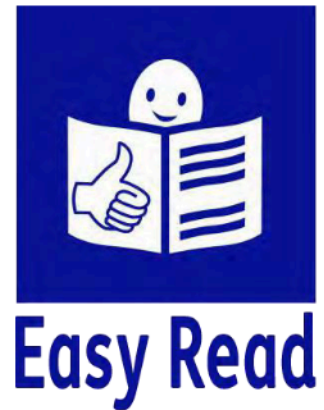
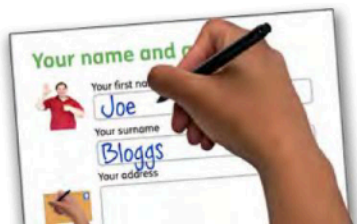


Register to vote



You need to **register to vote** to take part in elections and referendums.



Register to vote means:

- Completing this form
- If your application is successful, your name goes on the list of people who are able to vote in elections



You can apply to **register to vote** either:

Who can register to vote?



You can register to vote if you are:

- Living in Wales



- Aged 14 or over



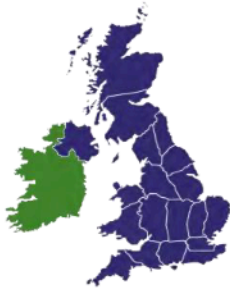
You will not be able to vote:

- In Senedd elections or local council elections until you are 16



- In UK Parliament elections or Police and Crime Commissioner elections until you are 18

You must also be 1 of the following:



- A British or Irish citizen



- A **Commonwealth** citizen who has permission to live in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man



- A **foreign national** who has permission to live in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man



The **Commonwealth** is a group of countries that mostly used to be part of the British Empire.



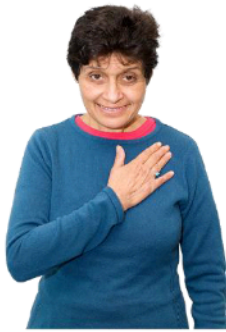
A **foreign national** is someone who was not born in the country they are living in.



- A European Union Citizen



Some Commonwealth citizens or foreign nationals do not need permission to live in the UK, Channel Islands or Isle of Man.



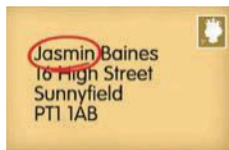

The Open Register



Registration officers keep 2 registers:

- The Electoral Register
- The Open Register

The Electoral Register

This has all the names and addresses of everyone who is registered to vote in elections.

It is used to make sure people are allowed to vote.



It can also be used to:

- Help the police detect a crime
- Call people to be on a jury



A **jury** is a group of people who decide if someone is guilty in some court cases.



- Check the names and addresses of people who want to borrow money

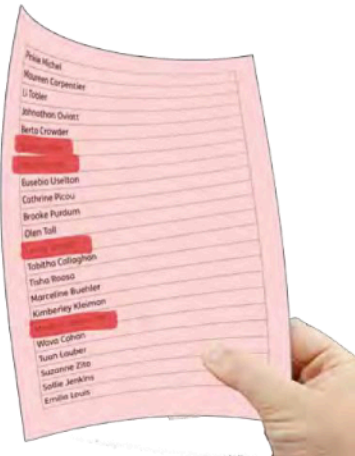
The Open Register

The Open Register is not used for elections. It can be bought by a person, company or organisation.



If you are aged 16 or older your name will be on the Open Register unless you ask for it to be removed.

Your right to vote is not affected if you ask for your name to be removed.

People aged 14 or 15

People aged 14 or 15 will not be included on the Open Register.



They will be included on The Electoral Register, but only Electoral Registration Officers and their staff can see the details.



About six weeks before an election certain people need to be able to see the details of the people who can vote in the election.



If you will be 16 or older on the date of the election, your name and address will be given to:

- the people who run the election
- the people who you can vote for in the election



Worried about your safety?

Postal vote, or by proxy



Most people vote at a polling station on polling day.



Do **not** fill in the boxes in this section if you want to vote at the polling station.



If you do not want to vote at the polling station, you can choose to vote by post or by **proxy**.



Proxy means allowing someone you trust to vote on your behalf.



You will need to fill in a form to vote by post or by **proxy**.

When you vote at a polling station you will need to take photo ID with you for UK Parliament and Police and Crime Commissioner elections.

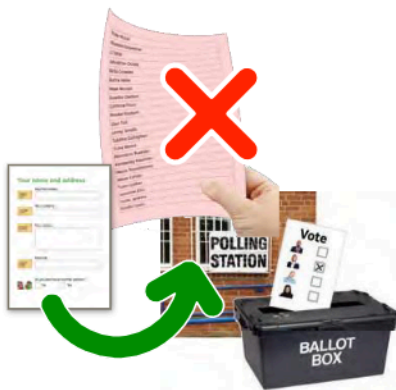
Privacy statement



If you choose to be on the Open Register your information can be bought by anyone.



They might use it to contact you to tell you about something or try and sell you something.



If you choose **not** to have your name and address on the Open Register, we will only use your information when we are running elections and referendums.



We will look after your information and keep it safe. We will follow the data protection laws.



We will not give any information about you to anyone unless the law says we must.



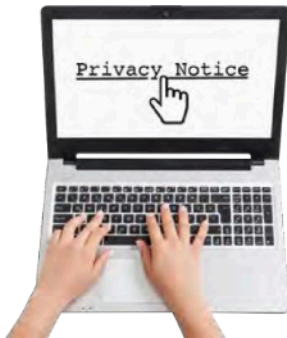
We use your information in ways that are set out in laws called Representation of the People Act 1983, the Senedd and Elections (Wales) Act 2020 and other laws.



The law says the **Data Controller** must have a privacy notice that explains how this information will be used.



The Electoral Registration Officer is the **Data Controller**.
