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Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government property data pilot

HM Land Registry (HMLR) began a new pilot on 2 June 2025 to investigate how improving access to key property datasets held by local authorities can benefit the home buying and selling process.

Commissioned by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local **Government** (MHCLG), the pilot will run for 10 months involving up to seven local authorities (LAs) and a small number of customers who are buying/selling homes to understand their experience with the pilot. The primary focus is to understand the impact of providing access to building regulations and highways information. Research suggests these two datasets play a significant role in property search delays – causing transactions to fail and costing buyers around £400 million a year.

This initiative marks an important step toward modernising property data access, improving transaction times, and streamlining the conveyancing process.


Improving services in the Maintain Local Land Charges service

Revoke and create your API tokens

Local authorities that update the Local Land Charges (LLC) Register using an application programming interface (API) can now monitor, revoke and create API tokens through the Maintain LLC service. Customers with an API admin account can view their authority's token information, including its expiry date by selecting 'Create or revoke API access tokens'.

This new feature eliminates intervention from HM Land Registry and API admin customers will be expected to manage their API tokens accordingly. Notifications will be issued to customers with an API admin account 60 and 30 days prior to the expiry date, followed by a final reminder once the token has expired.

Introducing this form of self-serve releases time and resource into the live service space, allowing relationship managers to provide an even better level of service and support.



'Add a charge' function update

In February's newsletter we mentioned the planned improvements to the 'Add a charge' function in the Maintain LLC service. This update is approaching the final stages of development, and testing will begin shortly.

We are almost ready to share this enhancement with you. More details will follow shortly.

Strengthening local authority relationships

From April 2024 to March 2025, 21 local authorities (LA) successfully migrated into live service, of these:

- 71% achieved gold status,
- 24% were classified as silver,
- 5% were classified as bronze,
- 0% require special measures.

This high standard of quality and timeliness in the first year of migration is a significant achievement for both relationship managers and the LAs involved.

We are responding to your feedback

As part of our ongoing commitment to improve service performance, our team have worked tirelessly over the last year to embed several improvements. The changes are ensuring a smoother transition into live service and delivering a more reliable, accurate service.

Live Service survey – feedback requests include:

- A revised handover pack now more user-friendly, supporting all elements of live service, not just the initial stages.
- The introduction of the Quality
 Response Tracker allows better
 monitoring of the Local Land Charges
 Register quality.
- Development of a new live service manual - complements the handover pack, improving guidance.

Better collaboration across departments

Relationship managers and delivery managers are working more closely together to ensure LAs are fully prepared for live service responsibilities when they go live.

- Relationship Managers are now involved in critical planning meetings, discussing potential issues earlier in the delivery plan to mitigate risks.
- Clear expectations, responsibilities and standards are reinforced in a

- standardised format. Sharing these earlier in the migration process is helping to build confidence across LA departments that feed into the service.
- The new live service handover pack and manual will make the process even smoother.

Looking ahead

Service Performance Integration (SPI)
Team Manager, Dan Williams said "I'm
looking forward to seeing what further
efficiencies we can make to live service
during the year, as we continue to
build and develop our services."

As the pace of migrations increases, the SPI team remain committed to delivering a high-quality service that meets all customer needs. To fully understand these needs we will issue our next Live Service survey in September. We encourage all migrated authorities to share their views, so these can be captured, evaluated and incorporated into our delivery plan where possible.



Recent events

COPSO Conference

On 20 May 2025, the Council of Property Search Organisations (CoPSO) annual conference provided a valuable platform to reflect on progress, discuss priorities and explore emerging trends in the search market.

Among the speakers was Rhonda Griffiths, Head of Local Land Charges (LLC) Programme Management and Policy, who gave an update on the LLC Programme, digital planning and the Property Data pilot. Attendees also benefited from live demonstrations of the LLC search service and insight into how the digital data is being used.

Beyond the discussions, the event provided an opportunity to build new connections with industry leaders and learn about the latest developments. CoPSO remains an important stakeholder of the LLC Programme and HM Land Registry. As a prominent market voice, we look forward to their continued engagement, helping to shape future property searches.

UKREIIF

HM Land Registry (HMLR) took an active role in the UK Real Estate Investment and Infrastructure Forum (UKREiiF) on 20-22 May 2025. As a panellist on the UK Government Knowledge Hub, Mark Gray, HMLR **Chief Information and Technology** Officer joined the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local **Government and Homes England** to discuss creating communities. The Governments 1.5 million homes initiative set the backdrop for conversations about LLC digitisation and HMLRs commitment to a geospatial data approach.

LLC Programme Director, Mark Kelso alongside LLC Live Service Manager, Nick Boddington spoke at the Digital Transformation in Property: from records to reality session. Discussions focused on opening critical datasets, harnessing Al technology and the broader benefits of transforming paper or electronic data to digital records.



The national LLC Register cost savings

Since programme launch, the LLC Register has recorded a total cost saving of over £3million from searches with customers in migrated areas, saving an average of 12.17 days to obtain an LLC search result. More than 7.3 million charges from 125 local authorities have been migrated to the register.
