- you are the spouse or registered civil partner of a Crown servant or British Council employee and you
 accompany them during their employment abroad.

You must renew your application every 12 months, but you can cancel it at any time.

You can register to vote if you are resident (usually live) in England and aged 16 or over but you will not be able to vote until you are 18. You must also be one of the following:

- · a British or Irish citizen
- a Commonwealth citizen (including Maltese and Cypriot) who has permission to enter or stay in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man, or who does not need permission
- a European Union (EU) citizen of Denmark, Luxembourg, Poland, Portugal, or Spain who
 has permission to enter or stay in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man, or who does not
 need permission
- a European Union (EU) citizen of any other EU country who on or before 31 December 2020 had
 permission to enter or stay in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man, or who did not need permission,
 and this has continued without a break.

Your nationality and immigration status

Permission to enter or stay in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man (also called Leave to Enter or Remain) refers to a legal immigration status.

We may need additional evidence about your nationality or we may check your nationality or immigration status against government records.

If section 3 'Your immigration status' applies to you, we may check your historical nationality or historical immigration status against government records.

Changed your name?

For example, you may have got married and changed your name. You do not have to give us details of your name change but it will help us identify you. If this information is not given, then you may need to provide additional documentary evidence.

Your date of birth

If you don't know your date of birth, please give the date you put on official documents (for example, your passport or driving licence) or tick one of the boxes. Your date of birth identifies you, confirms your eligibility to vote and can be used to call you for jury service.

The open register

There are two registers. Why? Using information received from the public, registration officers keep two registers – the electoral register and the open register (also known as the edited register).

The electoral register lists the names and addresses of everyone who is registered to vote in public elections. The register is used for electoral purposes, such as making sure only eligible people can vote. It is also used for other limited purposes specified in law, such as:

- detecting crime (e.g. fraud)
- calling people for jury service
- checking credit applications.

The open register is an extract of the electoral register, but is not used for elections. It can be bought by any person, company or organisation. For example, it is used by businesses and charities to confirm name and address details. Your name and address will be included in the open register unless you ask for them to be removed. Removing your details from the open register does not affect your right to vote.

If you are concerned that having your name or address on the register may affect your safety, there could be other options available to you.

In certain circumstances, you can register without your name and address showing on the register.

Privacy statement

The Electoral Registration Officer is the Controller. Their lawful basis for collecting the personal information in this application form is that the processing is necessary in order to perform a task in the public interest as set out in the Representation of the People Act 1983 and related legislation.

The Electoral Registration Officer is legally required to process your personal information securely and comply with data protection legislation.

If you opted-out of the open register, your name and address can only be used for electoral purposes (including matching it against other data sources to support the electoral register) and other limited purposes specified in law. The law allows your information to be used for democratic engagement activities (by political parties, candidates, and agents), crime detection, jury summoning, and credit application identity checks.

If you did not opt-out of the open register your name and address can be bought by anyone and used for lots of purposes, including direct marketing.
