
Register to vote



Who can register to vote?



You can register to vote if you are:





Aged 16 or over



You will not be able to vote until you are 18.



You must also be 1 of the following:

A British or Irish citizen



 A Commonwealth citizen who has permission to live in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man



The **Commonwealth** is a group of countries that mostly used to be part of the British Empire.



An EU citizen from Denmark, Luxembourg, Poland, Portugal, or Spain who has permission to live in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man



 An EU citizen from another country with permission to live in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man.



If you are an EU citizen from another country, the permission to live in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man must have started on 31 December 2020 or before and not stopped.



Some EU or Commonwealth citizens do not need permission to live in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man.

If you are a British, Irish or Commonwealth citizen you can register to vote in all elections.



If you are an EU citizen you can register to vote in:

- local council elections
- Police and Crime Commissioner elections





Most people vote at a polling station on polling day.

The Open Register



Registration officers keep 2 registers:

- The Electoral Register
- The Open Register



The Electoral Register

This has all the names and addresses of everyone who is registered to vote in elections.

It is used to make sure people are allowed to vote.



It can also be used to:

Help the police detect a crime



Call people to be on a jury



A **jury** is a group of people who decide if someone is guilty in some court cases.



 Check the names and addresses of people who want to borrow money




The Open Register

The Open Register is not used for elections. It can be bought by any person, company or organisation.



Your name will be on The Open Register unless you ask for it to be removed.

Your right to vote is not affected if you ask for your name to be removed.





Worried about your safety?

If you are worried having your name and address on the register will affect your safety, or the safety of someone you live with, contact your Electoral Registration Office.

Voter ID



When you vote at a polling station you need to take photo ID with you.



You can find out more about photo ID at www.gov.uk/how-to-vote/photo-id-youll-need





If you do not have photo ID you will need to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate to use as photo ID when you vote.

Privacy statement



If you choose to be on The Open Register your information can be bought by anyone.



They might use it to contact you to tell you about something or try and sell you something.



If you choose **not** to have your name and address on The Open Register, we will only use your information when we are running elections and referendums.



We will look after your information and keep it safe. We will follow the data protection laws.



We will not give any information about you to anyone unless the law says we must.



We use your information in a way that is set out in a law called Representation of the People Act 1983 and other laws.



The law says that the **Data Controller** must have a privacy notice that explains how this information will be used.



The Electoral Registration Officer is the **Data Controller**.
