1. Purpose of the paper

1.1. The purpose of the paper is to provide a progress update on delivery of activities under UKHSA's Global Strategy (2023 to 2026). The paper also provides an update on work intended to help shape and support senior decision-making on priorities and ambitions for UKHSA's global activity and engagement beyond 2025.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1. The Advisory Board is asked to:
 - a) NOTE the progress update regarding UKHSA's global activities; and
 - b) **COMMENT** on proposed priorities for UKHSA's global strategic approach.

3. Background

- 3.1. UKHSA's Global Strategy sets out our approach to global health (2023 to 2026) and is underpinned by three strategic priorities: Pandemic Preparedness, Prevention, and Response; Global Surveillance; and Health Systems Strengthening. The Advisory Board received a progress update on delivery of activities under each of these priorities in September 2024 (paper ref: AB/24/029 (C)).
- 3.2. Since the last update, there has been significant change across UKHSA, government, geopolitics and global health. These changes, provide an opportune moment to reassess UKHSA's approach to global health and determine our long-term priorities and ambitions for our global activity.

4. Progress update on delivery of UKHSA's global strategic priorities

4.1. The summary below provides a high-level update on progress under each of the strategic priorities of the UKHSA Global Strategy as of June 2025.

5. Pandemic Prevention, Preparedness and Response (PPPR)

5.1. UKHSA has continued to actively contribute to global PPPR initiatives. The Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) Official Development Assistance (ODA)-funded UK-Public Health Rapid Support Team (UK-PHRST) has continued to deploy expertise to outbreaks of infectious disease in low-and middle-income countries. This has included the deployment of 17 experts to 8 different countries/outbreaks in 24/25 and 7 experts to 3 outbreaks in 25/26 Q1. These included tackling cholera in South Sudan; mpox in Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), South Africa and Kenya; and Marburg Haemorrhagic Fever in Rwanda and Tanzania. UK-PHRST also completed 100 capacity strengthening activities (ranging)

from input to workshops and advisory groups, to full simulation exercises and trainings) and 12 active research projects during this time. Full details of all UK-PHRST activity are at **Annex A**.

- 5.2. UKHSA provided technical expertise to the DHSC and FCDO team negotiating the World Health Organization (WHO) Pandemic Agreement, which was adopted during the World Health Assembly in May 2025 and will serve to boost global collaboration to ensure stronger, more equitable response to future pandemics.
- 5.3. From April 2024 to May 2025, the Chief Executive served as the elected chair of the Steering Group of the WHO Pan-European Network for Disease Control (NDC) (and interim chair from September 2023), supporting the strategic direction of the network, which aims to strengthen Europe's capacity to respond effectively to public health threats. UKHSA experts are core members of the NDC Collaborative Surveillance working group which aims to develop a flexible business case for increased investment in Collaborative Surveillance at national level.

6. Global Surveillance

- 6.1. UKHSA continues to support the implementation of global surveillance initiatives, actively contributing through the WHO Hub for Pandemic and Epidemic Intelligence, as well as the International Pathogen Surveillance Network (IPSN). This has included expert contribution to the WHO Genomics Costing Tool and the review panel to finalise the IPSN Genomics Country Capacity Framework.
- 6.2. UKHSA maintains strategic relationships which allow data, analytical capabilities and insights to flow. We met regularly through 2024/25 with a group of Public Health Institutes from the United States, Australia, Canada, and New Zealand to share best practice, analytical techniques and insights on data sharing between subgovernments and digitalisation of public health, including use of Artificial Intelligence.
- 6.3. In early 2025, UKHSA signed a Data Sharing Agreement (DSA) with the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC), allowing greater access for UKHSA to the European surveillance portal for infectious diseases (EpiPulse), operated by ECDC. The UK was the first country with third party status to sign a DSA with ECDC. A recent example of benefit from this access has been sharing with European partners on EpiPulse about evolving clusters of disease in travellers.
- 6.4. Ongoing support through the International Health Regulations Strengthening Project (IHR-SP) has enabled Pakistan to build an Integrated Disease Surveillance and Response system that is now in large part staffed and funded domestically. IHR-SP support has resulted in 11,350 healthcare workers trained, 2,300+ alert signals generated in 2024, and 108 confirmed outbreaks identified and responded to.

7. Health Systems Strengthening

7.1. The DHSC ODA-funded IHR-SP has continued to work with teams based in Ethiopia, Pakistan, Nigeria, Zambia and Indonesia, as well as through regional collaboration with Africa CDC, the Eastern Mediterranean Public Health Network and Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) Health Cluster 2 in the Indo-Pacific region. In 2024-25, this has included training approximately 3000 public health professionals in emergency preparedness, multisector coordination on chemical incident responses, public health leadership, introducing first ever diagnostic testing for mpox and diphtheria, supporting national guidelines development and pivoting existing surveillance tools to manage health impacts of climate change (floods/smogs). The

teams have also helped in-country partners to successfully bid into the Pandemic Fund. Separately, a UKHSA staff member is also seconded to support the Africa CDC Director General's office.

