover, the build clever and build efficiently criteria as set out in clause 4.3 of <u>PAS2080:2023</u> promote the use of low carbon materials and products, innovative design solutions and construction methods to minimise resource consumption.

These considerations should be weighed alongside any relevant Local Plan policies to ensure that planning decisions are in line with the necessary transition to net zero carbon.
