Am I eligible to register?

To register as an overseas voter you must be:

- a British citizen living overseas
- aged 16 or over (although you won't be able to vote until you are 18).

You must also have been registered to vote in the UK or been resident (lived) in the UK before.

Which UK elections can I vote in?

As an overseas voter, you are eligible to vote in UK Parliament elections.

How to register to vote

- 2 Make sure you sign the declaration.
- **3** Return your completed form and any relevant evidence to your electoral registration office. You can find their address and more information at **electoralcommission.org.uk/voter.**

- Firearms certificate (granted under the Firearms Act 1968)
- Record of a bail decision (issued in England or Wales)

Supporting documents list C:

These documents must be issued in the UK, Channel Islands, or Isle of Man.

- Bank or building society statement, or account confirmation letter
- Utility bill
- Credit card statement
- · Benefits (or benefits entitlement) statement
- Mortgage statement
- P45 or P60 form
- Pension statement
- Council tax statement, or demand letter





Your nationality

We may need additional evidence about your nationality or we may check your nationality against government records.

Your date of birth

If you don't know your date of birth, please give the date you put on official documents (for example, your passport or driving licence) or tick one of the boxes. Your date of birth identifies you and confirms your eligibility to vote.

Supporting documents

The documents in list C can be the same type. For example, you can provide four bank statements from different months.

The open register

There are two registers. Why?

Using information received from the public, registration officers keep two registers – the electoral register and the open register (also known as the edited register).

The electoral register lists the names and addresses of everyone who is registered to vote in public elections. The register is used for electoral purposes, such as making sure only eligible people can vote. It is also used for other limited purposes specified in law, such as:

• detecting crime (e.g. fraud)

- calling people for jury service
- checking credit applications.

The open register is an extract of the electoral register, but is not used for elections. It can be bought by any person, company or organisation. For example, it is used by businesses and charities to confirm name and address details. Your name and address will be included in the open register unless you ask for them to be removed. Removing your details from the open register does not affect your right to vote.

If you are concerned that having your name or address on the register may affect your safety, there could be other options available to you.

In certain circumstances, you can register without your name and address showing on the register.

Privacy statement

The Electoral Registration Officer is the Controller. Their lawful basis for collecting the personal information in this application form is that the processing is necessary in order to perform a task in the public interest as set out in the Representation of the People Act 1983 and related legislation.

The Electoral Registration Officer is legally required to process your personal information securely and comply with data protection legislation.

If you opted-out of the open register, your name and address can only be used for electoral purposes and other limited purposes specified in law. The law allows your information to be used for democratic engagement activities (by political parties, candidates, and agents), detecting crime, jury summoning, and checking credit applications.

If you did <u>not</u> opt-out of the open register, your name and address can be bought by anyone and used for lots of purposes, including direct marketing.

You can view the privacy notice on the website of your electoral registration office, or you can contact them to request a copy. You can find their website address and contact details at **electoralcommission.org.uk/voter**.

Voting at the polling station

If you vote in person at your polling station in the UK, you will need to show photo ID. If you do not have accepted photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document, the Voter Authority Certificate.
