Before you apply

You must have a current Woodland Management Plan (WMP) approved by the Forestry Commission to apply. Your WMP must be in place for the 10-year length of your agreement.

If your WMP is due to expire during your agreement, you must have a new one in place before it ends. The Forestry Commission recommends you apply the year before it ends.

Find out how to create a WMP if you don't already have one.

Species management

If you plan to apply for funding for species management, you must have a species management plan (SMP) approved by the Forestry Commission or Natural England.

Your pre-application will not be approved without this.

- American mink
- deer
- edible dormouse
- grey squirrel
- invasive plant species (not including Rhododendron)

You will need a plan for each species you want to manage.

You may be able to <u>apply for PA7: Species management plan</u> to help pay for this. If you apply for PA7, do not start writing your plan until it is approved.

Even if you do not apply for PA7, you must <u>use one of the PA7 templates</u> to create your plan.