- 7.2. The UK Overseas Territories (UKOTs) Health Security Programme has continued to strengthen health systems and improve capacity in the OTs. It has delivered a Caribbean-wide multi-day vector borne diseases workshop, provided expert technical support in incident response, and delivered capacity building activities including a cholera Simulation Exercise in the Turks and Caicos Islands, a HPV prevalence study in Montserrat, and a COVID-19 After-Action Review in St Helena.
- 7.3. In November 2024, the Caribbean Antimicrobial Resistance Alliance (CARA) project was launched, funded by the Fleming Fund, and led by UKHSA, in partnership with the Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA). The project works across the Caribbean to strengthen the regional response to AMR through laboratory systems and AMR surveillance strengthening and capacity building. Since the project launch, approximately £2million laboratory equipment has been procured for CARPHA's Caribbean regional reference laboratories in St Lucia, Jamaica and Trinidad, several multi-week staff deployments between CARPHA and UKHSA have taken place to enable technical training, and UKHSA has been awarded further funding for up to two years to cover capacity strengthening activities.
- 7.4. UKHSA has also continued to support WHO by hosting WHO Collaborating Centres (WHO CCs). In 2024/25, UKHSA established Collaborative Open Research Consortia on two viral families, Arenavirus and Bunyavirales, and has hosted global expert meetings to progress a research and development roadmap for Oropouche virus. Through the WHO CCs we have also participated in country Joint External Evaluations (JEE), supported the development of National Action Plans, and provided expert advice on mass gatherings to Sante Publiqué France for the Paris 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games. The agency also hosts eight WHO Affiliated Laboratories. A full list of the UKHSA-hosted CCs and Laboratories is at **Annex B**.
- 7.5. Our experts in the chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear (CBRN) fields continue to provide significant technical expertise to international initiatives, including co-chairing the Environment and Health Task Force Bureau of the WHO Europe Environment and Health Process (EHP), where we have established and lead a partnership on poison centres in the WHO Europe region.
- 7.6. Over the past year, UKHSA has continued to develop and strengthen new and existing partnerships enabling collaboration, knowledge exchange, and information sharing on priority topics. This included signing a new Memorandum of Understanding with the Singapore Communicable Diseases Agency in late 2024.

8. Determining UKHSA's longer term strategic global approach

- 8.1. With the end of UKHSA's current Global Strategy in 2026, work is ongoing to consider priorities for our longer term strategic global approach and engagement beyond 2025.
- 8.2. A workshop was held in early June 2025 and Executive Committee members invited to consider different strategic lenses which UKHSA could prioritise for our global work, also considering global megatrends and the broader context, including the reduction in UK Official Development Assistance (ODA) funding.

- 8.3. The lenses proposed for consideration were not exhaustive but each proposed different partners and geographic regions of priority focus. The health threats lens proposed focusing on where the greatest health threats exist and are emerging. The growth lens proposed focusing on countries/regions identified as potential partners for income generation opportunities. The One HMG lens proposed focusing efforts on partnerships that contribute to cross-government and foreign policy priorities.
- 8.4. The Executive Committee noted that all lenses were important parts of UKHSA's global work, but the agency's expertise and capabilities to detect, prevent, and respond to health threats to the UK and globally should guide our strategic approach.
- 8.5. Executive Committee members were also invited to consider whether a refreshed global strategy for the agency was needed when the current one runs its term in 2026. It was agreed that global work and ambition was a core part of UKHSA's remit and a cross-cutting theme and should instead be embedded more visibly in the development of the 2026-2029 UKHSA strategic plan.
- 8.6. It should also be acknowledged that there are multiple interdependencies, including ongoing consideration and development by FCDO, DHSC, and others of the wider cross-HMG approach to global health, as well as the impact of ODA reductions, both from the UK and other global actors. These developments, and government decisions around prioritisation of key issues and funding, are inextricably linked to UKHSA's ability to work globally and where, how, and with whom we do activity globally.
- 8.7. Noting the interdependencies, to support shaping UKHSA's strategic approach, Advisory Board members are invited to share their views on the following questions:
 - a) Are there other areas (outside the health threats lens) the agency should be focussed on developing in our global activity?
 - b) How can we best integrate global as a cross-cutting theme across all work areas in the development of our next UKHSA strategic plan?
 - c) How can UKHSA enable domestic health security and economic growth through its global relationships?

9. Next steps

- 9.1. Based on the outcomes of the Advisory Board consideration, the UKHSA Global Strategy team will work with relevant teams across the agency to further develop UKHSA's strategic global approach and use the internal Global Coordination Board as the governance mechanism to progress consultation, development, and implementation with Executive Committee members.
- 9.2. The Global Strategy team will also work with the UKHSA Strategy team and DHSC and FCDO stakeholders to consider interdependencies and implications for the next UKHSA strategic plan and wider cross-HMG approach to global health. A global update will be provided to the Advisory Board later this year (currently scheduled for November 2025).
